Pigeon chosen for national rural development

What do Ellenwood, KS, Cheney, KS, Hartley, Texand Pigeon, MI have in common? All four communities have been selected by Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc. as "winning communities" in Pioneer's rural development program entitled "Search for

Solutions." Pigeon will be host to a team of rural development specialists from Pioneer Hi-Bred International's "Rural Initiative" next Thursday and Friday, Sept. 26 and 27.

The team will spend two days in Pigeon, interviewing business and community leaders, media representatives, educators and others and will create an audio-visual profile of Pigeon that will be used in future "Search for Solutions" conferences.

Pigeon's selection as a "winning community" will involve a year-long effort by a 12-member team from Pigeon who will spend three five-day weeks in intensive rural development pro-

During these "Search for Solutions" meetings, the first of which will be held in Chicago in March, 1992, the team will learn a six-step strategic planning process.

"We want rural communities to become self-suffient," says Trudy Mott, Rural Initiative Program Manager for

"We want to help rural leaders learn the skills necessary to solve their own problems.

"This is a real 'shot in the arm' for Pigeon," says Pigeon Chamber of Commerce President Rhonda Buehler, who has attended two "Search for Solutions" seminars in the past two years.

"The resources being offered to us as a 'winning community' are limitless. We'll have all the national leaders in rural development issues at our disposal at the next three meetings, and are only a phone call away from the experts for the next year."

Jeff Leipprandt, also a member of the original team from Pigeon who has attended "Search for Solutions," is a sales representative for Pioneer Hi-Bred and is very proud to see this kind of commitment to rural America by Pioneer.

The "Search for Solutions" program is part of Pioneer's community relations program, which sets aside up to four percent of its pre-tax earnings for community investment. The program was conceived in the early 1980s

when rural America was caught up in the throes of the worst econoomic recession in 50 years.

It began in November, 1985 with a national conference on rural health care then grew to its present standing as a single conference for Pioneer employes and local leaders in rural communi-

The six-member Pigeon

AIR BASE PROPERTY PRICE: \$454,000

You could own one of Huron County's best chunks of real estate, if you've got a half-million dollars jingling around in

The appraised value established for the closed Air Force Radar Installation at Port Austin has been set at \$454,000. which clears the way for final reuse implementation for the site in the near future.

The figure was released by the General Services Administration, Chicago, through Carl Osentoski, reuse planning coordinator for the property.

Through improvements in radar technology, the Radar Station was closed in 1988. The 52-acre site, located at the Tip of Michigan's Thumb, has been the subject of increasing interest and speculation lately, with plans for a resort, prison or conference center among possibilities.

The base has two lighted tennis courts, an outdoor swimming pool, basketball gym with racquetball court and a twolane bowling alley. Plus, there are nearly a dozen houses plus barracks. At its most active stage, the facility housed about 300 Air Force personnel.

"The site is unique because of its small size and large number of buildings," Osentoski says. Along with all the recreational facilities, the base has four dormitories, restaurant, bar and office space.

COUNTY BITES DOG OWNERS

Huron County Commissioners approved measurers to put the bite on dog owners to register their animals.

The board agreed to hire a part-time employee to update the county's dog census files. - Were

Currently, there are about 1,400 dogs registered in the county and officials expect there are many more dogs that are not licensed.

Approval also was given to increase licensing fees. Effective December 1, fees for neutered dogs will rise to \$5 and all un-neutered dogs regardless of sex will cost \$7. Previously, the fees were \$5 for a female dog and \$3 for a male or a neutered animal.

Commissioners expect the increase in fees and the crackdown on unlicensed dogs will more than pay the cost of hiring the part-time employee.

Commissioners also approved a "more humane way" of destroying impounded dogs by injecting them with pentobarbital sodium administered by a veterinarian.

Currently, impounded dogs are taken to a site and shot, but a new state statute requires that animals be destroyed in

Kreh named to M-46 Horseshoe Hall of Fame

Milt Kreh remembers playing horseshoes on his father's farm with a pair of old castoff horsehoes.

That's certainly a far cry from the type of horseshoes Kreh throws now, the type of play that has earned him a spot in the M-46 Horseshoe Association Hall of Fame.

Kreh was inducted into the Hall of Fame last week at a banquet in Beaverton, following the state championships. And what a surprise it was, he said.

"I didn't think a guy like me would get the honor of being elected to something like this," Kreh said.

Kreh's only been pitching shoes competitively since 1973, and he credits his friend Vern Beachy for getting him on the courts. "He heard about me pitch-

ing shoes in my backyard, and he asked me to be on a league," Kreh said. "I went over and I've been happy ever since.'

Then, Pigeon's courts weren't the modern ones they are now, but Kreh was the main spark behind their construction.

In 1978, he approached the village council about the project and was told a spot for the courts had been picked out, but that the money for construction wasn'tavailable. Eventually, the Pigeon Rotary Club sponsored the construction, Kreh said, with the Pigeon DPW

doing the work.

Kreh's skill in pitching shoes has brought him plenty of honors over the year, such as being able to compete in the M-46 finals every year since 1977.

SEX CHARGE TRIAL POSTPONED

The trial of two Elkton residents accused of sexually assaulted two Tuscola County teenage girls has again been postponed.

Franklin Edward Apley, 45, and Patricia Lee Bland, 45, of 5180 Stein Road, Elkton, are both charged with first-degree criminal sexual conduct.

Apley and Bland are accused of contacting, teenage girls offering bogus baby-sitting jobs as a pretext to get them to their home where they would sexually assault the girls, said

Huron County Prosecutor Leslie A. Hagen. According to Hagen, the couple worked together in luring their victims to their home in incidents that happened in December of 1990 and in January of 1991.

