HURON ELECTION RESULTS

All Huron County elected incumbents were re-elected in last Tuesday's Primary Election and generally face little opposition in November's General Election.

A modest 32% of Huron County's registered voters cast ballots, said Clerk Helen Lemanski, among the 23,702 persons registered

HURON COUNTY SHERIFF Michael Gage of Kinde defeated his Republican challenger, former Sheriff Richard Stokan of Bad Axe, by a three-to-one margin, 6216 to 1497. Gage, who first won election in 1988 when Stokan did not run, said he was pleased with the results and somewhat surprised by the wide margin.

No Democratic candidate is on the November ballot for sheriff. The Huron County Sheriff earns \$38,025 annually. HURON COUNTY PROSECUTOR Leslie Hagen of Port Austin won re-election by a two-to-one margin over Repub-

lican challenger Douglas Lee of Bad Axe, 5070 to 2377. She and supporters worked hard to win, she said, and did much door-to-door campaigning and community work. For instance, she pitched in to help bread fish at Bay Port's Fish Sandwich Weekend recently.

Hagen, who was first elected prosecutor in 1990, is paid \$51,000 annually. She has no Democratic opposition this

HURON COUNTY TREASURER Roberta Moetteli of Elkton was re-elected by defeating G.O.P. challenger Kenneth Gay of Bad Axe 4009 to 3198 votes.

Moetteli's support generally came from the northern and western areas of the county, and she said she is grateful for the support she was given. She looks forward to serving them another four years, Moetteli said. She has been working in the Treasurer's Office for 19 years, including the past eight years as Treasurer.

She has no Democratic opposition in November.

OTHER HURON CANDIDATES elected in uncontested Republican races are:

County Clerk Helen Lemanski received 6038 votes and

is unopposed in November;

County Register of Deeds Frances Holdwick received 5999 votes and is unopposed, and

County Surveyor Russell Brown received 4748 votes and is unopposed.

AREA, REGIONAL RACE RESULTS

Incumbent Republican State Rep. Dick Allen (R-Caro) came within a whisker of losing his 84th District seat, but defeated G.O.P. newcomer Julia Heilig of Ubly 4148 to 3291. The new district includes all of Huron and nearly all of Tuscola County.

Allen and Heilig each carried their home counties, but the difference of victory was barely 93 votes — and Heilig is evaluating whether to seek a recount of some of all of the districts.

Rep. Allen, who has held the post for 10 years, said challenger Heilig's campaign was "aggressive" and noted Tuscola County voters did not turn out in large-enough numbers, as Huron voters did.

In the Fifth Congressional District race, former State Sen. James Barcia (D-Bay City) defeated fellow newcomers State Sen. John Cherry of Clio and Don Hare of Saginaw. Barcia gathered 27,130 total votes in the 10-county district, versus 16,919 for Cherry and 14,665 for Hare.

Barcia gathered 846 votes in Huron County, Hare got 261 and Cherry had 245. He also carried Tuscola, Bay and Arenac Counties, while Cherry won Genesee, Lapeer, Alcona and Iosco Counties. Hare, former Staff Assistant to the retiring Cong. Bob Traxler (D-Bay City), took Saginaw and Sanilac Counties.

Republican State Rep. Keith Muxlow (R-Brown City) won his party's Fifth Congressional District race, earning 19,767 votes versus 10,578 for Joseph Mellendorf of Caro and G. Stewart Francke of Saginaw with 7181.



One incumbent was not re-elected and several open seats were filled on the Huron County Board of Commissioners for 1993, following last week's Primary Election.

District One voters gave Republican incumbent Bruce Kuhl of Sebewaing 659 votes, and he will face Democrat Gerald Elston of Unionville in November, after Elston got 114 votes in the Primary. A total of 20% of the 3865 voters in Sebewaing, Fair Haven and Brookfield Townships voted.


District Four voters gave newcomer Alvin Long of Bad Axe 484 votes, to top fellow G.O.P. candidates Edward Draves, Jr., with 320 and Fred Duggan with 242, both of Bad Axe. Long carried all four townships, including Oliver, Chandler, Meade and Colfax in the district. A total of 36% of the 3026 voters cast ballots.

Long will face Democrat newcomer Orville Liedke of Elkton, who received 33 votes in that Primary.

District Five balloters elected Robert Hogan of Bad Axe, the Republican incumbent, with 941 votes. He was unopposed and will again be in November. He got 26% of the 3628 votes in the City of Bad Axe, plus Verona and Sigel

District Six voters chose newcomer Republican Glen Townley of Harbor Beach over incumbent Robert Witherspoon of Port Hope 555 to 538. No Democrats will be on the November ballot. A total of 36% of 3011 district voters in Huron, Bloomfield, Gore, Rubicon and Sand Beach Townships plus the City of Harbor Beach cast ballots.


