

### SEPT. 10 CASEVILLE ELECTION

Caseville Township voters will cast ballots in a Special Election on Tuesday, Sept. 10 to consider a gypsy moth suppression special millage.

The Huron County Special Election Committee approved the special election last week, according to member and Huron County Clerk Helen Lemanski. Purpose of the election is to decide a .4-mill (4/10th) request for two years, to fund the gypsy moth eradication program in the township.

### NEW STATION ON AIR

A new FM radio station can be heard at the tip of the Thumb, since WBTI-FM (96.9) went on the air last week. The station, which features adult hit music, plays songs from the 1980s during the day and current chart-toppers at night, says General Manager David Fitts.

Owners are Vector Broadcasting of Chagrin Falls, Ohio, and the station is located near Lexington in Sanilac County. Offices are located in Port Huron. The station broadcasts 24 hours a day with live disc jockeys and does not plan to offer newscasts, concentrating instead on only music, Fitts said.




