It's not easy for a student to maintain top grades and practice a sport at the same time, but Tricia Elston has maintained a delicate balance the past three years.

to be selected as a semifinalist, and hopes that she'll be selected as a finalist.



HURON RE-DISTRICTING PLAN SET

Huron County's Apportionment Commission has approved one of eight commissioner district proposals submitted to it and the seven-district plan okayed will be sent to the state for use during the next decade.

The commission -- including County Clerk Helen Leman ski, Treasurer Roberta Moetteli, Prosecutor Leslie Hager plus County Democratic Chairman Roy Reynolds and County Republican Chairman Warren Krohn -- agreed the new plar does not split existing townships and has no more than 11.9% divergence of population among the districts.

No current commissioner would face another incumben in the re-districting, although several boundary change: will change representative areas. The newly-created dis trict, called District 4 and including Oliver, Chandler, Meade and Colfax Townships, has no incumbent, although long time local Republican Warren Krohn resides there and is expected to seek the position.

And, incumbent Republican Comm. Martha Thuemmel o Port Austin will no longer face Democratic challengers Robert Quinn or Jack Jensen of Caseville, since Caseville and Port Austin are now in separate districts.

DISTRICT 7: Dwight, Hume, Lake, Lincoln, Port Austin and Pointe Aux Barques Townships; 4788 residents; presen Dist. 6 Comm. Martha Thuemmel of Port Austin.

"So much depends on our ability to maintain and improve on a well-conceived and well-promoted tourism program, she says. "The Thumb Area should be an integral part of any

successful strategy."



LAZY MAN'S LOAD -- My father-in-law Dave Shotwell of Florida visited his three children and their families last weekend, and all enjoyed some special family fun times.

As he watched a family member pick up several items for one big clean-up trip around the house, Dad S. called the resulting armful a "lazy man's load." When we inquired about the origin of such a phrase, he said he had learned carrying one big load usually means the person is trying to transport too much at once -- a "lazy man's load" -- versus smaller but faster trips which are supposedly more efficient.

I've heard a lot of phrases in my four decades, but that was a first for me. I've never considered myself lazy (except during a few school classes, maybe) but the "lazy man's load" concept has made me think several times.

Perhaps I always perceived it as the other way around. When you're clearing up picnic items off the beach, prior to loading the family car for the return trip home, I always thought I was simply being efficient trying to get a full load all at once. When our "family laundry folding time" required trips upstairs, I've always loaded up and carried 'em up, often barely able to see ahead of me. In fact, I felt such largecargo trips were the reverse of laziness.
