## Schools and things . . .

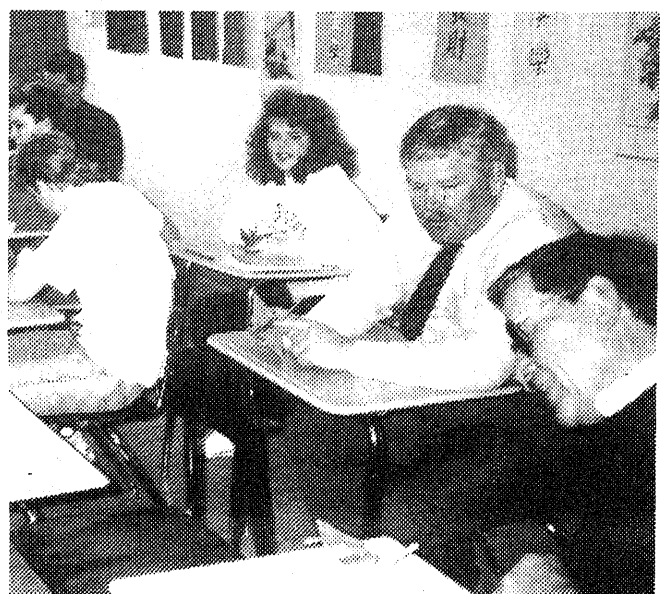

Everybody has to go there sometime, most of us do and some of us even like to remember it: School, the place where you're educated for life. At least that's what I was told.

And I guess I don't have to tell you that I didn't always trust this motto: "Learn for life" -- what does that mean? I learned to survive the test coming up next and I knew I was learning a lot of things I would never need in my life.

"You don't have to be here. It's a privilege," my Latin teacher used to say. "You might as well leave and work with the people who're building our new gym." I decided to learn for school.

Now last week, I had the chance to see some of our schools, Laker High School and Pigeon Elementary School. I was impressed and I realized a few differences.

Basically education is free in Germany. We even don't have tuition at our universities, you have to know. Schools and colleges are financed by the state and the federal government.

As I learned here, you have two ways of financing your schools: the property tax and the per-pupil state aid. And of course, you also have tuition and income tax support for the universities.

At this point PR is starting to get important. "You have to sell your program," the superintendent of your school district called it. A strange idea for our principals, or a rather new one.

That's because our schools would sooner run out of pupils because of decreasing population than out of money. Extra curricular activities have had an increase in popularity at our schools, too. But they haven't reached your speech, mocktrial, band and sport activities yet. Boy, you do a pretty good job. According to the size of the school, the school kids are offered a nice range of different subjects.

And here is another motto of your schools: building up pride, self-esteem and respect. I agree that this one of schools' duties. At least it sounds reasonable.

And according to the success of Laker teams in the last couple of weeks, it seems to work. Maybe our schools have a similar motto, but they wouldn't say so. Moreover equal rights and equal chances seems to be one of our major mottos.

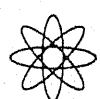
Curriculums are the same all over one state, for example. They are not "dictated" by the school administrators, board or the community, but by the states' secretary of education.

I was also impressed by the fact how many people finish high school (which is about 90%) and carry on with further education (about 60%). Our "gymnasium" goes to grade 13 and only half of the people move on to university.

These are just a few of the similarities and differences in education styles of the U.S. and of Germany.

## Wildlife workshop set April 14 at State Park

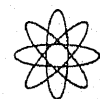

# Know your auto repair 'Bill of Rights' . . .

Your vehicle isn't running right. You know it has to go to the repair shop for work. And, of course, it's going to cost money. Wouldn't it be nice if you could know what's wrong with it and what it will cost before it's fixed and you get the bill? Not only would it be nice, but, in Michigan a repair facility must give you this information before it may legally begin work on your vehicle.

Under Michigan law, you are entitled to certain information and other protections in any transaction with a motor vehicle repair facility. Often referred to as the "Auto Repair Bill of Rights," these protections include the right to:

- \* A written estimate of cost before repairs
- \* Inspect and keep replaced parts
- \* A detailed final bill
- \* Have major repairs performed by certified mechanics.

