## She celebrates her 100th birthday... on Jan.

Ian. 1 marks the New Year and is a time of looking ahead and of looking back

Martha Rosina (Winter) Wagner of Sebewaing does both, because Jan. 1 will be celebrated as her 100th birth-

Wagner, daughter of the late Carl and Ernestine (Heintz) Winter, was born Jan. 1, 1893, a mile west of where she lives at 4330 Caro Road.

Although it is her 100th birthday, Wagner isn't going to have a party.

"The house is going to be open and whoever comes will be welcome," said Wagner.

"I would like to have people stop by an visit."

Wagner is the oldest of three brothers and two sisters, but one sister died in infancy.

Wagner's mother died when she was 16 years old, making her the woman of the house. She took over caring for her father and the other children, of which the youngest was four years old. In May, 1915, she married Omar F. Wagner. He passed away in March, 1959.

They had one child, Ruth, who lives with her mother. Wagner has seen a lot of

## Here's to a safe and healthy New Year...

None of us plan to have a motor vehicle accident, however, many will find themselves involved in such an accident which could very likely include a "drunk driver.'

Michigan State Police report that drinking is a factor in almost 50% of all fatal crashes, and Michigan's young people account for a disproportionate number of those deaths on state highwavs.

Traffic accidents are the #1 killer of Michiganians, up to age 34, according to the Michigan Department of Public Health.

"Driving under the influence" of drugs, including alcohol, remains the number one health and safety problem in Michigan and nationwide, experts say.

Drunk driving is a violent crime! In fact, according to the FBI, "drunk driving" is the most frequently committed violent crime in the nation today.

Even with a blood alcohol content (BAC) as low as .02%, alcohol effects driving ability and crash likelihood. For drivers with BAC's above .15% on weekend nights, the likelihood of being killed in a single-vehicle crash is more than 380 times higher than it is for nondrinking drivers.

Drunk drivers face a risk of fatal accidents about 100 times the risk faced by a so-

ber driver at anytime of day. Gov. John Engler last year signed into law a comprehensive package of drunk driving bills aimed at removing drunk drivers from our highways.

"We can all do our part in reducing the rick of injury or death during the season of celebrations. As we travel in motor vehicles, we need to 'buckle up' and insist that all others in the vehicle also

'buckle up," police say.
"As hosts and hostesses, we can provide food, as well as, optional beverages to alcohol.

"As friends, we can see that our friends and family members do not drive when they are 'under the influence.'

"If I don't talk it. I forget it." German is still the language she feels the most comfortable using. It is also the language she and Ruth use when they are alone.

She plans to spend a quiet New Year's Eve with her daughter.

In years gone by, Wagner celebrated the holiday with neighbors playing cards. The favorite game was schaffskopf (sheep head).

The soon-to-be centenarian remains active and still attends Immanuel services when she can.

Until recently she enjoyed making quilts, but had to give it up because her "eyes aren't as good as they used to be."

She still helps out around the house doing dishes and some baking.

And, she says with a smile,

she always enjoys company! Wagner's has a sister, Helen Lindemann, 89, two nieces, three nephews, three greatnephews, four great-great

nephews.

#### Thumb transit study coming

Ecosmetrics Inc. of Maryland won the contract with a \$35,000 bid to conduct a study of public transportation needs in the Thumb. The Caro Transit Authority and the Caro Thumbody Express, in conjunction with the public transit operations in Huron, Lapeer and Sanilac Counties are participating in the regional transit needs study.

Thumbody Express coordinator Jennifer Leitzel says the study will begin in January, to be done in four months.

"The study will identify public transportation needs throughout the region based on the type of rider, purpose of trip and origin/destination for the targeted purposes of medical, educational, employment and human services," said Leitzel. "Services really need to be expanded.

"We have people paying taxes for bus service, but the bus service doesn't go outside of the area when they need chemotherapy or dialyzes at hospitals in the city.

There is no Thumb intercounty transportation service to accommodate intercounty trips, and even services in with some counties is limited.

While public transportation systems in Huron and Sanilac Counties offer county-wide service, Tuscola and Lapeer offer very limited service.

In Tuscola County, the system regularly services the village of Caro, Almer and Indianfields townships with special arrangements possible on a limited bases to other townships

in the county. The study will address the needs of providing transportation outside of the Thumb for those who need to travel to Bay City, Saginaw, Flint or Port Huron or medical, educational

or employment needs. The study is funded with a grant from the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT).



