



## Locked-out Active workers get food help

AIW Local 628 members got a bit of help with their food needs last week, when union officials opened up their food bank.

Most of the non-perishable food items were purchased from a surplus food bank with monies from the Local's vending fund, according to union president Bob Wilson, and donations from members for the food items will be used to purchase even more food in the following weeks.

**Each family also** received a box of macaroni and cheese donated by Local 111, at Sebewaing Industries, Inc.

Any food purchased with donated money, or food donated by other unions or individuals, will be given away free to union members, Wilson said.

Also on Friday, union members received a letter detailing the company's position on the proposed new contract.

The letter, signed by Active General Manager Donald Stern, spelled out the effects that pressure from automakers is having on suppliers such as Active.

Partoftheletter said, "They (the automakers) are eliminating current suppliers from future business by continually pressuring them to reduce prices. Active has had to make four such reductions during the past three years.

"To make matters worse, our increased cost of doing business are unable to be passed on to our customers in the form of higher prices; costs can only be covered through increased efficiencies at plant level operations."

The letter, with copies of articles from the Wall Street Journal, Detroit News and Detroit Free Press, also ex-

plained some details of the proposed health insurance plan, which would change from 100% coverage to an 80/20 plan.


Cost of an employes' wage and benefit package would rise by 6.6%, from \$22 per hour to \$23.46 per hour worked, the letter said.

Union officials dismissed the letter as a ploy to cause friction between the bargaining committee and the union's members.


