Huron assessments rise \$5.3 million

Huron County's new Equalization reports are in — and the Western Thumb is bearing a large portion of the \$5.03 million assessment rise.

During the annual approval of the assessments rolls, County Equalization Director Sandra Drews recommended adding \$5.03 million to assessments because "assessors were deficient in their assessments." County commissioners approved her recommendations.

"There were deficiencies in certain units compared to my study, and when they don't present me with a study of their own, it is expected that they come up with the value I prescribe," Drews said.

"Without a study of their own, I have nothing to base the lesser values on."

"They didn't meet the overall projections."

The report is filed with the State Tax Commission for them to act on for the State Equalization Valuation figures later this month, probably to be adopted May 24.

Drews' recommended changes were for Fair Haven, Gore, Huron, Meade, Pointe Aux Barques and Port Austin Townships.

Seeing the largest increase is Port Austin Township with additions of \$1.7 million to residential values.

Also, Drews recommended changes for Fair Haven Township for additions of

\$530,082 to ag and \$330,141 to residential.

Fair Haven Township Supervisor/Assessor William Forge wasn't able to comment on Drews assessment changes because the wasn't

aware of them.

Port Austin Supervisor/Assessor Marvin Goretski said he realizes he didn't meet Drews projected figures.

"I had to come up \$7 million and I couldn't get it," said Goretski.

"I suppose some will say I didn't do a good assessment job, but I did what I thought was right by using figures I got from sale and prices of lake-front footage land values.

"I'm not going to fight the change, but I'm going to campaign long and hard for the June 2 sales tax amendment. That is the only way for homeowners to get a property tax break."

Goretski noted increased rates that people will pay for homes is a factor in the high assessment increase.

"People from the cities are paying high prices. It's been going wild up here. People are paying over \$1,000 a foot for lake-front property."

Huron County's proposed SEV increased by \$94.1 million of real and personal property from last year. This year's SEV is \$859.9 million, which is up from last year's \$765.8 million because of new construction and increased values, noted Drews.

However, the June 2 ballot issue on on revamping property taxes, could change the impact of assessments and taxes.

"If it comes on for the next year, there won't be much time to do re-figuring," Drews noted.

"Also if there are no tax bills levied because of having to go back and re-figure, will that mean that the village, townships and counties have to borrow money to be able to run their government? School districts are forced to do that in a lot of instances, to borrow money against tax anticipation until collections."

Tour includes Thumb stops

MSU's Extension Office will host a second Saginaw Bay Area Development Tour this Friday, for community leaders and persons interested in tourism development.

According to Dr. Mary Wahl, MSU District Extension Agent for Community and Economic Development of the Saginaw Bay Area, purpose of the tours is to provide an opportunity for community leaders from Huron, Tuscola, Saginaw, Bay, Arenac and Iosco Counties to learn how neighboring areas have planned and secured funding for recreation and tourism development projects, both public and private development, as well as what the projects mean to the Saginaw Bay Area.

The tour includes: Bay City River front development, Rowing Club facility, National Environmental Super-computer Center, EPA Research center and historic downtown preservation; development of Cass River in Tuscola County and plans for an Ag Heritage Park, the round barn in Gagetown, Pigeon Barn Shell, Huron County's Wilderness Arboretum, proposed Port Austin marina expansion and Port Austin Air Force Base conversion to recreational use.

Last Friday the group toured Saginaw River front development, the Saginaw Park system, CIESEN's development; Arenac County's marina and golf course developments, discussion of Charity Island development; Iosco Refuge and Scenic Byway on the AuSable River.

Drain cleaning in Pigeon?

Jacobs Drain may finally get a good cleaning this year, if the Pigeon Village Council approves the project next month.

At last week's meeting, Huron County Drain Commissioner Vern Rounds and engineers Bob Tufts and Gary Osminksi discussed plans to clean the drain with the council.

Cost of the project would be \$191,500, with the village shouldering \$154,000 of that cost. The rest of the cost would be shared by Winsor Township, the Michigan Department of Transportation, the Road Commission and Huron and Eastern Railway, according to Clerk Janet Heckman.

Council will decide at next month's meeting whether or not to proceed with the project.

Huron's kiosks ready to tell tourism story

What in the world is an "Information Kiosk?"

Soon, residents and tourists in the Huron County towns of Sebewaing, Pigeon, Caseville and Bad Axe will be the first to experience the easy accessibility of county-wide information with the first kiosks now ready for delivery.

These six-sided tourist information structures were the brainchild of strategic planner Rob Steele of Pigeon — who had a vision of tying the communities of Huron County together with "information booths" that could serve as stepping-stones between the communities, and encourage more tourism co-

operation between shoreline and inland towns.

He enlisted the support of the Huron County Council of Chambers and decided the best way to accomplish the project was to let students tackle the construction of the kiosks, following detailed blueprints made up by Fred Fortsch, architect for Pigeon/Caseville Lumber & Supply Co.