### Paquette is found guilty

During a week-long trial, a Huron County jury last week found 32-year-old Philip J. Paquette guilty of second degree murder in the July 3 stabbing death of Michael R. Gravelle, 18, Sterling Heights at a party near Mud Creek at Caseville.
Paquette of Hemans is scheduled for sentencing Monday, Jan. 25, before Huron County Circuit Judge M. Richard

## Clinton's getting a great kick-off...

President-elect Bill Clinton got several Christmas presents early. Whether he realizes how fortunate he is to receive several of these glad tidings isn't known, but he's getting off to a great start, as presidential terms go.

FIRST, Dec. 21 was an important day to the incoming President, whether or not he actually knew it. That was when the National Bureau of Economic Research announced that our country's

recession officially ended.

It had begun in July, 1990 and finally expired earlier this month. That's because our economy has been expanding for six consecutive quarters, which is part of the Bureau's definition of recovery. So far in 1992, for instance, our national product has grown at a 2.8% rate.

That is especially good news for all Americans who have suffered through this unwanted downturn for all these months. It's a strong signal that the economic "experts" are confident the upturn is

securely on track. Of course, it kick-starts the President-elect's fouryear term, since he'll get some of the credit for the good news that jobs, national production, wages and all that stuff is growing again.

Then, the new President received recent good news that the Christmas season itself, while not



## Reeling in the years

It seems to me that new years come and go at about the same rate that new months used to come and go. Time ticks away mercilessly, and though we name it, categorize it, calendarize it and move it ahead and back, in no way do we ever master it. We simply program time in accordance with our own need to be productive and to recreate—and then we try to live within those constraints.

Despite the ever-popular idea that true freedom is freedom from the clock, for those of us who are sort of simple and "of the land," the boundaries of time give us direction and security. They say that humans have important biological regimens that need to be adhered to, and that we are much simpler creatures than we imagine. All we really need is sunshine and fresh air, lots of food and water, and cyclical regularity.

We often go against these biological clocks despite the fact that we recognize their omnipresence in the animal kingdom. Our failure to live by Mother Nature's calendar often results in fatigue or distress that we are quick to blame

on any number of other factors.

For instance, it is Mother Nature's intent that we in the orthern climes gather-in at harvest and burrow-in for winter. But we do not. We get up, get out, shovel walks, scrape windshields, and drive against buffeting winds to poerform our daily tasks in the workplace. Then we get sick. We get headcolds and the flu, or even suffer heart attacks, and we can't imagine why.

It is also Mother Nature's intent that we "make hay while the sun shines," that we labor in the light of day and get our all-important rejuvenating sleep in the dark of night. But still, we experience catastrophes like that at Chernobyl which occur in the wee small hours. That's because we fail to recognize we are not by nature nocturnal animals.

Women's lives are especially dictated by cycles and phases, but we too are now expected to work around and against them. We pop our PMS pills or pretend we are not nearly as inconvenienced as we are, because the economic cycle has become much more important than the reproductive cycle designed by God.

The rising and setting of the sun, the appearance and disappearance of the moon, the coming and going of the tide. and the advent of yet another new year...these events serve to remind us that though we try to manipulate or at the very least organize the passage of time, we in no way ever master

We are haplessly, voicelessly subservient to an ancient old clock that knows no winding or setting, an ancient old clock that rules the earth, an ancient old clock that we, the human animal, would be much better served to go with than against jp this, the coming new year.

spectacular, has been above-average for most stores. That's good news, too, of the economic kind, and a new President gets some of that credit, too.

Then, there's the fact that our national focus will soon be shifting away from Iran-Contra events, as well as starvation suffering in Somalia, since investigation time is expiring on the former and our relief efforts are proving successful in the latter. President-elect Clinton so far is fully endorsing the active, somewhat aggressive stances of outgoing President Bush's policies in Somalia, Bosnia and Iraq, where we even shot down an Iraqi Mig fighter this past weekend.

There will be plenty of time to oppose those policies and change priorities after Jan. 20, but as the old year disappears and the new one appears, our nation is licking its wounds and feeling better

about itself, overall.

The new President can take credit for all these things, and he got one more boost by being named Time Magazine's "Man of the Year." Time says he is coming to power as the world's top leader at a volatile, unstable time — and continuing uncertainties in the former Soviet Union bear that out. No one knows exactly what will happen in some of these far-away lands, yet we DO know America's eyes are on the world .... and vice-versa.

