Move it or lose it in Pigeon

If you're a Pigeon resident and you've got a junk car or debris in your yard, it's time to get it moved or cleaned up. That's the word from the Pigeon Village Council, which

adopted a blight ordinance at last week's meeting. The ordinance says that the village can enter the property to do the cleanup if the resident doesn't, and put the cost of the cleanup work on the property owner's taxes, according illage Clerk Janet Heckman.

The village police department is authorized to enforce the ordinance, which goes into effect March 1.

Council also adopted a budget for the 1993-94 fiscal year, totaling \$725,000 with revenues of \$387,279 and expenditures of \$386.444.
