Lake water irrigation project planned

Some Western Thumb farmers could be growing vegetable crops instead of grain crops in the future, if a proposal to build an irrigation project gains approval from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

Twenty farmers, the state Agriculture Department and Michigan State University have proposed a project to irrigate some 2,000 acres of tillable farmland in the proposed irrigation district,

which would draw water from Saginaw Bay through Mud Creek and into a pipeline crossing under Filion Road and draining again into the Pigeon River.

But some critics have concerns about the plan, such as whether or not zebra mussels spread to inland waters from the lake, or whether Saginaw Bay pollutants will be introduced to inland waters, or whether the ditches that would supply the water also act as drains for more fertilizer and insecticide runoff into the Great Lakes.

They also have expressed concern about the effects of lower lake levels on commercial and recreational boating and on shoreline property values.

"You have to be thinking about what's the cumulative effect if we allow a lot of these thing," said David Dempsey of the environmental group Clean Water Action, in a recent statement to reporters

If the pilot project is approved, almost 5,000 ft. of MudCreek would be cleaned out and a pumping station would be built near Filion Road, a water transmission line would be installed under Caseville Road, the Newman Drain from Filion Road to Sturm Road would be cleaned out and 3,000 ft. of the Filion Road ditch from Newman Drain east to the Pigeon River would be cleared, participants say.

The Mud Creek Irrigation District #1 would supply water to farmers in Caseville and McKinley Townships who would pay taxes for the project and the use of the water.

Phil Leipprandt, who farms 2,200 acres of land with his brother Tim, uncle Bruce and father Charles Leipprandt, is one of the farmers who would benefit from the project.

Finding alternate crops besides corn and wheat is one of the reasons for needing the irrigation project, he

"We're looking to the future. We could have vegetable crops with irrigation.

"We've been tracking corn prices and it's clear we have to look at something else. We used to grow seed corn around here but the companies decided it needed to be irrigated and we couldn't do

"We could get back into that," Leipprandt said.

Leipprandt and his family have the equipment to irrigate about 140 acres of farmland, and have irrigated sugar beets this season.

"Early on we have some crusting problems and we irrigated to soften up the ground a little," he said.

This year the Leipprandts haven't irrigated other crops

because of sufficient rains and cooler temperatures, but in other growing seasons, they may need that irrigation capability, Leipprandt

Their irrigation system draws water from the Pigeon River, which borders the family's farm.

Michigan water rights have always favored users whose property borders the water source. Those farmers whose land borders the proposed district and who pay taxes on it would be the only ones allowed to use that water, planners say.

The Mud Creek Irrigation District, if approved and built, would be the first such district in Michigan.

Officials say up to 8.6 million gallons of water a day could be pumped from Saginaw Bay. In contrast, the Detroit River empties 120 billion gallons a day from the upper Great Lakes.

"The only net loss of water would be from the use of the water to irrigate," Leipprandt said. "It would go from Saginaw Bay onto the fields and they drain right back into the Pigeon River which drains right back into the

The initial phases of the project would be paid for by a \$600,000 grant already allocated through the state's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Part of a \$55,000 grant has already been used for engineering studies.

New Owendale water tower in the pipeline...

Owendale Village officials expect to let bids in December for a new water tower, to replace the 80-year-old structure.

'We have a grant and loan from the FHA (Farm Home Administration)," says Village President Walter Howard, Jr. Estimated cost of the project is about \$595,000 with a grant of about \$450,000 and a loan of \$150,000. The village has 40 years to pay back the loan that should have an interest rate of about 3.8 percent.

To help meet loan payments, village residents will see a water rate increase of about \$8 to \$10 a month on their utility bills next fall, when the tower is built, he says

"The new tower will be built across the street and about 300 feet west of the old tower on Seventh Street," says Howard. "The old tower was built in about 1913 and it would cost more to repair it than to build a new one." Work is expected to begin in May.


No funds for Gagetown

Hints for Caseville recycling

Rinse glass jars and bottles well. It's OK to leave the labels on, but remove any plastic or metal caps or rings, recommends Caseville Recycling Coordinator Sandy Goslee.

Place newspapers in brown paper grocery sacks. Don't add magazines or junk mail. Inserts in newspapers are OK but remove staples because this material is used for animal bedding.

Clean tin or steel cans, remove both ends and flatten as

best you can. Remove the labels.

Make sure you have only clean and flattened corrugated cardboard. Waxed cardboard or cereal boxes will not be

Clean, flatten and remove the caps from plastic bottles. Do not put out oil or antifreeze containers. No wide-mouth HDPE containers such as margarine tubs or plastic caps from

containers will be accepted.

Put out your recycling bin by 7 a.m. on recycling day. Put newspapers on top or next to it. Cover with plastic on rainy days or hold it for another pickup later. To help reduce collection costs, don't put your bin out if it's less than half

Recycling begins in the store when you purchase items. Try to purchase items that are packaged in recyclable containers. Try to buy items that are made from recycled materials to help support the markets for the materials that your household recycles. Try to buy items that last a long time instead of buying disposable items.



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
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

A treatise on hunting (part II)

When George Sears came to Michigan, it was to visit a couple of old school chums from Rochester, N.Y., who frontier. Pete Williams and his family had settled in the Saginaw Bay region, and it was this family that George visited first.

