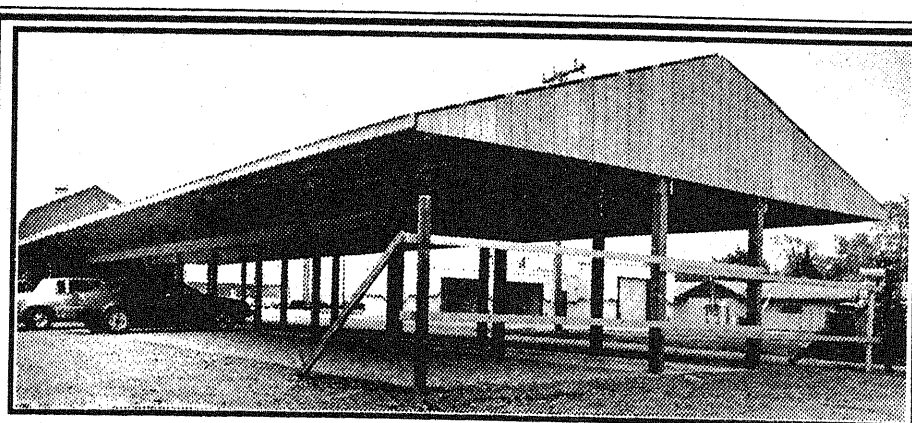

## Pigeon's Polewach store closing July 3

**POLEWACH'S CLOSING:** For 60 years, western Thumb residents have been shopping at the Polewach Store in Downtown Pigeon.

But that long tradition will come to an end on July 3, when the company closes the doors on its Pigeon store.

The Polewach Department Store chain was established in Minden City in 1926 by W.R. Polewacz. The Pigeon store was one of the first branch stores in the chain, occupying the Fred Clabuesch building.

In time, long time managers Mel and Dorothy Baerwolf added the former Siewert building to the south, in addition to the Budget Center a block away. The Baerwolfs retired



in 1983.

Polewach's Budget Cen-

ter closed in 1992, and the main store is set to follow suit. Manger Jerry Priebe

said current economic conditions forced the closing of the store.

## Oliver to vote July 20

Oliver Township voters will go to the polls Tuesday, July 20 to decide on two millage renewal questions. Ballot proposals are:

- renewal of 1 mill for five years to resurface roads, and
- renewal of 1 mill for five years for fire and ambulance service, says Gloria Laughlin, Huron County chief deputy clerk.

## Will Unionville get grant?

Unionville Village Council members should know by Friday, June 4, if they will receive funding for an upgraded water system.

Earlier this month, Council conducted a door-to-door survey to gather necessary information to apply for a \$500,000 state grant to revamp the water system.

Also, Lisa Herrington of the state Department of Public Health told Council what the village has to do to comply with state drinking water regulations.

"There isn't a problem with the water, but we have an antiquated system," says village Clerk Harvey Niedrich. "What the state would like is for us to put up a tower and to replace one-inch mains with bigger mains, plus loop all of the dead-end mains."

"They aren't forcing us to comply at this point, but the regulations are there and we will have to comply."

The village has a pressurized system with horizontal tanks rather than a water tower. It was built in the 1950s. Unionville has to develop a plan and start working towards meeting regulations. In other Unionville business:

■ Scott Schember and Tom Bignall were accepted as fire department members, and approval was given to do \$840 in repairs to fire department equipment.

■ Contract of village police officer William Owens was renewed as a part-time employee with a reduction of benefits.

■ At the 7 p.m. Monday, June 21, council members are expected to award street work bids and decide on which streets to upgrade this summer

## Sebawaing oks park plans

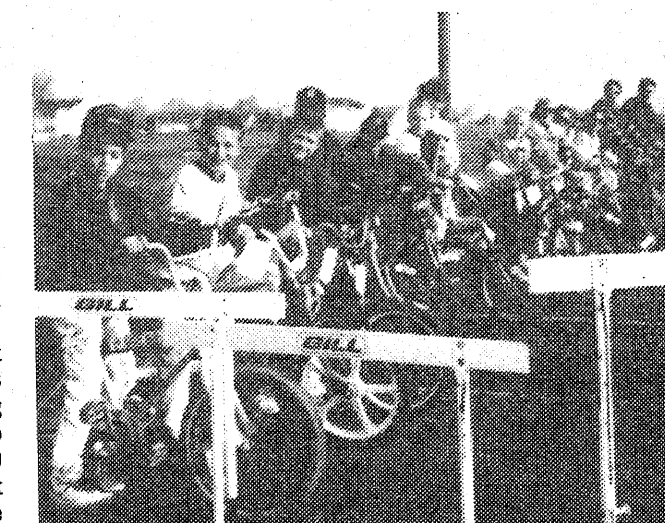
Sebawaing Village Council approved a contract Monday evening for HEPP—Harley Ellington Pierce Yee Associates of Southfield—to complete the studies they began and to provide plans and drawings for the completion of Muellerweiss Park in downtown Sebawaing.

Cost will be \$3,500, which will come from an earlier grant, and from Sebawaing Township and Village.

Now that HEPP has completed the two-day series of studies and meetings to develop a concept, the architecture/engineering/planning firm will develop the final master plan, which will become the basis for design development and construction documents.

There will be reviews and refinements and then village officials will have a view of the final site master plan, prior to construction.