As we see it

The calendar says that it is August whether you believe it or not, and it is once again Huron Community Fair week! Strolling down the midway, through the barns and especially through the 4-H building, I am reminded of the many good times I have had here, and also of many great successes.

My most exhilarating fair week "successes" have been my horse's race victories, but since I did not breed or train him I do not take 100% of the credit for his trophies. However, I do have other ribbons and prizes from fair weeks long past that I do take credit for . . . ribbons and prizes that - despite being somewhat faded and worn - are still vivid (to me) with the memories of childhood success.

When I was very young my Aunt Linda was leader of "The Sheridan Slick Chicks" 4-H Club whose primary interests were crafts and sewing. For many years I had shied away because I was just about as "crafty" as a sea turtle and I knew it. But after a great deal of pleading and encouraging from both my aunt and my cousin, I finally caved in and joined.

Instantly I approached all of my projects with despair and defeat, and was overwhelmed by all the paint, wood, glue, resin, needles and thread.

Now, I was only one, chubby, whiney little girl in a large group of girls who were incredibly creative, and it would have been very easy indeed to have been overlooked or ignored by our leaders. But I was not overlooked or ignored, nor was my whiney lack of self esteem tolerated.

In her firm but gentle way, my artistic Aunt Linda took me under her wing and refused to accept my defeat and despair, or the defeat and despair of any of our members.

She helped us, coached us, advised us and praised us. She saw me through all of my projects from start to finish, and offered that much needed prodding when I became discouraged or disinterested. She shared little secrets and gave tips on what the judges looked for, but never dared to impede anyone's individual creative vision.

She even made double sure that we understood how to tag and enter all our crafts properly, and that we had them in the 4-H building well before deadline. But most importantly, Aunt Linda never treated me or my projects as if we weren't completely capable of a full blue ribbon sweep. Either she didn't see my crippling self-doubt or she simply didn't acknowledge it, but either way, her unquestioning confidence in me inspired me to do my best, and I worked very hard to make her proud.

That first year I was so nervous I felt like I was taking my work to the Louvre for display, but by Wednesday it was all over. All the projects were judged, and beyond my wildest imaginings every one of my entries had earned a blue ribbon. Many of them, in fact, had also earned the rare and prestigious distinction of "honor roll," such honor roll projects being denoted by additional bright green ribbons which waved gently in the breeze and seemed to say to everyone, "hey-look here, for here indeed is an outstanding display of craftsmanship and ability!"

Well I nearly died. In fact, that whiney, self-effacing little girl of old was dead, and in her place was a newly born, proud, self-confident little artisan. I felt as if I could do anything after that, and in the years that followed I required less and less guidance, and became more and more creative. I entered every category that I thought I could do well in, and sure enough my blue ribbon and honor roll ribbon collection grew and grew. After a while I even began to help the little girls, passing on to them the same "expert" advice I myself had received at their age.

And so it is to 4-H leaders, coordinators, and helpers everywhere who I fondly tip my hat today. This tribute goes first, of course, to my Aunt Linda, and second to all the men and women who take whiney, self-conscious little kids and make proud, confident, young men and women out of them. Have no doubt that you provide an invaluable service, and should be very proud of you own fair week success ... JOB



He was a little mad and we found out that he got over a hole in the mow and fell down into the calf pen! Once we were thrashing out

of the field and we had some Mexican men pitching. One of them threw the bundles any old way. The man on the wagon couldn't speak English so he yelled in German to me to tell that fool to pitch

Well the Mexican who was pitching for me understood English so I told him to tell that other Mexican how to pitch bundles and then it went better.

So it had to go through three languages till he got the mes-

Well what most of us talk about is the good meals we used to get. The neighbor women used to help each other cook and tried to outdo each other.

Once we thrashed at a place and the man sent us to a restaurant for dinner and we didn't get enough to eat. But that night the lady really had were guilty of gluttony.

But for once I believe the Lord forgave us even if drinking and gluttony is a sin.

Village Of Pigeon Bond Resolution

Michigan Transportation Fund Bonds, Series 1992

At a special meeting of the Village Council of the Village of Pigeon, Michigan, held on the 28th day of July, 1992, at 7 p.m., Eastern Daylight Time. Present: Eichler, Gehrs, Smith, Pobanz, Licht, Geiger.