He had begun his trip by traveling overland to Buffalo, which is just above Niagara Falls, and then booked passage on a steamer called "The

He traversed up Lake Erie, passed through the straits of Detroit and then moving up Lake Huron, around the tip of the Thumb, until he finally reached Lower Saginaw. Known then as Bay city. Another half day journey by horse and buggy brought him to his friend's cabin in the

He spent about 10 days with the Williamses and then decided to visit Joe Davis, another friend and former classmate. Joe lived just upstream from the mouth of the Muskegon, and Sears planned to reach his cabin by hiking across the state of

He got some local advice from an "old timer" named Bill Hance, and after talking with him, conceived that it would be possible to make the hike.

Hance had pointed out an old Indian trail for George to follow, but after a few miles it petered out into a game had relocated in this new trail and soon that, too, dis-

George was not dismayed, he had his compass, his good health, and a pack full of necessities, and so he continued to head west.

George found the traveling to be close to perfect. The October weather was warm during the day and cool at nights. The bugs were nonexistent and the leaf color was sensational.

If it hadn't been for the streams, lakes, and swamps getting in his way, the walk would have been delightful. For the next 10 days, George

Sears was in a virtual hunter's paradise. The woods were alive with squirrels, rabbits, passenger pigeons, dozens of deer who watched unconcerned as he passed

meeting up with a giant bear feeding on acorns a few yards away. After sighting and resighting to prove to himself that he could have shot the animal numerous times. he waves his hat and scares it into flight with a blood-

curdling scream. The bear sighting was not unique as George reports that

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
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not one of the 10 days went by without his sighting a bear in position for an easy shot. He even met up with, and frightened, a large wild boar.

George reached the Muskegon and his friend Joe Davis without a mishap. During his hike he only fired his rifle three times and with each firing he added fresh venison to his dwindling lar-





"SAFETY, SANITATION AND HEALTH" AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AND TO ADD SECTIONS TO THE VILLAGE OF CASEVILLE ORDINANCE CHAPTER 678 "SAFETY, SANITATION AND HEALTH". THE VILLAGE OF CASEVILLE ORDAINS: SECTION 678.05 (c) (e) STORAGE AND ACCUMULATION OF JUNK INK VEHICLES, ETC.

(c) STORAGE. No person shall store or permit the storage or accumulation trash, rubbish, junk, junk automobiles, abandoned vehicles or boats on any private property in the village, except when completely obstructed from view or Il sides or in enclosed building or on the premises of a licensed junk dealer. (e) REMEDIES. Paragraph 2 and 3 deleted.

SÉCTION 678.06 (c) (d) WEEDS.

(c) NOTICES OF VIOLATIONS. (The term "Council" shall be changed to

The Health Officer or its duly authorized agent shall serve or cause to be served a notice upon the owner or occupant of any premises on which weed plants or grasses are permitted to grow in violation of this section and shall demand abatement of the nuisance within seven days after service thereof. (d) NONCOMPLIANCE; ABATEMENT BY VILLAGE. (The term "COUNCIL"

shall be change to "HEALTH OFFICER". If the person as served does not abate the nuisance within seven days, the Health Officer or its duly authorized agent may proceed to abate such nuisance. Keeping an account of the expense of the atement. Any such expense shall be charged and paid by such person. SECTION 678.07 (c) OBJECTIONABLE WASTES; UNLAWFUL DIS-CHARGES: WATER POLLUTION.

(C) COMPLAINTS. 1. Complaints against property owners for a violation of this chapter may be made by individual residents or property owners. Such complaints must be in writing, signed by the complainant and directed to the Health Officer or the Village Office. All complaints so presented shall be investigated by the Health Officer and action shall be taken to remedy the situation as prescribed in the

Health Code if the complaint is found to valid. (2) The health Officer may investigate any violation discovered in the course of his or her duty, and take what action is necessary to remedy the situation. SECTION 678.07 (d) OBJECTIONABLE WASTES; UNLAWFUL DIS-HARGES; WATER POLLUTION. (d) VIOLATIONS.

Any person in violation of this section shall correct such violation within thirty lays of receipt of notice to do so from the Health Officer. A separate offense shall deemed committed each day during or on which the violation continues. SECTION 678.09 SECTIONS AND ORDINANCES REPEALED.

Caseville is pilot school for state accreditation program

Caseville Public School has been notified by the Michigan Department of Education that it has been selected as a pilot school in the development of accreditation standards for Michigan schools.

More than 300 schools volunteered to become pilot schools but only 34 were chosen statewide and Caseville was the only school selected as a K-12 district. Following this twoyear pilot program, under Public Act 25, 500 to 600 buildings per year will attempt to become accredited with the Michigan Accreditation Program.

Caseville's students, staff and community will be challenged during the next two years, according to Superintendent Jim Stahl. The efforts of the school district will be under the direction of Colleen Pantelis, elementary instructor and George Bednorek, high school principal.

The process of accreditation will include data collection and self-study (including test scores, enrollments, grades student perceptions and data from the school climate) visitation and validation of the program. determination of outcomes data to be used and the continual development of the school improvement plan.

Areas to be studied during the next two years at Caseville are: philosophy (what is believed), student outcomes (what will be achieved), curriculum (including critical thinking, problem solving, decision making and team building), organizational and administrative practices, staff commitment, school and community relations and facilities.
