

SAGINAW BAY GETS \$2.5 MILLION

The U.S. Department of Agriculture will provide \$2.5 million during the next five years for the Saginaw Bay Water Quality Demonstration Project, according to an announcement Monday by U.S. Cong. Bob Traxler (D-Bay City.) The project will attempt to reduce sedimentation, plus cut nutrient and pesticide input in Saginaw Bay and Lake Huron, plus tributaries, Cong. Traxler says.

Coordinating the effort is a USDA work group including the MSU Cooperative Extension Service and USDA Ag Stabilization and Conservation Service, and the Soil Conservation

The project involves Counties of Huron, Tuscola, Saginaw and Bay, to help farmers and agribusinesses decrease the amounts of phosphorus in the bay, plus reduce ag pesticide contamination of ground and surface water, plus nitrate contamination of waters. The effort will work to renovate pesticide storage facilities, control erosion, conduct educational meetings and tours, make field demonstrations and improve public relations.

The Saginaw Bay Water Quality Demonstration Project area includes 535,200 acres, 95% of which is cropland.

"We need a coordinated, comphrehensive approach to dealing with non-point source pollution," Cong. Traxler says. "This project is another element in an overall effort."

B&E CRIME LEADS TO DEATH

A Tawas City man died Thanksgiving Day and a Huron County man is in custody, in connection with a breaking and entering at Agri Sales Inc., Sebewaing.

Sebewaing Police were doing a security check approximately 6:15 p.m. at the Union Street facility when the breakin was discovered and a suspect apprehended.

According to a report from Sebewaing's Assistant Police Chief Paul Klaus, Norman Ray Fairchild, 29, died from injuries sustained in a 60-foot fall from an elevator shaft at the facility. Fairchild was taken to Bay Medical Center, Bay City, where he was pronounced dead.

The arraignment of the suspect is expected to take place Tuesday afternoon.

The Owendale-Gagetown School District will receive a \$12,500 state grant to continue its program for "at risk" students.