Some journalists say this is the first cross-roads time America has known since the 1961 inauguration of John F. Kennedy, when fundamental policies and national directions are expected .... and

welcomed.

From our view, the world leadership role being turned over to Bill Clinton is far more secure, strong and filled with potential than any other ever in our history. Let's hope this President, or any other, helps us benefit from it. We can't blow a chance like this to make the world the best it can

HAPPY NEW YEAR! It's FRIDAY, JAN. 1, 1993. It's a day for personal stocktaking, making resolutions for the coming year, a public holiday in many countries, a new start on financial accounting for businesses and individuals whose fiscal year is the calendar year and for some, it's a day for recovering from the festivities of the night before, New Year's Eve . . . In many Christian churches this is a holy day to celebrate the circumcision of Christ, celebrating His submission to Jewish law on the eighth day of Christmas... It's the day of the Rose Bowl Football Game (and many other bowl games, too), which has been going on since 1902 . . .

British General James Wolfe, who commanded the British army's victory over General Montcalm on the Plains of Abraham at Quebec City in 1759, was born JAN. 2, 1727. Although it was a relatively small battle—as wars go—it involved the "thin red line" of English infantry who pulled their way up the steep cliffs of the St. Lawrence River near

Quebec during a rainy, misty night.

Next morning, as Montcalm arose, the French faced the "thin red line" of British Redcoats. The battle involved about 10,000 men, but took only 8 minutes, according to some historians. 1992 was great for Michigan potato growers as they produced 10.8 million hundred-pound-bags of spuds, an increase of 22% over last year. Potato yields were 300 hundredweights per acre, up 40 cwts over 1991 and 15 cwts over the earlier record, set in 1984.

In Michigan, 36,000 acres of potaoes were grown. Nationally growers produced 336 million cwts, which means Michigan produced about 3% of the US total supply . .

Former Thumb residents Erich and Margaret Bergman, now living in Florida, sent Christmas greetings and recalled some of their old copies of Sebewaing Blade, Pigeon Progress and Elkton Advance, which carried news about the Bergman family. Many of the eventful years carried a "2" as their last digit.

## ristmas memories

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This splendid recollection of an era long pastwas sent by Alfreda (Sting) Boesch of Ridge Road, Sebewaing, who recalls the years of wood stoves, tree candles and bees wax furniture polish.)

#### BEES WAX AND ELBOW GREASE

At our house, Christmas officially started three weeks before the calendar date.

That Saturday morning Mother handed out clean soft cotton rags and round, cupsized cakes of bees wax to all available children. We were to polish the furniture. When we rubbed the cloth across the cake of wax, then onto the wooden surface, a film of whitish scum appeared.

That was the easy part.

The elbow grease came next. That meant to rub the wood vigorously with a dry cloth—rub and rub until the surface glowed, not just a gentle love tap, but a wellmuscled massage.

Our elbows ached, but a luster appeared and a faint honey odor clung to the furniture. Every inch felt

smooth as silk. Our house was ready for Christmas.

Our Christmas tree was cut from our woods the following week. We decorated it with home-made paper chains, cut from the brightest pages of the wallpaper catalog. The only boughten ornaments were the 18candle holders.

Each clung to its bough with a firm clasp and a golden ball dangled below it. Last of all came the candles, red and green, pink, yellow, blue, carefully mounted so their flames would not touch needles on a higher branch.

After the barn chores were done for that night, Papa and our brother came to the parlor. My sister and I had already been sitting in the love seat for a half-hour, overwhelmed with anticipation.

Papa laid his dollar watch face up on the table.

Then, with a kitchen match, he lit the master candle. Mother blew out the light of the lamp. One by one Papa lit the remaining candles. This was the dramatic moment.

Candle light glanced off the lustrous surfaces of the

furniture. The golden balls I blew out the candles. sparkled. The woodsy scent of the tree, the honey scent of the bees wax and the waxy scent of the flickering candles mingled.

Amid this splendor we sang Christmas carols, mostly in English, but Papa's Tannenbaum solo was in German.

Papa had some inner radar that told him when a halfhour was used up. He would pick up his watch, re-light the lamp, and my sister and

After that, bedtime. If we only burned the candles for a half-hour each night, the Christmas candles would last until Christmas Eve-or sometimes even until Christmas night.

We would watch solemnly until the last one flickered its last breath.

The brightest event of Christmas was over for that year.

We return, too, O Lord, glorifying and praising You, for what we have seen and heard. Amen.