Probably the most important feature of the law is your right to a written estimate. According to the law, a repair facility must give you a written estimate before doing any repair work that will cost \$20 or more. On repairs of under \$20, the facility must give you a written estimate if you ask for one.

The written estimate must state what work will be done, the price for parts, the price for labor, and an estimate of labor time. The estimate, if you accept it, becomes a contract or agreement between you and the facility. The facility must give you a copy of the estimate.

Suppose you accept the estimate, leave your vehicle for repairs and the facility later finds that additional work, above the estimate, is needed. The facility must contact you and get your permission before they can legally do any work that will go over the estimate by more than \$10 or 10%, whichever is less. If you say "no" to the additional work, they cannot do it and bill you for it.

The only time a repair facility does not have to give you a written estimate is if you voluntarily "waive" your right to it. This must be done in writing, on a form provided by the facility. A facility may not legally require you to sign a waiver as a condition of doing business. Even if you waive the written estimate, you still may specify a dollar amount that the facility cannot exceed without your approval.

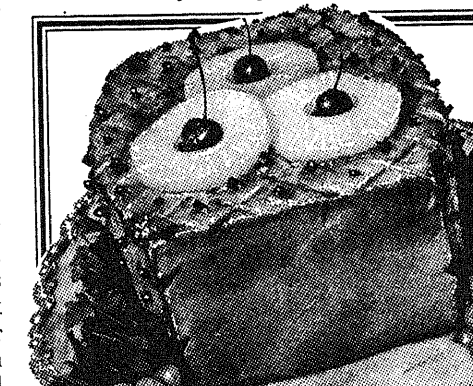
Remember, when your vehicle needs repair work or maintenance, you have a right to know what it will

cost and to say "yes" or "no" ahead of time. It's your money. Always get a written estimate. It's your right under the law.

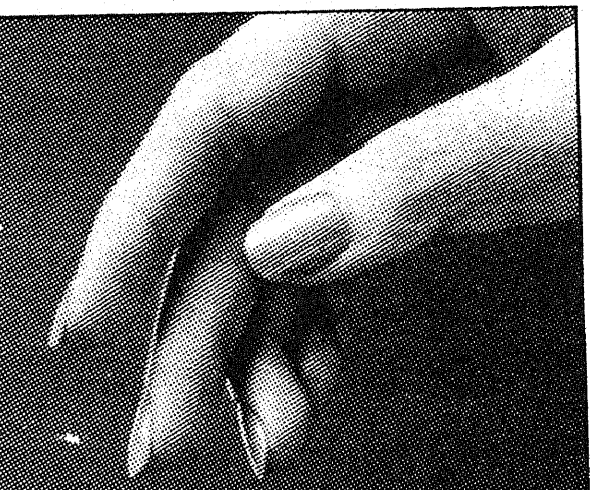
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## Mark 'Christian Mothering Day' on calendar

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## HCHD feted for Farm Safety programs

During the Michigan Department of Public Health's 41st Annual Director's Conference, the health departments of Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac received the Director's Award for Excellence in Public Health Programs for their comprehensive "Farming Safely" and "Farming Safely in the Thumb" programs.

The award is granted annually to the most innovative program related to health education for the local community.

"I believe this is the first time a rural health department has received this award," said Tri-County Health Department Director Dale Hippensteel. "It is seldom small counties have this kind of recognition, because

it's difficult for us to compete with larger counties that have more financial resources and program development departments."

Development of the program was funded by a \$15,000 grant from the state two years ago and by a \$45,000 grant from the Department of Commerce last year, Hippensteel said.

The farming, safety programs were a cooperative effort between extension offices, the counties' health departments and the Michigan Department of Health.

According to statistics from cooperative extension offices, an average of 140,000 agricultural workers suffer disabling injuries each year, giving agriculture the highest death rate of all industries in America.

"Statistically, it became evident that farm safety is a big issue," Hippensteel said. "We worked with the state

health department three years ago on studying hospital records because we knew there were farm accidents that were not reported as farm accidents."

"It became obvious there was a need for farm safety education from the number of accidents that were found."

The purpose of the Farm Safety Project was to develop and implement education/prevention activities which would work toward the reduction of agricultural related injuries.

