A Huron County man is in custody awaiting charges on a shooting incident that occurred at 3:52 a.m. Sunday in Sebewaing that left one person injured.

According to Huron County Prosecutor Leslie A. Hagen, the shooting took place at a home in the village of Sebewaing, and a 27-year-old Sebewaing resident was apparently shot with a 12 gauge shotgun.

The victim was taken to Bay Medical Center in Bay City for treatment, but he was later transferred by helicopter to the University of Michigan Hospital.

A 27-year-old Sebewaing resident was taken into custody as a suspect and the alleged weapon was recovered.

"The investigation is still going on. There were people on the premises when it happened, and they all have to be contacted before any more information can be released," said Hagen Monday. She could offer no more information at this time on the motive for the shooting.

The Sebewaing Police Department and the Huron County Sheriff Department are conducting the investigation.

According to Hagen, she hoped to issue charges against the

alleged assailant by Monday afternoon.

This is the second shooting incident in nine months in this the normaly quiet community.

Donald Carter of Sebewaing is lodged in the Huron County Jail awaing setencing Dec. 11 for the shooting death of his wife in June.

CASEVILLE PARK USER FEES OVERTURNED — FOR NOW...

Huron County residents might not see user fees after all at the Caseville County Park this summer. Beach goers should be able to smile this year because the controversial fee appears to be a dead issue, since a motion to continue it died on a 3-3 vote by County Commissioners this week.

Commissioners who voted "yes" to continue park fees were Robert Hogan of Bad Axe, Julia Heilig of Ubly and Robert Witherspoon of Port Hope; those who voted "no" where R. Dale Wertz of Bay Port, Bruce Kuhl of Sebewaing and Chairman Martha Thuemmel of Port Austin.

Last summer the county spent \$10,000 to construct toll booths at the Caseville Park, to collect daily charges for beach use. While this round stops the fees for now, other proposals seeking park fees may come up for their approval.

HERITAGE/CRAFT MEETING FEB. 11

The next planning session for the proposed Thumb Area heritage/craft cooperative is planned at 7 p.m. next Tuesday, Feb. 11, in USA High School Woodshop, according to Supt. William D. Dodge, who is heading up organizational efforts. Eleven prospective members attended the first session in December, and Dodge says interest is growing.

Historic items from early fishermen in the area, including fish decoys, lures and other items, developed by early settlers, are being listed and catalogued, Dodge stated.

Dodge and other organizers hope to develop a good retail sales outlet in the Western Thumb, and perhaps a mail order business could follow. All potential crafts-people are invited to attend and add to the excellent ideas that were advanced for products and sales at the original meeting, Dodge says.

HURON SPENDS FOR ROADS

Huron County residents will see some new road signs, and motorists and emergency vehicles will find traveling in Huron County a little easier in coming years.

County Commissioners this week approved spending \$25,000 for a road sign upgrade program, as first-year spending on the three-year project. Tentative plans are to spread costs over a three-year period, but commissioners have made no firm financial commitment for future years.

The \$25,000 will provide new signs at 350 county road intersections. In all, about 850 more local intersections will need signs in the future.

Many of the signs in rural areas are made of wood and nailed to utility poles, sometimes several feet from the roadway, officials note. Some signs have faded badly over


Caseville's royal students...

What is being called the largest drug bust in Huron County's history has led to the arrest of a 41-year old Sheridan Township man.

More than \$124,00 in cash and materials were confis cated in the raid last Friday morning.

Paul Douglas Dean of Bad Axe was arrested at a house on Ivanhoe Road, after mem bers of the Thumb Narcotics Unit, the State Police and Huron County Sheriff's Department searched the house and discovered drugs, weap ons, money and other para phernalia.

According to Sheriff Mich ael Gage and State Police Post CommanderLeeMacDowel!, seized in the raid were:

296 grams, or 10 1/2 oz. of cocaine valued at over \$36,250;

📰 40 lbs. of marijuana va! ued at \$60,000:

cash totaling \$28,000; and

several handguns, long guns and a machine gun.


Campaign against AIDS downplays abstinence

190 HORSES

"I have a dream. I ride . . . 190 horses . . . at once!"

