## COUNTING THE COST OF ANOTHER WAR

Will the American people see the face of this war yet? Now that the ground war is over and truces have been declared and Iraq's forces are in retreat, will we begin to see the faces and count the cost?

In the homes of those who have lost loved ones in the war, mothers and fathers, husbands and wives and children are beginning to count the cost. They count it minute by minute as their grief is measured out in painful recollection.

Men and women who have lived months in the desert know the cost, too. For the rest of their lives, they will tell the stories and live with the twist of fate that placed them in

But the public has seen little of the face of this war. The Gulf War flashed through our conscienceness in small sound bites and in quick clips of video cleaned up for television audiences. Carefully managed on all sides by military and media (both Iraq and the Allies handled this well), the war has yet to hit home for the American people. Americans have been caught up in a fervor that says "we won," yet most adults know enough about life to realize that there are never real winners and real losers. Sometimes those who lose gain the most. Sometimes those who win find out that winning costs more than they thought.

The face of the war now becomes clearer as we count the cost in billions of dollars spent and thousands of lives interrupted. What seems like such a clear war for right and wrong pales into gray complexity as stories and statistics

Where have the children of Iraq been? We have not seen their faces in the news. We heard unsubstantiated reports of incubators being shut down in Kuwait City hospitals, but we never saw the disruption of schools and playgrounds in that city or in Iraq itself. Who will bring aid to these children now? Have some been killed? How many? Modern warfare looked so clean on television, but what has happened to the children of the Middle East?

Why are we closing down dissent? Our congressional representatives who voted to let sanctions work a while longer back before the January 15 deadline are now being castigated for their anti-war stance. Have we become a leaders the right to disagree? Are we equating patriotism with one-sided paranoia? Does an all-out action like the Gulf War now become the standard for how the U.S. handles foreigh policy? Will the Western Alliance become the global

What is happening to America's people? Where are some of our best youth into military reserve units because clung to me for dear life.

Where is a nationwide health policy that treats people with that those in the private health care system get? When will we take a good look at our cheap food policy and begin to address the farm issues and food issues?

When will we face up to the fact that one fourth of American's children live in families of poverty and have limited futures?

What about substandard housing? What about rampant drug and alcohol use? What about dead end jobs at low pay? What about crumbling roads and bridges in the country and inner city neighborhoods that are in shambles?

This victory in the Gulf, any military victory, for that matter, must now translate into new initiative. For any victory abroad is shallow if America refuses to face up to the troubles at home. The U.S. needs dedicated leadership and the kind of determination that will turn attention to a host of domestic troubles-troubles that threaten not only America, but the world.

The solution is not found in making war. It is found in making a nation. That's the hard task that now faces us as we begin to count the cost of the Persian Gulf War.


It's a cheap shot to say there's a mystique or some kind of tradition of winning that umpires, referees, judges and others award to one team or group, just because they're part of "Lakers."







# Ubly falls as Lakers win b-ball Districts, again

"Revenge is a dish best

served cold." That quote, which admonishes the defeated to wait till just the right moment to taste their revenge, could well have been the Lakers' credo Friday night as they met the Ubly Bearcats in the district

After all, last December the Bearcats handed the Lakers their first defeat of the season with a 54-52 win.

That game two months ago was certainly in the backs of the Lakers' minds as they turned the tables and soundly thumped the 'Cats with a 96-70 win Friday to take the district basketball championship.

Their trip to the finals started Monday when they walked over the Bad Axe Hatchets 90-40. They then met Harbor Beach Wednesday night, winning 63-54, but found the Pirates to be a much more difficult oppo-

The Lakers led by only a point at halftime after a miserable first half. "We put up enough bricks to build a house," Laker coach Bill McLellan said. Harbor Beach managed to take the lead in the third period and into the fourth, up 48-44. But then the Lakers got into their game and reeled off seven points to take the lead for good.

Craig Sears led the scoring against Harbor Beach ith 19 points, with Reggie Ignash hitting 17 and Dan Gonzales chipping in with 10.

That win set up the finals match with Ubly, who had handily defeated USA on Tuesday night. And before a standing-roon only crowd, estimated at over 2,200 by school officials, the Lakers played what McLellan said was their best game of the season.

By the time the clock hit 4:00 in the first quarter, the Lakers had run out to a 14-0 lead, with 10 of those points scored by Reggie Ignash. "When you get up 14-0 in the first four minutes of the first quarter, the game's about over," said Ubly coach Fred


The Lakers finished out the first half with a 24-9 lead, sounding early the death knell for Ubly.