A number of activities were implemented within the tri-counties to raise the awareness of farm safety. They included tractor safety courses, laminated safety posters presented to area agri-businesses, safety packets for farm families, hazard checklists, safety quizzes, safety decals and posters and a safety booth that traveled to various agricultural events

### THE PROCESS CREMATION

There are two common  
forms of disposition of the  
body, earth burial and crema-  
tion. Although earth burial is  
much preferred in this coun-  
try, the selection of cremation  
has been on the rise.

The process of cremation is  
simple. The body must be in  
some type of receptacle, usu-  
ally a casket. There is no law  
requiring this, but most cre-  
matories insist on something  
more than a shroud.

There are two types of cre-  
mation now carried out in this  
country. The newer retorts  
operate on the principle of in-  
tense heat, like an oven. There  
are no flames that touch the  
body. The moisture of the body  
evaporates and the remaining  
tissues disintegrate. What re-  
mains after the cremation is  
the inorganic ash of the bones.

The older retorts, some of  
which are still in operation,  
produce the intense heat neces-  
sary by means of gas or oil  
flames. The "cremains" (or hu-  
man ashes) are then sometimes  
mechanically crushed to a con-  
sistent size and returned to the  
funeral director or placed in an  
urn selected by the family. The  
average cremains weigh about  
six pounds.

Gradually beat in sweetened condensed milk until smooth. Beat in 1 egg, 2  
Tbsps water and 2 tps vanilla. In large bowl, beat remaining 1 1/4 cups sugar  
and 1/2 cup shortening until fluffy. Add remaining 3 eggs, 1 at a time, beating  
well after each addition. In medium bowl, combine flour, baking powder,  
baking soda and salt; add to batter alternately with milk, beating well. Beat in  
chocolate mixture and remaining 2 tps vanilla. Spread into 2 well-greased  
and floured 9-inch round layer cake pans. Spoon cheese mixture equally over  
cake batter. Bake 40 minutes or until centers are set. Cool 15 minutes; remove

moved back to Huron County.

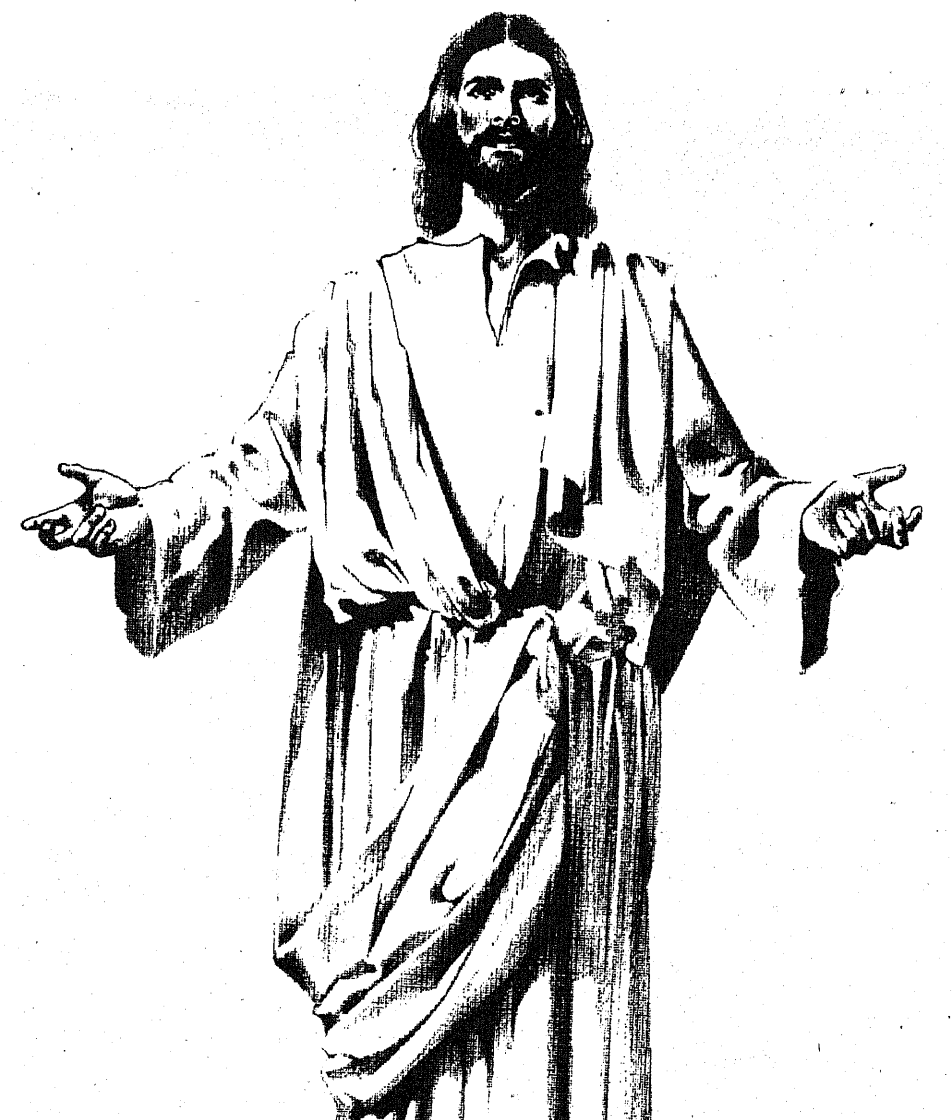
He is survived by his wife, Pearl of Bad Axe; his children,

