

AIDS prevention her top priority

By AMY HEIDEN

Statistics say that within 10 years, every person in the United States will know someone whose life has been touched by AIDS.

It may be a family member or a friend or a friend's friend, but everyone will be touched in some way.

And here in Huron and Sanilac Counties, Janice Clark is working to educate people about the disease.

For two years, she's been speaking to various civic and school groups, spelling out the facts and trying to dispel the myths surrounding

Clark is the AIDS Coordinator for the Huron and Sanilac Health Departments, dividing her time between the two counties. In her position, she not only makes presentations, she's responsible for confidential AIDS testing and referrals and counseling.

The job of coordinator fell right into Clark's area of ex-

She is a registered nurse, and two years ago she was working in home health care, and during that time she came into contact with AIDS

When the position of coordinator for the two counties became available, she jumped at the chance.

All AIDS testing is done confidentially, and no names are ever given or written down, Clark says.

"All the testing is done anonymously. We assign a code number, and only I have access to it," she says. But even with the security safeguards, some people are hesitant about contacting the health department.

"They fear that their name will get into the system and they'll be identified," Clark notes. "No names are ever



'In same boat' in Stockholm, Sweden!

Whenever you have shared thoughts and experiences with another person, have you ever used the expression "being in the same boat"?

For Wilbur R. Maust of Waterloo, Ont., a native of Pigeon, he "was in the same boat" with a fellow traveler to the World Symposium of Choral Music in Stockholm, Sweden last August.

On sabbatical from Conrad Grebel College at the University of Waterloo, Ont. where he is professor of music and chairman of the music department, Maust was one of 1000 choral conductors from around the world to attend the nine-day event, which also included four days in Tallin, Estonia and Helsinki, Finland.

On the first morning of the symposium as Maust was preparing to leave the ship called the "Gustaf Af Klint," a young man approached him on board and asked him if he knew how to get to the Symposium. As they started their 20-minute walk to the Conference Center, they began to introduce themselves.

His new acquaintance said he had just arrived by overnight ship from Finland where he was visiting friends, but that he came from Washington D.C., where he is a professor and chairman of of the Music Department at Washington Bible College.

Returning some personal information, Maust told him he was also from the U.S. and in fact, from Michigan.

"Really?" said his acquaintance. "I also came from Michigan." He then inquired more specifically about where Maust was from and he told him, "I come from Huron County."

"That's interesting," his new friend said. "I'm from Huron County, too. What town are you from?"

"I told him I grew up on a farm near Bay Port and that my parents lived in Pigeon after they retired. It turned out that he, too, came from a farm on Caseville Road a few miles south of Pigeon and the two farms were not more than four miles apart!

His new friend turned out to be Dale Voelker, son of Don and Viola Voelker of Pigeon. Maust is the son of Richard and Elizabeth Maust and both "natives" have relatives in the Pigeon area.

Their introductions continued as Voelker shared that he went to Northwestern for

his music doctorate, where he studied Church Music and Organ. Maust told him he went to Indiana University, where he took a music doctorate in Music History and Voice.

The two men, who shared such a powerful love of music, had never met in Michigan, but found themselves "in the same boat" in Stockholm, Sweden!
