### Barn theme band shell will be 'raised' this spring!

A ribbon-cutting ceremony for Pigeon's proposed "barn shell" facility is set for May 26 and according to Strategic Planner Coordinator Rob Steele, the date to open the facility for summer 1991

should be close to "on target."

Architectand Pigeon native Dennis Diener, Jr. of the

Jarosz and Associates and Pigeon Lumber draftsman Fred Fortsch were on hand at last Monday's Strategic Planning meeting, eyeing specific plans (see blueprint drawings illustrated here) for the music facility.

The barn shell, which is designed primarily for use by summer music groups, will be built with a barn theme, coordinating with Pigeon's theme as the "premiere agriculture capital of Michigan."

Its stage dimensions measure 45 x 24 -- large enough to accommodate the needs of most performing groups.

"You might as well build the band shell large enough the first time so you don't look back wishing you built a larger stage," says Jay Dubey, who has researched the stage requirements of many groups who have performed for Bluewater Youth for Christ.

Diener, who brought blueprint drawings and a card-

Pontiac firm Richard P. board model of the proposed facility, designed the barn shell with a two-step building process in mind.

Initially, the stage and storage area could be built -with the rear area, including and womens' changing areas and bathrooms, following as finances allow.

Presently, the Village of Pigeon has pledged \$10,000 of its 1991 budget to be used for recreation and the Winsor Township Board has promised to investigate its role in helping to finance the barn shell.

Says Steele, "I've been delighted with the response so far from the Village and Township officials." Several Village officials were also present at Monday's meeting.

Steele is hoping that local service groups will help finance the summer entertainment, as well as a "pass the hat" arrangement during each summer event.




For the past 29 years, Bill Denbrock has been standing in front of Laker band students, conducting, encouraging, and sometimes badgering them to do their very