Now all 4 buildings are reviewing comments and recommendations from these visitors. Remarks range from the very obvious ("neat facility", "caring staff", "cooperative students") to less apparent areas. It is from these observations our schools can develop and implement school improvement.

Our teachers and students are to be com-



mended for doing an excellent job to make this work. At Elkton-Pigeon-Bay Port, we are striving to make strong programs even stronger!

## PEPPERS HEAR AGENCY SPEAKERS

Training continues in the newly formed Peer Education program instituted at Laker High School during the second semester. However, the training has taken on a new look.

During the first portion of the program, students were presented with a curriculum designed to improve their basic listening skills. Topics on communication, empathy training, listening techniques, values, self-awareness, decision making, and interpersonal relationships were presented by coordinators and students role-played to improve their skills.

## LAKER HIGH INSTITUTES NEW GRAD REQUIREMENT

Presently, students who graduate from Laker High School must earn 22.5 credits. Of these, it is mandatory that three credits are of English, two credits of math, three credits of social studies, two credits of science, one-half credit of Physical Education, one-half credit of health, and one credit of computer literacy. Students must also score 75% in math, reading and science on the MEAP test taken during their sophomore and junior years.

Beginning with the class of 1994, each student must now also successfully assemble a portfolio containing the following parts: a statement about his/her philosophy of life; a career plan; a written paper on a topic of history; a written autobiography; an essay on ethics; a written summary of coursework in science; and, an artistic product or written report in the fine arts.

The student portfolio is designed to document writing skills, summarize life experiences, and provide a product useful in post-high school activities.

A proposed timeline will allow each student to complete three of the assignments during sophomore year, three during their junior year, and one each during the first and second semester of their senior year.

Each one of the report, which vary in length from one to two pages, is to be typewritten using standard English and punctuation, and to be double-spaced with normal margins.

Approval of each component of the portfolio will be received when it is judged acceptable by a majority vote of a three-member faculty committee assigned by the principal.

If students are late or the component is initially judged as unacceptable, the student is responsible to remain after school until 4:00 p.m. each day until it is completed and accepted.

## APRIL IS STANFORD TESTING MONTH

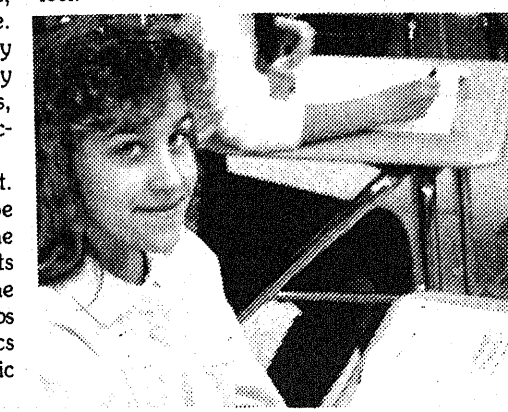
During the second week of April, students in grades 3, 5, 6, and 9 of the Elkton-Pigeon-Bay Port School District will take part in the annual standardized testing program. The purpose of this program is to provide teachers and administrators with valid and reliable information about student performance.