The following resolution was offered by Licht and seconded by Eichler:

WHEREAS, this Village Council does hereby determine that it is necessary to make lighting improvements to Michigan Avenue and South Main (the "improvements") in the Village of Pigeon (the "Village"); and

WHEREAS, the cost of the Improvements is estimated to be approximately Two Hundred Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$220,000); and

WHEREAS, the Village deems it necessary to borrow the sum of One Hundred Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$190,000) and issue bonds (the "Bonds") as authorized by the provisions of Act 175, Public Acts of Michigan, 1952, as amended ("Act 175"), to pay part of the cost of the Improvements; and

WHEREAS, the Improvements are in accordance with the purposes enumerated in Act 51, Public Acts of Michigan, 1951, as amended ("Act 51"); and

WHEREAS, the revenues received by the Village from the Michigan Transportation Fund pursuant to Act 51 during the fiscal year preceding the contemplated borrowing are more than sufficient to comply with all the requirements specified in Section 4 of Act 175

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE VILLAGE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF PIGEON as follows:

1. AUTHORIZATION OF BONDS - PURPOSE. The Village Council hereby determines to borrow the sum of One Hundred Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$190,000) and issue the Bonds therefor pursuant to the provisions of Act 175, for the purpose of providing funds to pay part of the cost of the Improvements. The period of usefulness of the Improvements is estimated to be not less than fifteen (15) years. The plans for and estimate of cost for the Improvements are hereby approved and adopted.

2. BOND DETAILS. The Bonds shall be designated "Michigan Transportation Fund Bonds, Series 1992-A; shall have an original issue date of September 1, 1992; shall be numbered from 1 upwards; shall be fully registered; shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 each or any integral multiple thereof not exceeding the aggregate principal amount for each maturity at the option of the purchaser thereof; shall bear interest at a rate or rates not exceeding 7% per annum to be determined upon the sale thereof payable on the first days of May and November in each year commencing May 1, 1993, and shall mature on May 1 in each year as follows:

3. PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST. The principal of and interest on the bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States. Principal shall be payable upon presentation and surrender of the bonds to the bond registrar and paying agent as they severally mature. Interest shall be paid to the registered owner of each bond as shown on the registration books at the close of business on the 15th day of the calendar month preceding the month in which the interest payment is due.

Interest shall be paid when due by check or draft drawn upon and mailed by the bond registrar and paying agent to the registered owner at the registered

4. PRIOR REDEMPTION. Bonds maturing prior to May 1, 2002, shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity. Bonds maturing on and after May 1, 2002, shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity at the option of the Village in such order as shall be determined by the Village, on any one or more interest payment dates on and after May 1, 2001. Bonds of a denomination greater than \$5,000 may be partially redeemed in the amount of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof. If less than all of the bonds maturing in any year are to be eemed, the bonds or portions of bonds to be redeemed shall be selected by lot. The redemption price shall be the par value of the bond or portion of the bond called to be redeemed plus interest to the date fixed for redemption and

1.0% of the par value if called for redemption on or after May 1, 2001, but prior to May 1, 2003;

0.5% of the par value if called for redemption on or after May 1, 2003, but

prior to May 1, 2005; No premium if called for redemption on or after May 1, 2005.

Not less than thirty days' notice of redemption shall be given to the registered owners of the bonds called to be redeemed by mail to each registered owner at the registered address. Bonds or portions of bonds so called for redemption shall not bear interest on and after the date fixed for redemption, provided funds are on hand with the bond registrar and paying agent to redeem the same.

5. BOND REGISTRAR AND PAYING AGENT. The Village Clerk shall designate, and may enter into an agreement with, a bond registrar and paying agent for the bonds which shall be a bank or trust company located in the State of Michigan which is qualified to act in such capacity under the laws of the United States of America or the State of Michigan, The Village Clerk from time to time as required may designate a similarly qualified successor bond registrar and paying agent.

6. EXECUTION, AUTHENTICATION AND DELIVERY OF BONDS. The bonds shall be executed in the name of the Village by the facsimile signatures of the President and the Village Clerk and authenticated by the manual signature of an authorized representative of the bond registrar and paying agent, and the seal of the Village (or a facsimile thereof) shall be impressed or imprinted on the bonds. After the bonds have been executed and authenticated for delivery to the original purchaser thereof, they shall be delivered by the

purchase price. Additional bonds bearing the facsimile signatures of the President and Village Clerk and upon which the seal of the Village (or a facsimile thereof) has been impressed or imprinted may be delivered to the bond registrar and paying agent for authentication and delivery in connection with the exchange or transfer of bonds. The bond registrar and paying agent shall indicate on each bond the date of its authentication.