Ron Klebba, director of the Construction Trades class at the Huron Intermediate School District, enthusiastically embraced the project, says Steele, because of the community value of the project and the "buy-in" his students could feel with the kiosks they were supplying

to their own communities. "By any measure, the kiosks are a professionally designed and constructed structure that will provide many years of service," adds Steele.

The kiosks were completed for \$786 each, including a \$100 donation to the HISD "VICA Student Fund" for each kiosk built by the students.

This price does not include any enhancements to the display surfaces which will be done by each individual community. Each community also has the responsibility of staining its own kiosk, hopefully with a color to be decided upon by the Huron County communities as a group.

This kiosk project has attracted the attention of officials outside the Huron County Area, including Michigan State University Extension specialist Dr. Ed Mahoney who says, "Huron County is one of only a few counties in the state that has demonstrated the ability to cooperatively market to tourists."

"The kiosks are one important element of this cooperative marketing strategy."

34th Dist. State Sen. Joel Cougeon (R-Bay City) wrote a personal letter to Steele,

saying, "I want to commend you for your promotion of the kiosk idea in the Thumb area."

"It is always nice to have the tourism trade in our beautiful Saginaw Bay Area improved upon. I think that the information stands will be an important asset to people from out-of-town who are touring the Huron County cities."

"Everyone should appreciate the easy access to information about the cities they are visiting. Congratulations on your new project, and good luck."

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Muellerweiss Park planning continues

Two days of planning for the downtown riverside Muellerweiss Park were held last week by various Sebewaing village groups to prepare a final proposal for design and construction.

Wendy Fry of Harley Ellington Pierce Yee Associates, Inc. of Southfield, conducted meetings with council members, Chamber of Commerce, residents, neighbors and interested individuals.

Fry, the project site planner/landscape architect who has been here numerous times to gain information and accept opinions, explained HEPPY's involvement and goals.

She said she wants residents' opinions of "what you want the park to do and how to do it."

That would include developing "the mood the council wants the park to set to fit in with the rest of the town."

She was introduced by David Wineman, member of the village parks and recreation committee. In a letter to Wineman, HEPPY called the riverside park "an important step in creating a waterfront destination... assisting in bringing people and year-round activities to the downtown."

Council President Lloyd Adam said he feels that the downtown park area should "give you a relaxed feeling."

Through the series of meetings during the two days, a sizable list of needs and goals was developed.

Here are some of the ideas offered:

■ Emphasize the historic background of the site (It is

the site of the first store, owned by John Muellerweiss);

■ Develop a fishing or nautical motif;

■ As the meetings progressed, it appeared that a major village problem might well be incorporated in the park project. The problem is the difficult traffic situation at the W. Sebewaing/Center Street intersection, and the risk caused by the low-lying W. Sebewaing Street and the

high cement sides of Center Street Bridge.

One suggestion was a "street bump out" for the north side, and permit only one-way west-bound traffic from the intersection for one block from Center to Second Street. That would enlarge the size of the park and eliminate the long-time traffic hazard;

■ Include a "relaxation" area, around the bell tower with its chimes.

Husband John Diener has faithfully dropped off Dorothy's writings at our office every Monday morning for many years. He ALWAYS had a sweet candy treat for most of the office staff, and a friendly smile. John, you're welcome to keep stopping in — just to chat and say "hi." And it's OUR turn to give YOU a piece of candy.

before the council with revised site plans for the Country Bay Village retirement community. Those plans will now go to the planning and zoning commission, which will make a recommendation to council.

In other business, Pigeon Council:

- Adopted a resolution regarding refinancing the village's water tower, which would save the village over \$30,000;
- Gave permission to Pigeon Telephone Co. to install fiber optic cables along Michigan Ave. at the west village limits;
- Adopted a bloodborne pathogen policy for the police department, and
- Set the 1993-94 millage rate at 14.3245 mills, the same rate as last year's.

Fire department report

Fire departments were busy Thursday battling two blazes

■ A passerby reported a barn fire about noon at the Roger Fritz home on Caseville Road one mile north of Owendale, which resulted in \$250,000 in damages.

About 40 fire fighters from Owendale, Sebewaing, Gagetown and Winsor Fire Departments responded.

Preliminary reports blame faulty wiring in the blaze that destroyed one barn, severely damaged another and caused heat damage to the house.

Last in the fire were about 1,000 bales of hay, about 30 tons of feed, some machinery, but area residents helped in rescuing 45 heifers from the burning barn.

■ At about 12:30 p.m. a fire at the Mike Kunisch residence on Huron Line Road was reported.

Sebewaing and Unionville Fire Departments were able to contain the fire to the barn roof before significant damage was done.

Preliminary reports indicate the fire was started when sparks from a burn barrel carried to the barn's roof. No estimate of damage was available.

Sometimes it seems like everything happens at once. Last Monday, May 10, was such a day for the Elkton-Oliver Fire Department and Elkton Ambulance. Firefighters and ambulance crews were called out on three different calls, two within yards of the other and the third only a block away.

■ First, about 2:30 p.m. firemen responded to a lawn-mower fire on Jessie Street, just a few feet from M-142. The riding mower, owned by Francis Jackson, was completely destroyed.