The standardized testing program is but one of several sources of information about student performance. Observations made daily by skilled teachers, counselors and administrators are a primary source of information about student performance. Observations and evaluations of student products such as math papers, written work and projects are another source. Teacher-made tests and quizzes used every day in the classroom are the next most frequently used sources. Finally, assessments (exams, etc.), which are part of comprehensive instructional materials are used regularly.

The Stanford Test is a norm referenced test. This means that scores on the test can be compared with students from other areas of the country. The purpose of norm referenced tests is to allow comparative judgments about the collective skills of individual youngsters, or groups of youngsters, for a given set of characteristics (for example, reading comprehension or basic math skills).

The Stanford Test measures scholastic achievement. It will estimate student status in mathematics, reading, language arts and sometimes science, study skills, and social studies. It will provide a yardstick of broad attainment patterns for a student vs. all other students of his grade in the United States at any particular point in time.

You can help you son/daughter score high on the test by encouraging them to do their very best when taking the test. Also, make sure they get a good night's sleep the day before the test and have a nourishing breakfast the day of the test.

The second part of the training is dedicated to bringing in outside speakers from different agencies throughout the area. This serves two purposes: the first is to allow the student to have contact with a number of adults with different areas of expertise; the second is to allow students to become familiar with staff of community agencies as well as other school members, so that they will feel more comfortable referring to them, if necessary.

In the 1st two weeks, student have heard Scott Meyersieck, local mortician speak on Grief and Loss, and Terry Brown, coordinator of services to the "at risk", speak on Family Therapy and Suicide.

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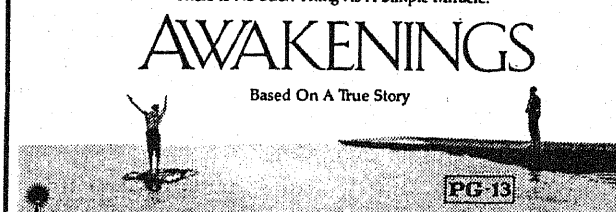

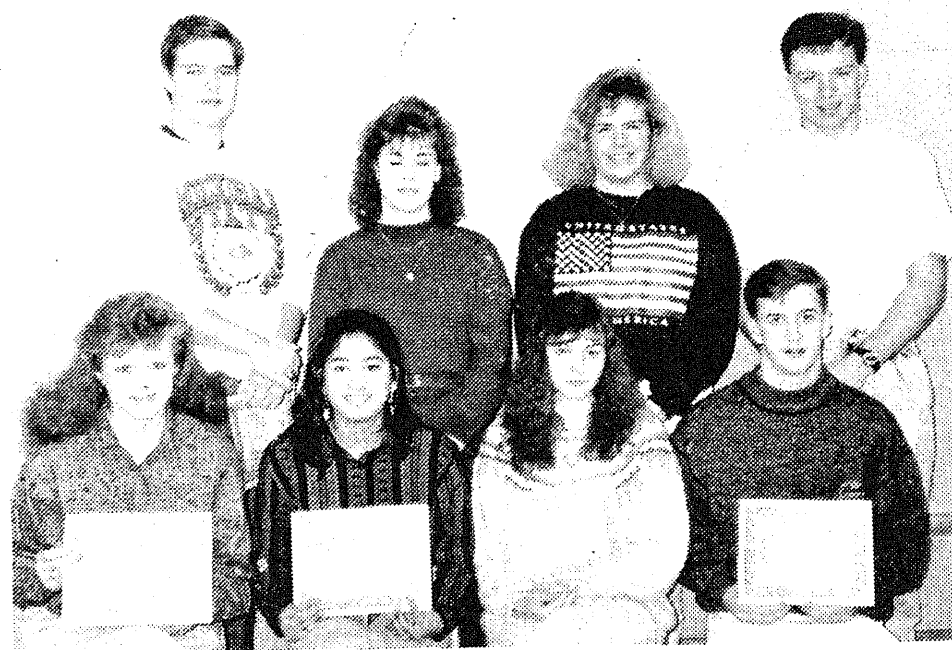

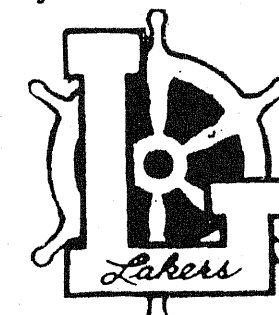

### FROM THE DESK OF THE SUPERINTENDENT By ROBERT DRURY

Many times our business office gets asked the question, "Where do our tax dollars go?"