If found guilty on the first-degree criminal sexual conduct charge, the maximum sentence is life in prison.

The trial was to have begun Sept. 10, but has been rescheduled to Oct. 16. This is the second time the trial has been postponed.


ECONOMIC REGIONALIZATION -BANE OR BLESSING??

The economy of the Thumb is undergoing more upheaval as the continued one-on-one challenge of the Bad Axe WalMart store threatens regionalization of localized economies. A drive through downtown Bad Axe with the still closed and for sale five-and-ten store on the main corner and the now closing Polewach department store ought to convince the doubter that WalMart's effects are indeed being

Even towns other than the county seat are feeling some of the impact. On the west side of the county, one of Pigeon's Main Street businesses, Kent McKenzie Jewelers, closed its Pigeon store and opened at the WalMart plaza location overnight last week.

Big Wheel, the upscale discount marketer, pulled up stakes and left the county when WalMart showed up, and K-Mart, in a clever survival move, is enlarging all its Michigan properties as the giant WalMart comes head on head with the more traditional Michigan based K-Mart retailing.

All across rural America local economies are shrinking as regional economies are growing. Areas hard hit by the farm crisis and the continuing urbanization of rural life are especially vulnerable to the new regionalization of commerce. WalMart, a company that at its present growth rate

will be larger than General Motors by the year 2000, is figuring heavily into regionalized economic trends.

The story isn't new. When the railroads came to town or when the interstates bypassed rural towns, there was a similar story. In the past, sometimes whole towns moved.

Many of Pigeon's earliest buildings stood orginally one mile north in Berne. But when a second railroad line intersected the existing line one mile south, buildings were rolled south along with the business that the railroad junction brought. But these were by and large locally owned businesses that started then.

So the new consumer temptation, a drive from all over Huron County into the Bad Axe retailing center, isn't really a new temptation. People have been leaving hometown economies to shop elsewhere for a long time.

What is new is the impact of a giant corporation like WalMart upon the landscape of rural America. It is one thing to shop regionally in a county seat town at a locally based (or even state based) retailer. It is another thing to put local dollars into the profit structure of businesses and consistently take corporate profit out of the community.

Sure, rural people stop to buy gas in the city from time to time. Yes, we drive to county seat towns for certain services that we can only obtain there.

But rural people who expect the local, hometown economies to serve them when the snow flies and roads get bad think twice and longer before getting totally used to shopping at businesses that place a county's small town businesses into a survival mode.

Local businesses feed us when we can't drive elsewhere for food. They sell us gas, clothes, flowers, farm equipment, furniture, appliances and lots else, often at a lower price and with service after the sale. When our kids go asking for donations for school projects or when churches need help or when its time for the annual fund drive for this or that, local businesses chip in, often giving to a community request

They give out of their profits, not their leftovers; they give out of a sense of pride in ownership and knowing that they

Companies that represent huge fortunes (WalMart's Walton family now represents the second richest fortune in the world, \$21 billion) have big interests. In contrast, rural small towns and rural people value a life that is centered in local self determination and ownership. A regionalized economy of the one that Huron County is presently courting deserves close and careful examination if we are to be a county that is in control of its future ten and twenty years from now.

would be \$49.80. If you used 10,000 gal.of water, your sewer charge would be \$49.80 plus 10 times 56 cents or \$5.60, making a total of \$55.40, plus tap-in charges if you chose to use the 30year payment plan for the \$1,000 tap-in fee.

This change was required by the Federal government, as whenever federal monies are used, the user can only pay for what sewage is generated.

Keep in mind the \$49.80 is a fixed charge for debt retirement. Caseville received approximately \$3 million in federal funds for this project.

Also changed, a residential property owner can use a four-inch pipe from their home to the main sewer line. These lines have to be inspected and a permit must be obtained from the village office before doing the work.

There has been no date set as yet for hookups. The general contractor is still waiting for the seven pumps to be shpped.

Otherwise, the work inside the village has been completed except for cleanup, seeding and minor adjust-

I must add that the sewer ordinance prescribes that due to inclement or adverse weather conditions, said property owner may appealin writing within 10 days of notice, to the village for additional time in which to

connect his sewer without penalty.

Please call the village office if you have any questions regarding the above.

A public hearing was held at 7 p.m. regarding changes in the garbage and water rates for delinquent bills. After the hearing, council adopted the following: a charge of 1 1/ 2% per month will be charged on all delinquent bills.

In the past, a 5% penalty was charged only once and the bill could remain unpaid indefinitely.

Council adopted a new rate for sewer leads for vacant residential lots. The previous charge was \$750, paid upfront. The new charge is \$1200 paid upfront, plus the \$1000 tap-in fee will have to be paid in full before a building permit is issued, with an additional \$800 water tap-in

For example, if you own a vacant residential lot and want to build, the charges are \$1200 sewer lead, \$1000 tap-in fee, \$800 water tap-in fee, for a \$3000 total, which has to be paid before a permit issued.

Council approved paving the end of Terrie Dr. on Blue Water Isle for a cost not to exceed \$1800.

Hopefully, a capital improvement program will be implemented to pave all unpaved streets within the village.

Council authorized the controller to send out a newsletter with all the current changes in ordinances, etc. The mailing will be done along with the next water and garbage bill or tax no-

DPW Superintendent was authorized to attend a wastewater treatment seminar Oct. 1-4 in Kalamazoo for a cost not to exceed \$500. This is a requirement for the village, due to the sewer system.




