

### Raises okayed in Unionville

Unionville Village employes will get a pay raise April 1. Council members approved the 31-cent per hour wage increase during their March 15 meeting. The increase covers the village's two DPW workers and the police officer.

On Monday, March 29, a 7 p.m. special hearing will be conducted on Unionville's proposed 1993-94 budget that goes into effect April 1. Village Clerk Harvey Niedrich said he expects the budget will be the same as last year's budget.

### Owendale water bills rising

Owendale Village residents will see a rate increase on their

During the special meeting March 18, council members approved raising the rate to \$13 per month, from \$6, effective May 1. The increase will impact about 145 utility users and will go towards paying for a new water tower.

The village is borrowing \$150,000 at 5.625% interest over 40 years to replace the old tower, says village Clerk Randy

Also, during the meeting Joe Greene, Farm Home Administration director, give an update on the water tower project. Greene says the project is progressing satisfactorily, but some items are pending. He is still waiting for some title opinions from the village attorney, and some final minor revisions on the engineering draft.

As soon as the legal work and engineering plans are completed and approved, bids will be let. Plans are to begin construction in the spring with completion by fall.

In other concerns, the issue of trash disposal expense was addressed.

"The cost is getting higher and higher with workers compensation insurance, and non-residents bringing their trash to town and leaving in or near village dumpsters," said Howard. "The mess and expense involved is becoming more difficult to deal with."

Approval was given to get quotes from Cove Sanitation and Waste Management for residential trash pickup.

"This would eliminate the need for such high premiums on

workers compensation insurance, free up some needed time for the village maintenance man, and eliminate the unsightly and smelly situation at the village dumpster."

During the Tuesday, April 13 meeting, officials are ex-

pected to decide on an insurance coverage proposal by Wayne Othersen Insurance Agency of Unionville.

# U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission Poison Lookout Checklist

The home areas listed below are the most common sites of accidental poisonings. Follow this checklist to learn how to correct situations that may lead to poisonings. If you answer "no" to any questions, fix the situations quickly. Your goal is to have all your answers "yes."

### The Kitchen...

Q. Do all harmful products in the cabinets have child-resistant caps?

Products like furniture polishes, drain cleaners, and some oven cleaners should have safety packaging to keep little children from accidentally opening the packages.

### Q. Are all potentially harmful products in their original containers

There are two dangers if products aren't stored in their original containers. Labels on the original containers often give first-aid information if someone should swallow the product. And if products are stored in containers like drinking glasses or pop bottles, someone may think it is food and ingest it.

### Q. Are harmful products stored away from food?

If harmful products are placed next to food, someone may accidentally get a food and a poison mixed up and ingest the poison.

### Q. Have all potentially harmful products been put up high and out of reach of children?

The best way to prevent poisoning is to make sure that it's impossible to find and get at the poisons. Locking all cabinets that hold dangerous products is the best poison pre- | they not be listed.

### Q. Have you thrown out all out-of-date prescriptions?

As medicines get older, the chemicals inside them can change. So What was once a good medicine may now be a dangerous poison. Flush all old drugs down the toilet. Rinse the container well, then discard it.

### Q. Are all medicines in their original containers with the original labels?

Prescription medicines may or may not list ingredients. The prescription number on the label will, however, allow rapid identification by the pharmacist of the ingredients should

The 40 new lights will provide the same amout of illumination as the present ones, but will pay for themselves over a three-year period. according to Supt. Robert Drury.

Detroit Edison offers incentives for schools to switch to more energy-efficient single lighting systems, Drury said. Cost of the project is expected to be around \$9,000.

The School Board set June 14 as the date of the annual school election. Two board seats expire and current board members Jane Christner and Burt Keefer have yet to say if they'll run for another term.

Two separate millage questions may be on the ballot, Drury said. One will be a request for funds for technology, building and site improvements. The board will decide at the April meeting if voters will be asked to approve a second millage question.

Board members will be studying how much money we need to maintain current operations next year," Drury said. "We're still waiting for figures from the boards of review."

The district currently is authorized to levy 29.02 mills, but was forced to roll back that rate because of the Headlee Amendment which forces schools to reduce taxes when increases in property values rise faster than the rate of inflation. By Amy Heiden





# Last-minute spring tax tips

(Prepared by The Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants) If you haven't filed your

1992 federal income tax return yet, take note of these tax tips which may save you some valuable tax dollars.

### Contrbute to an IRA

If neither you nor your spouse is an active participant in an employer-sponsored retirement plan, you may deduct up to \$4,000 of your Individual Retirement Account contributions on your 1992 oint tax return.

If one or both spouses participate in a retirement plan, depending on your income, you may still qualify for a tax deduction.

Beaware, too, that you have until April 15 to make a contribution to an IRA and still take a deduction on your 1992 return.

### Set up a SEP

If self-employed, you have until April 15 (including any extended due date) to set up a simplified employee pension, (SEP), and shelter up to 15 percent of your previous year's pay or \$30,000, which-

### Calculate child care expenses

You may qualify for a child-care credit on your tax return if you paid someone to care for your child so you could work.

Depending on your income, the credit is 20 percent to 30 percent of up to \$2,400 of qualified care expenses for one dependent and up to \$4,800 of expenses for two or more dependents.

### Check your moving expenses

If you moved in 1992 in order to take a new job, some of your unreimbursed moving expenses may be tax-deductible, provided you meet certain IRS tests.

Deductible expenses include the costs of temporary lodging for you and your family and packing and transporting personal belongings to your new home.

### Deduct job-hunting costs

Uncle Sam allows you to take a tax deduction for ob-



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tent that these expenses, along with other miscellaneous expenses, exceed 2 percent of your adusted gross

### Review casualty losses

Losses incurred as a result of an unexpected disaster, such as storms, fires, earthquakes or bank failures, are deductible to the extent that they exceed 10 percent of your adjusted gross ncome and have not been reim-

In addition, each loss is subject to a \$100 deductible. Offset high medical expenses

You may take the medicalexpense deduction only if your medical expenses exceed 7.5 percent of your

adusted gross income. To reach this threshold, be sure you've tallied all medical expenses paid in 1992, including insurance premiums, dental check-ups, precontact lenses, and even could result in penalties.

### Make sure consultant's income is accurate

### Sign your return

Be sure that you sign your return and, if filing jointly, that your spouse also signs the return.