The focus of today's article will be to highlight the different sources of revenue received by our district, and the different categories that are involved in the expenditure of monies. There are currently 19 different revenue categories, but I have grouped revenues into the four major categories. Also, there are currently 224 expenditure categories, and I have grouped them into six major categories.

As you can see, in the revenue area, the large majority of revenue is derived from local property taxes. In the expenditure areas, the majority of money spent is on direct student instruction.

One goal of our district is to provide the best education possible for our 1,336 students with the dollars that our Board of Education, administration, and staff have to work with. Decisions are made, either financial or educational, that are in the best interests of our students.

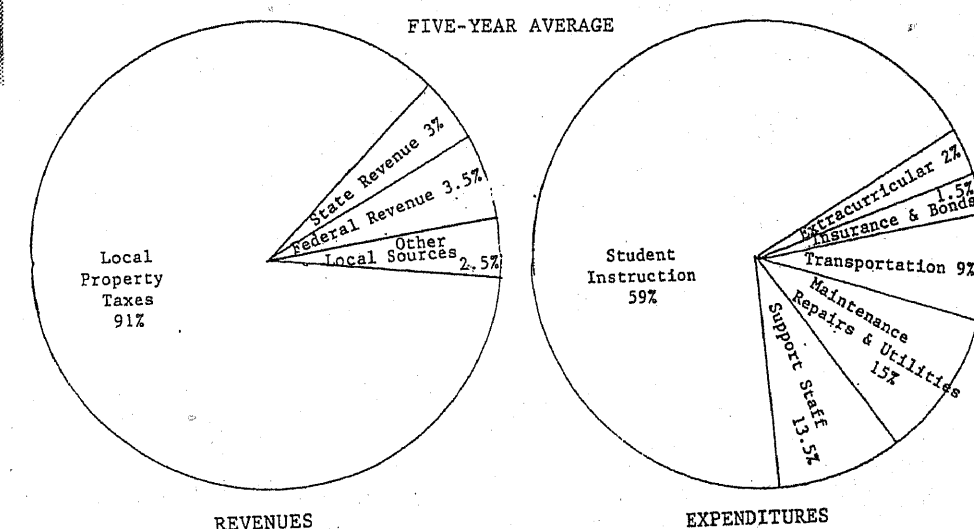

While the above figures represent large sums of money, our district has consistently been below the state average in both revenue re-

ceived and in expenditures per pupil. For the 1989-90 school year, the state average for spending per pupil was \$4,168. For the same year, our district spent \$3,516 per pupil. (Ex-

pensitures of \$4,796,075 divided by enrollment of 1,364 pupils = \$3,516 spent per pupil.) 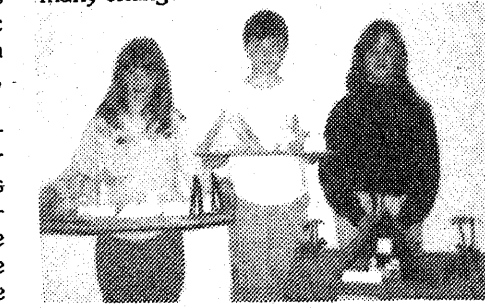
The Pigeon and Bay Port elementary 4th graders experienced a 'Kids on the Block'

