Jeannette McDonald was hostess recently for an Open House which honored two important occasions: the 20th Anniversary of the United States Post Office and a "Welcome Home to the Troops."

McDonald chose to honor the two special events together, saving "Honoring the men and women of Operation Desert Storm goes along with our celebration of mail service, since such a huge

amount of mail was handled each day to the troops.

"With many of them moving from place to place numerous times, this was difficult in itself.'

McDonald's nephew, Sgt. Rickey Lee Brown, was one of the troop members and he moved five times the first two weeks he was in the desert. "His mail took weeks to catch up with his moves, but it managed to get through," explained Mc-Donald.

ties, the Owendale Post Office was decorated in red, whie and blue and yellow and white. A huge banner with yellow ribbon adorning it read "Thank You — Welcome Home.

Posters with "Happy Birthday, USPS" were also displayed, along with red, white and blue floral arrangements. A mini white tree decorated with yellow bows and bearing the names of local service people who served.

Balloons and coloring books were given to the littlest customers and adults enjoyed refreshments. The new Desert Storm postage stamp was also on display.

McDonald explains how the 20th anniversary of the United States Postal Service has come to be:

"In 1971, the U.S. Post Office Dept. was on what former Postmaster General Lawrence O'Brien called 'a

race with catastrophe.' Ben Franklin's post office, as we knew it, had become antiquated, underfunded and subsidized by the American taxpayer.

To cure these ills, the United States Congress and President Richard Nixon swept the Post Office Dept. into extinction with a gentle stroke of the president's pen. On July 1, 1971, a new entity, the United States Postal Service, set-up shop.

The new Postal Service was established to be managed as a businesslike public service, self-sufficient organization operating without tax dollars and breaking even

"We're proud to say that after the 20-year span, the USPS has accomplished all of that. Over the past 20 years, the Postal Service has delivered more than 2 1/4 trillion pieces of mail. We have ended all public subsidies for mail service only paid by the taxpayers. Mail volume has nearly doubled over this period of time."

McDonald credits everyone from Craft employes to senior management for making the past 20 years of the postal service a success. She was also recognized with a certificate for her 20 years of service.