These words - spoken in low, sensual tones by some nameless, faceless man - is interspliced with fast moving footage of a narrow winding trail that courses through a green and watery wooded swamp!

Man I love that commercial, but I can't honestly tell you which car it is for . . . in fact, I'm lucky I can say it's for a car at all, because for me - the whirling footage of brushy forest, the sight of that narrow path, and the sound of those pounding hooves does not inspire the desire for a car! That commercial, instead, takes me back in time . . .

It was late August 1991, and my sister and I - being in the right place at the right time - managed to get ourselves an invite to an "invitation-only" trail ride. Our rather rugged and robust host for this warm and humid summer evening's ride had decided to lead our small, intimate group through some seriously unsettled back woods located south of Port Hope.

It began harmlessly enough, our eager and happy horses all bouncing off zestfully across a wide, spacious field. The field came abruptly to an end and we descended a treacherous, rocky, slope, splashing across the shallow, clear river running at the bottom. We wound along the grassy river bank, a happy and talkative group of horse enthusiasts, until we ascended another steep incline and crossed a seldom traveled dirt road. It was then that we headed into the foreboding, dense forest.

Shortly after the river crossing I began to notice the speed of our ride increasing in small but progressive increments. We had gone from saunter to walk to jog to canter, and we now entered the woods at a hand gallop. This made me a little nervous, the trail being dark and narrow, and the territory being unfamiliar. But like a champ my horse was pacing himself, using his energy with all the skill and know-how of a well tuned athlete. His breathing was rhythmic and regular, and his skin would dampen, then dry, indicating to me that his in-born cooling system was in perfect working order. He moved along the uneven ground of the rock strewn path picking his feet up quickly, and placing them down again carefully, just as tireless, sure-footed and dependable as a mountain goat. I glowed with pride and admiration at his unquestioning strength and courage (just like I "glow" every second of every minute that I am aboard him!)

It was then that I realized a silent challenge had been issued! I believe our host was trying to gauge the strength and courage of his guests, for wordlessly our nand gallop inrough this treacherous forest turned into a full gallop. Those who couldn't keep up would be lost - and those who could would indeed be challenged by the obstacles which lay ahead - long stretches of watery swamp, short patches of deep mud, downed trees to jump over, hair pin curves to negotiate, and rocks and debris the entire distance. Common sense told me to pull up and spare my horse, despite the ridicule that might follow once back at the trailers, but my horse told me something different. He told me he was up to this challenge . hell he was above it, and it would take much more than

a little bush-whacking to see us ground to a halt! I looked behind me, and the determined look on the face of my sister's hearty horse told me that he and she felt exactly the same! No

stopping us now!

It seemed like a hundred miles that we careened through that creepy woods, since with every step I issued forth a little prayer that my horse wouldn't wrench an ankle or fall ass over apple cart. But soon enough I saw daylight at the end of the tunnel-like trail, and out into a breezy, sun-drenched grassy meadow we all burst forth, tugging at our horses mouths, bouncing and sliding to a halt! We lived!

So, pass on the expensive import car if a ride like that is something you'd like to experience. You don't need a hundred and ninety horses to achieve that sensation - all you need is one good one!

Outdoor Report 2/5/92

Ice fishing success was scattered during the past weekend. Loads of anglers dotted the frozen Bay from Thomas's to Caseville. Reports indicated that fish were generally small and activity light. However, some mild hot spots occurred near Fish Point with both perch and walleyes being landed. Several fishermen reported great results off Rose Island and others hit some nice perch between the south shore of Sand Point and North Island. Ice was generally safe in most regions of the Bay.

Some new legislation recently approved by a House committee would require hunters to remove the carcasses of animals they kill during any hunting season. The proposed law will put to an end the practice of hunting for heads or fur. The bill will now go to the full house. If the bill is passed, Michigan would join Alaska, Colorado, Oklahoma, and Wyoming as states who have similar laws.

Recent surveys released by the DNR indicates that Michigan's moose herd is doing very well. If you remember, between 1985 and 1987, 59 moose were captured in Ontario and turned free in the Marquette region of Michigan's Upper Peninsula. Constant contact with the animals through various means, including radio collars attached to the animals, has provided data which estimates the herd to be near 350. The DNR would like to have 1,000 moose in the Upper Peninsula by the year