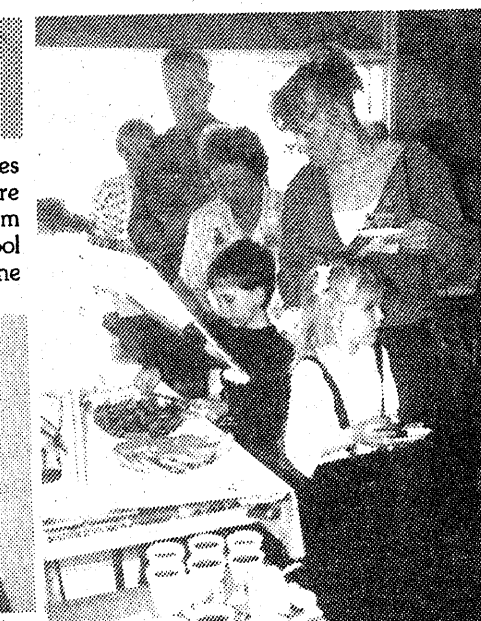

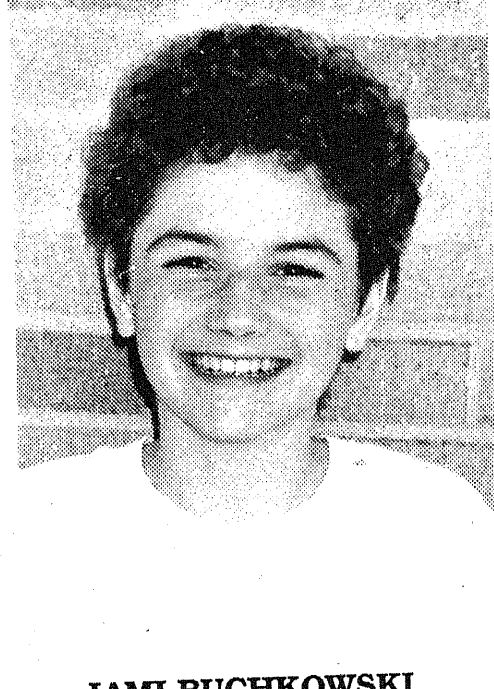

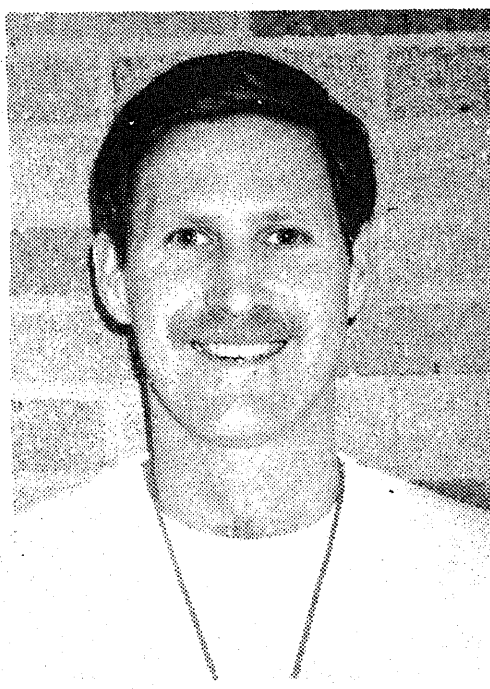
### LAKER JUNIOR HIGH TEACHER OF THE MONTH

Laker's defense team and Harbor Beach's plaintiff team squared off. The three judges called the teams even but were informed by the tournament manager that they had to make a decision.

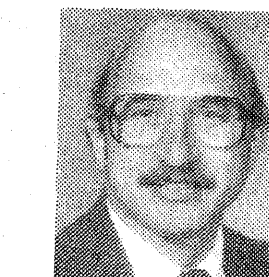
As a result the judges decided that Harbor Beach would move on to the final round against Kalamazoo Central High by three points. The eventual winner of the tournament was Kalamazoo.

I'm writing to ask if there is any way possible that I may get a secondhand copy machine. I live on a fixed income, so it's totally impossible for me to even consider purchasing a copier.

If you could get hold of one for me, Mr. Ross, I would really appreciate it. I want you to see what I'm doing, so I've enclosed a copy of my newsletter and may God bless you.—MS. H.L., Bronx, N.Y.

DEAR READERS:

The following is an excerpt from Ms. L.'s newsletter.

