

A \$2.5 million, demonstration project for the purpose of reducing sediment, nutrient and pesticide contamination of Saginaw Bay is officially underway

The five-year U.S. Department of Agriculture Water Quality Project will be implemented this year in western Huron County, northwestern Tuscola County and in small portions of Saginaw and Bay counties.

The project will cover 535,200 acres in western Huron and northern Tuscola Counties, according to Tuscola County Cooperative Extension Director Dennis Stein. It is 95% crop land.

In Huron County, it includes the Sebewaing to Port Austin area, including all land west of a north-south line two miles east of M-53/ Bad Axe Road.

The study is one of seven similar projects funded nationwide by the U.S.D.A.

Designed to help farmers and agri-businesses in the area learn about and implement management practices that reduce phosphorus, nitrate and pesticide runoff into Saginaw Bay waters, the

program will provide for demonstration plots and educational programs to local growers.

sion Service, U.S.D.A. and Soil Conservation Service will coordinate efforts on the project.

At last week's meeting, growers were given an overview of the project including its origin, funding and responsible personnel.

"The program is a positive step in the right direction, and it is good to see growers willing to work with agencies on ways of getting the Bay water as clean as possible from what comes off of the farmland," said Stein.

As growers sign up for the government program or other assistance, there will be opportunities for them to get involved in specific programs within the Water Quality Project.

Some of those practices will include filter strips, wind breaks, SP53 (costsharing for pest counting and soil sampling) cover crops and reduced tillage activities.

Sandra K. Raffin, 30 of Owendale, was sentenced last week to a one-year jail term as an accessory to a felony after the fact, in the July 18 stabbing death of Mariano Sanchez, 41 of

Huron County Circuit Judge M. Richard Knoblock sentenced Raffin, and the term will run consecutively with a nine-month sentence for an unrelated felonious assault charge.

Raffin was implicated in the death by Ronald F. Griem, 36 of Port Austin. He will be sentenced April 22 after pleading guilty to a charge of manslaughter and an open-murder charge. The latter was dismissed as part of a plea bargain.

Griem also pled guilty to habitual offender, third offense, which could increase the jail time on the manslaughter charge to 30 years in prison.

ANTI-POLLUTION WORK STARTS

Michigan joins seven other states and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in starting a voluntary anti-pollution program for the Great Lakes, targeting auto industry

The program was announced by the Council of Great Lakes Governors, and seeks to protect Lake Superior's high-quality water, work with automakers to limit pollution, start prevention programs to reduce runoff into water bodies in urban areas, and plans an international meeting this fall in Traverse City, to review pollution prevention efforts.

Plans are for future memorial services in Pigeon, Chandler and Ridgway, Ill.





Park. Rhodesia, the name of Zimbabwe before the country gained national independence in 1980, was named after Cecil John Rhodes. We observed the famous pioneer's grave while at the Matopos, saw Bushman paintings, and we also viewed some game, such as, impala, wildebeest, kudu, zebra, sable, warthogs, waterbuck and white rhinos.

Cecil and Lucienne Cranswick, active Rotarians in Bulawayo, opened their home to use and went out of their way to show us a good

They said we couldn't leave Zimbabwe without going to the Hwange National Game Park, so we, along with Jenny Martin (an exchange student from Wisconsin and staying in Bulawayo for her year) traveled up to Hwange.

We arrived in the early afternoon and drove around the park, which can be compared to the Kruger National Park. We saw ten elephants close-up, infact, one came straight towards us!

The elephant didn't look too friendly as he came closer to our car and seeing that he was a tad bit bigger than us and the car, we quickly put the car in reverse and got out of its way!!

That evening we had a lovely dinner at the Safari Lodge and for starters I ate crocodile tail! Yes, I know that doesn't sound too appetizing and I wasn't too keen on the idea at first either, but afterwards I thought it was very tasty! I even got a certificate stating that I ate genuine crocodile tail!

We awoke early the following morning and as we sat in our chalet, waiting for the Cranswicks to get ready, we had quite a fright! A full grown baboon walked through our open door and came close to where we were sitting! Amy started yelling when she saw it and luckily it ran away! We closed our door after that little inci-