7. EXCHANGE AND TRANSFER OF BONDS. Any bond, upon surrender thereof to the bond registrar and paying agent with a written instrument of transfer satisfactory to the bond registrar and paying agent duly executed by the registered owner or his duly authorized attorney, at the option of the registered owner thereof, may be exchanged for bonds of any other authorized denominations of the same aggregate principal amount and maturity date and bearing the same rate of interest as the surrendered bond.

Each bond shall be transferable only upon the books of the Village, which shall be kept for that purpose by the bond registrar and paying agent, upon surrender of such bond together with a written instrument of transfer satisfactory to the bond registrar and paying agent duly executed by the registered owner or his duly authorized attorney.

Upon the exchange or transfer of any bond, the bond registrar and paying agent on behalf of the Village shall cancel the surrendered bond and shall authenticate and deliver to the transferee a new bond or bonds of any authorized denomination of the same aggregate principal amount and maturity date and bearing the same rate of interest as the surrendered bond. If, at the time the bond registrar and paying agent authenticates and delivers a new bond pursuant to this section, payment of interest on the bonds is in default, the bond registrar and paying agent shall endorse upon the new bond the following: "Payment of interest on this bond is in default. The last date to which interest has been paid is ___."

The Village and the bond registrar and paying agent may deem and treat the person in whose name any bond shall be registered upon the books of the Village as the absolute owner of such bond, whether such bond shall be overdue or not, for the purpose of receiving payment of the principal of and interest on such bond and for all other purposes, and all payments made to any such registered owner, or upon his order, in accordance with the provisions of Section 3 of this resolution shall be valid and effectual to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such bond to the extent of the sum or sums so paid, and neither the Village nor the bond registrar and paying agent shall be affected by any notice to the contrary. The Village agrees to indemnify and save the bond registrar and paying agent harmless from and against any and all loss, cost, charge, expense, judgment or liability incurred by it, acting in good faith and without negligence hereunder, in so treating such registered owner.

For every exchange or transfer of bonds, the Village or the bond registrar and paying agent may make a charge sufficient to reimburse it for any tax, fee or other governmental charge required to be paid with respect to such exchange or transfer, which sum or sums shall be paid by the person requesting such exchange or transfer as a condition precedent to the exercise of the privilege of making such exchange or transfer.

8. APPROPRIATION OF VILLAGE'S MICHIGAN TRANSPORTATION FUND PAYMENTS. To provide moneys to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds and in accordance with the provisions of Act 175, until payment in full of the principal of and interest on all the Bonds, or, until sufficient cash or direct obligations of the United States of America or obligations the principal of and interest on which is fully guaranteed by the United States of America, not redeemable at the option of the issuer, the principal and interest payments on which, without reinvestment of interest, come due at such times and in such amounts as to be fully sufficient pay, when due, the principal of, redemption premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds on the stated maturity date or earlier redemption, shall have been depositied in trust for payment in full of the Bonds to their maturity, or, if called for redemption, to the date fixed for redemption, there is hereby made an irrevocable appropriation of the amount necessary to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds from the moneys to be derived from state collected taxes returned to the Village for highway purposes pursuant to law. In the event of such deposit in trust, this Resolution shall be defeased and the holders of the Bonds shall have no further rights under this Resolution except for payment from the deposited funds and such Bonds shall no longer be considered to be outstanding under this Resolution. Until this Resolution is defeased, the Village Treasurer is directed, in each year that any of the principal of and interest on the Bonds remains unpaid, to set aside in a separate depositary account, to be designated Michigan Transportation Fund Bonds, Series 1992 Debt Retirement Fund, sufficient moneys from revenues received during such year from state collected taxes returned to the Village for highway purposes pursuant to law to pay the principal of and interest on the Bonds next maturing. The Village Treasurer is further directed to open a separate depositary account, to be designated Michigan Transportation Fund Bonds, Series 1992 Construction Fund into which the proceeds of the Bonds. less accrued interest and premium, if any, shall be credited and from which withdrawals shall be made to pay costs of constructing the Improvements.

9. PLEDGE OF FULL FAITH AND CREDIT. Pursuant to Act 175, and as additional security for the prompt payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds, there is hereby irrevocably pledged the limited tax full faith and credit of the Village. By reason of its pledge of full faith and credit and if the funds primarily pledged are not adequate, the Village will be authorized and obligated to levy a tax to pay the principal and interest on the Bonds. In no event may the Village levy an ad valorem tax for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the Bonds in an amount in excess of the rate permitted by law pursuant to the Michigan Constitution or Michigan statutes.
