



ONE MAN: 100 BURGLARIES

The sentencing of a 26-year-old Lapeer County man should resolve burglaries of more than 70 homes throughout the Thumb. John K. Brinker confessed to about 100 burglaries throughout the state, including break-ins at Lapeer, Mayville

Brinker, who had a past record of break-ins, was sentenced to serve a minimum of six years and eight months in prison, and a maximum of 10 years for burglarizing Tubby's Hot Tubs, 1215 E. Caro Road, Caro.

M-53 and M-142 CORNER GETS LIGHT

Cooperation among Huron County, the City of Bad Axe and local residents has resulted in state approval to place a traffic light at one of the county's busiest intersections, according to State Rep. Dick Allen (R-Caro). The Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) agreed

to place a light at the corner of M-53/M-142 (Pigeon Road) and the newly constructed M-19 bypass (Learman Road, just north of Bad Axe). "The area has been a concern of residents for many months," said Allen. "I was pleased to help resolve this issue with MDOT and local officials." As new business developed along M-53, traffic increased

considerably in the past two years. This created a problem for many trucks and other slow-moving vehicles using the road to bypass downtown Bad Axe. Finding it difficult to turn left or cross the intersection, many are opting to use the main traffic light downtown. "The M-19 bypass was constructed to divert heavy truck

traffic from the downtown area," Allen said. "This light will encourage truckers to use the bypass again and relieve the stress caused by the area's recent growth." Actual date of installation of the light hasn't been set.

GEORGE BEADLE 1914 - 1992

Long-time Caseville booster and developer George Beadle, age 77 of Caseville, passed away Saturday, April 11 at the Tucson Medical Center in Tucson, Ariz., after a bout with multiple melanoma.

Mr. Beadle served as Caseville's youngest-ever mayor at the age of 21 during the mid-1950s and owned land development and realty companies that built much of Sand Point

Caseville's snow removal equipment was minimal 40 years ago, and one particularly terrible snowstorm paracalled, and one member made a motion saying, "Since the Lord placed this snow here, I move we wait until the Lord also removes it." Mayor Beadle got a second for the motion, which was approved — and that's what Caseville did.

He worked many years for Sand Point North Shore developers such as the late Dr. Clare Scheurer, earning land on the Point's South Shore for work done on the North side of the Thumb's most-popular tourism destination. With the South first board of directors. Shore land he accumulated, he built Beadle Bay Marina and many of the roads off Point Charity Drive.

Mr. Beadle was a self-taught bulldozer and dragline opera-

tor. He once told a reporter, "I look over the terrain and know just how to handle it, I've never had a class in it, but can visualize how it should lie and how it will drain.

A part Indian, Mr. Beadle enjoyed marching in parades in an authentic Indian chief's outfit. He was an avid fisherman and hunter and often guided hunting groups to favorite spots along Saginaw Bay and Lake Huron. He was a longtime member of the Indian Trails Riding Club and enjoyed riding.