"Drugs, by Kenneth Smith, age 10: 'Drugs is a bad thing to do. When you want to get a job, you can't work because you can't read or write. Then you might die because of the drugs going to your brain. When you take drugs, you might go to jail, maybe for killing a person. Drugs make you lie and steal. When I grow up I'm not going to be on drugs, because I want to get a good job and make my mother proud.'"

I think you'll agree with me that the following is money well-spent. Ms. H.L. will receive a Sharp 7200 copier, including a one-year service contract, two bottles of toner, paper and delivery through the Rahala Business Machines store located in the Bronx. DEAR MR. PERCY:

I'm a 29-year-old incest survivor. I was molested by my stepfather who I thought was my real father. I need to be real honest with you. Sir, I'm also a recovering addict and have been clean for nine months. God has truly been with me throughout my whole recovery. He's also carried me at times when I could not carry myself.

Today I have my 13-year-old son back. He lived with my mom for the last three years as a result of my active addiction. He really is a good kid and has come a long way since he's

come to stay with his mom (smile).

However, we're living in a rooming house. I'm working and do have a bank account, but every time I get a certain amount saved, something comes up that forces me to spend it. I chip away at it until I lose all hope that I'll ever be able to move from here. I need help getting an apartment that has two bedrooms. The magic number for me is \$350.

Today I realize I need other people's help and that I can't do it alone. Even if you can't help me, it helps just to write these things down on paper to see how far God has brought me and that there is hope.—MS. L.B., Philadelphia, PA.

DEAR MS. B.:

Where there's hope, there's a brighter future. The \$350 I'm sending may put a sparkle in your eye today, but the rest will be up to you. From what you've written, you're on the right path. Should you ever stray from walking the straight and narrow, you may not get another chance. Let's hope you make the most of this one. —\$\$\$\$\$\$—

DEAR MR. ROSS:

I'm writing to see if you could help me with some postage stamps and stationery. I receive \$407 a month through S.S.I and pay \$370 a month for rent, plus utilities. The reason for my request is that I have panic attacks (also known as agoraphobia), so I very seldom ever leave my apartment. About four months ago, I joined a pen-pal group for people who suffer like I do. These people mean so much to me. They are my strength when I feel like I can't take anymore. When I lose hope that I will ever get better, they have words of comfort, because they know the hell of panic attacks. I also try to help them

in return, making me feel useful. Right now the brightest point in my day is when I get a letter from one of my friends. I realize that what I'm asking for is not a necessity to the average person, but believe me, Mr. Ross, it is to me.—MISS C.B., Columbus, Ohio

DEAR MISS B.:

Your request may not be important to the average person, but the average person can't begin to imagine the terror of agoraphobia.

My check will purchase plenty of stamps and stationery. When you can muster the strength, I strongly recommend attending a support group which deals with agoraphobia. ## 'Big catch' nets Witczak \$50 prize

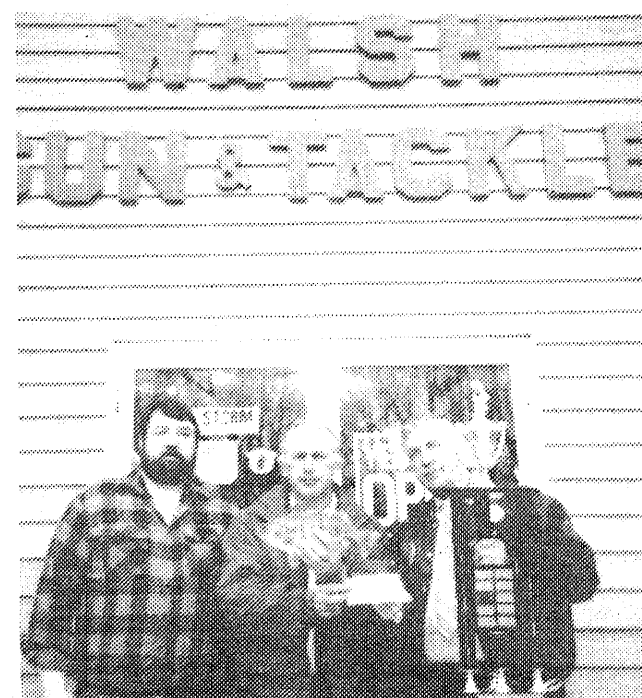
