



To tell the truth, we Americans LIE...

 ${f T}_{
m o}$ tell you the truth, we Americans are a nation of liars. And it's getting worse.

A new survey as published in a national book says 91% of Americans say they lie routinely. Now perhaps the big question is: were the other 9% telling the truth when THEY were surveyed, or ...?

To be fair, those 9 of 10 Americans admitted to telling "trivial" lies -- such as paying insincere compliments about a friend's new clothing outfit, a dinner or so on. And to be fairer still, nearly everyone would likely admit to "stretching the truth" every now and then -- perhaps to a salesperson on the phone, a store clerk or even your pastor or priest.

But, the surveys analyzed and published in the book "The Day America Told the Truth" give us cause to be more than a little concerned about some disturbing trends in our society. The surveyors made special efforts to give respondents the ability to answer honestly -- since more than one political analysis before an election has been wrong trying to accurately predict the outcome, when folks really don't want to share their views. So, the book's co-author James Patterson explains that by this truth: 'People say what others want to

Fully one-third of the 5700 people surveyed admitted they had told "dark lies" which are major wrongs that can hurt others or violate a trust. We often lie to family members and friends, but also find the time and ability to lie to strangers.

Several other findings in the survey:

- 86% of respondents say they lie regularly to parents; 75% to friends; 73% to siblings; 69% to
- 81% lie about their feelings; 43% about income; 42% about accomplishments; 40% about sex;
- 52% of women said it's okay to lie to protect oneself, compared with 63% for men. Meanwhile, 23% of men admit to having been unethical at work, versus 14% of women.

Looking at personal beliefs, half of the respondents doubt God exists; 87% don't believe in all 10 commandments. When these people tell the truth, it's usually to say things few people want to hear: 31% have had or are having extramarital affairs; 29% aren't sure they still love their spouse, and even 51% say there is never reason to marry.

Such surveys will get fascinating attention by future generations when they try to analyze just who we were. Although we're not certain the answers those future researchers will get are honest ones or not...
