27-year search for mother finally successful

If you can measure the size of the accomplishment by the obstacles that had to be overcome — as Booker T. Washington said - then you'd need a very large yardstick to measure Bonnie Fritz's achievement.

Her search for her birth mother, whom she has never seen, took over 27 years and reached all the way to Colorado.

 $She\,met\,obstacles\,along\,the$ way, including uncooperative agencies and judges.

But in August, her dream of finding and talking to the woman who bore her was fulfilled, as the two spoke tentatively and tearfully on the telephone.

"I was scared to death to talk to her, but it was something I had to do," Fritz said. "I talk a lot when I get neryous so I don't think she had a chance to say much of any-

Fritz's search for her family roots began when she turned 18, and living in Colorado. Her adoptive parents, a farming couple in Fowler, Colo., had never made any

secret of her adoption. They had taken her into their home when she was six weeks old, and adopted her when she was 16 months. But they couldn't or wouldn't provide her with more details.

She first contacted the Colorado Department of Social Services, but was told that records of the adoption were sealed and could only be opened with a court or-

Her search then was put on hold for awhile when she met and married Raymond Fritz, an Elkton native, who was serving in the Army in Colorado Springs.

When Raymond mustered out, he packed up his new wife and her daughter Amy and took them back to Michigan to live.

A couple of years after moving to Michigan, she learned a few tidbits of information, that her adoptive grandparents were from Oslo, Norway, as were her maternal grandparents.

"That little bit of information just whetted my appetite for more," Fritz said. "I still didn't know my birth name or my mother's name."

Her first big break came after her adoptive mother died and she and Amy and a friend went back to Colorado to help sort through the estate.

"Amy was going through some papers and found one dated in 1948, and in it was my birth name. She screamed at me "Mom, come look at this right now," Fritz said.

On that paper, given to her adoptive parents, was her name, Madonna Marie Piper. Bonnie Jean, the name she'd always assumed was hers, was the name given to her by her new parents in 1946 when she was given up by her mother.

The paper also gave up a few more clues. Her mother had been married when she gave up her daughter, and already had a three-year old daughter. Apparently, her parents felt that raising two daughters in a room in a basement would be unfair to parents and children alike.

After her return to Michigan, she then contacted a judge of the juvenile court in Pueblo who agreed to let them see her files if her adoptive father agreed.

"We drove to Colorado not knowing what we'd find," Fritz said.

But her hopes were dashed again when the files proved

to be written in shorthand, and no one in the office secretarial pool would consent to transcribe them.

'We couldn't take anything in and we couldn't make copies. Then the judge literally threw me out of his office and told me not to

come back," Fritz said. That was 13 years ago, and in the intervening years, Fritz has spent a small fortune on phone calls, running up such large bills that her phone was disconnected twice.

She watched every episode of "Unsolved Mysteries," hoping that one of her relatives was searching for

Transfer station continuing

Columbia Township will continue to operate its trash transfer station on Hoppe Road during the 1992-93 year. The township will contract with Cove Sanitation Inc., Bad

Axe, to provide trash removal services.

Costs for removal have increased slightly, but not enough to increase the current \$60 per year special assessment on rural township residents.

The new charge for a 31-yard compactor truck is \$650 per load, and a charge of \$16.50 per yard will be made for partial loads and estimated at the site.

It is \$50 a truck load more, and about \$2 a yard more than last year, officials say.

Transfer station manager Cora Hartman noted more residents are recycling and decreasing the amount of trash.

Using the transfer station costs residents about \$5 per month, while the cheapest bid for house-to-house pickup was \$9.50 per month, said Township Sup. Edward Spannagel.

Transfer service station service will continue on the second and fourth Saturdays of each month from 9 a.m. to 3