■ Then just before 5 p.m., firefighters and the ambulance were called to the scene of a motorcycle accident on M-142, just west of Jessie Street. Jerry Wiederhold was riding his motorcycle east on M-142 when a car driven by Mary Lepprandt of Pigeon struck the cycle while attempting a left turn. He was taken to Huron Memorial Hospital in Bad Axe, then transferred to St. Mary's Medical Center in Saginaw where he was admitted to the neurological intensive care unit with critical injuries.

Lepprandt told Huron County's Sheriff's Department deputies that she didn't see Wiederhold because of glare from the late afternoon sun.

■ Later that same evening, just after 11 p.m., the fire department and ambulance crews again answered the emergency whistle, this time to the home of Bernie and Sandy Zeidler on S. Main Street. There they found Zeidler's old storage barn behind the house engulfed in flames.

Bernie Zeidler's stepson, Brad Krohn, was working on his motorcycle in the barn when the fire broke out. Krohn was burned on the arms and nose when he tried to re-enter the burning barn to save his 1978 Thunderbird. Zeidler's 34-ft. motorhome was destroyed in the fire, along with the car and the motorcycle.

Krohn was taken to Huron Memorial Hospital by ambulance, then transferred to the burn unit at St. Mary's Medical Center in Saginaw. No damage estimate was available, but most items were covered by insurance, Zeidler said.

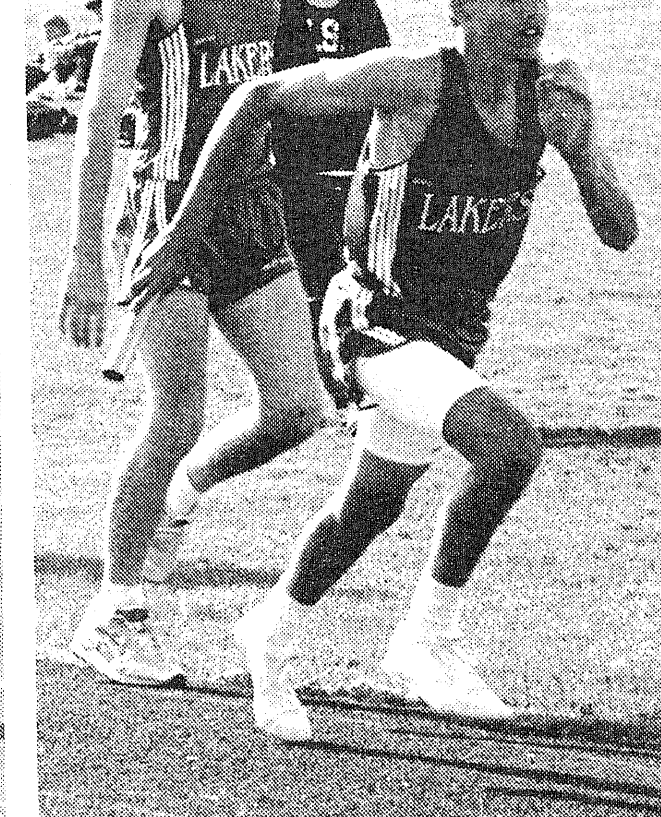
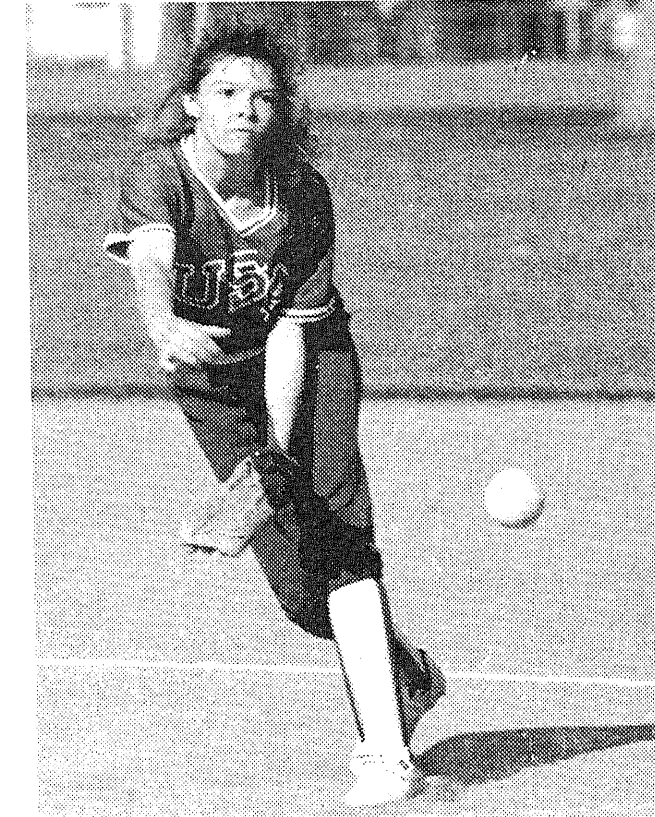
The Laker Tennis Team finished in second place at the Blue Water Invitational on May 8, with Port Huron Northern winning the title with 22 points.