## As we see it

### While Proposal 'A' isn't perfect, it's the best we've got

Michigan voters go to the polls next Wednesday, June 2, to finally decide the fate of State Proposal "A," which we've all seen and heard about for two months. This is a compromise proposal which, while not perfect, deserves your "yes" vote.

Bi-partisan support is strong for this measure, which would cut (and more closely equalize) property taxes while raising the state sales tax by 2 cents (which equals a 50% increase), to 6 cents on each dollar. Those extra 2 cents would go strictly for educational support, and that's good. What's extremely sad in the Proposal A discussion is the public's overall distrust of our elected Lansing officials. The majority of state residents, who are undecided or who oppose Proposal A at this time, do so because they're certain they'll again be duped, as they were when Lottery funds were promised for education a decade ago.

Shame on our legislators. They've earned this distrust. Yet even sadder is our current method of financing our local educational systems. Too many users of our schools, including renters and non-property owners, have never directly paid for their support. And the fact that Michigan's 4% sales tax is lower than the national average of 6% doesn't mean we should raise it to get closer to others. The per-pupil guarantee of \$4,800 annually will begin to

bring schools out of the chaos of local millage elections, and should allow educators to concentrate on their first commitment.

While most property owners will appreciate the drop in property taxes, we'll ALL pay more in sales tax, and that tax income will rise as prices do.

But balancing the good and bad of Proposal A finds it improves what is now an irrational and illogical system. Some tax credits will disappear, but they were in place to ease the property tax burden, which — while not disappearing, will certainly be lessened with passage of Proposal A.

There's some small comfort in the fact that both Republicans and Democrats are urging "yes" votes. They've done little to ease our burdens in the past. Proposal A is not perfect, but we deserve better than the current patchwork of unfair, unequal and biased taxes to which we are now subjected. A "yes" vote will equalize years of inequity...

### DEAR EDITOR:

The other day I was talking with a young man and told him how I harrowed up 10 acres and planted 10 acres of oats in two days and I thought I did pretty well.

He just couldn't see how it took that long. Well, if I would have told that to a man my age, he would have agreed with me that I had done pretty well. And when I told him was March 20, he didn't want to believe me.

Well, there are still a few of us around who can remember that for two years, the farmers got most of their grain in during March. But I always thought if I got my grain in during April, I had done all right.

I remember once when I started to work out as a hired man, the farmer I worked for got his crop in, in good time and then got mad at me for some reason. He cursed me if I did one thing wrong and cursed if I did one thing good and then he fired me.

Well, about 20 years later, he and I got to be good friends and helped each other thrash beans and fill silo. Once we talked about it and he admitted he acted a little quick then.

Once I worked for a farmer and we had a late spring. The farmers got their grain in, but it rained pretty near every day and it was getting late for the sugar beets and corn.

My boss told me one morning to hitch three horses to

the plow and get out in the field and plow. He said the ground was tilled and it worked good because the field was in sod and he had to get his corn planted.

Well, I went out and tried to plow and the ground came up in slabs and it wouldn't turn over. He came out and looked it over and said, "You don't know how to plow. Let me try it!"

He wasn't a big man and he looked like a peanut beside a watermelon. He just couldn't hold the plow in the ground. Well, he said he guessed it was too wet and told me to do something else.

We waited a week longer and it went pretty well when the ground finally got dry.

But all summer those four rounds that we made when it was wet were all hard and dry and nothing grew on it. There's an old saying that a cool, wet May will fill your barn with grain and hay and I found that out.

I had a lot of experience as a hired man working on the farm and I never thought I'd be a farmer because I always had to do the dirty work.

I worked for one man and he made me work hard, but he helped me and never made me do anything he wouldn't do.

If I broke a fork handle or some machinery, he'd say, "Let's fix it, because if you never break anything, you don't do any work either."

The Bible says in Ea. 5:12 that the sleep of the laboring man is sweet.

Well, there was nothing I liked better than to lay in the hay mow and sleep when it rained and to hear the rain falling on the barn roof.

It's TUESDAY, MAY 25, and it's Day No. 145, leaving 220 to go in 1993. Delegates from seven states met MAY 25, 1787, in Philadelphia to open the Constitutional Convention, which was suggested eight months earlier. Among those attending were George Washington, Benjamin Franklin, James Madison, Alexander Hamilton and others. Birthdays today, plenty of musicians, actors and actresses: Dixie Carter 54, Tom T. Hall 57, Connie Sellecca 38, Beverly Sills 64, Leslie Uggams 50 and Karen Valentine 46. . .

Two birthdays of big-name performers on WEDNESDAY, MAY 26. Motion Picture Star John Wayne was born in Iowa in 1907, and died in Los Angeles June 11, 1979. (His advice for acting was "Talk low, talk slow and don't say too much"). Actor/Singer Al Jolson was born in Russia on MAY 26, 1886, and died in San Francisco Oct. 22, 1950. Birthdays today, Actor Jim Arness 70, Former Tiger First Baseman Darrell Evans 46, and Singer Hank Williams Jr. 44. . .

American women's rights reformer Amelia Bloomer was born in Homer, NY, on MAY 27, 1818. She worked for more sensible dress for women and promoted a costume that had been introduced several years before. It became known as the "bloomer costume" or simply, "bloomers." She died in Iowa in 1894. The British ocean liner, The Queen Mary, started its maiden voyage from Southampton, England, to NYC, on MAY 27, 1936. Birthdays today, Former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger 70, Actor Vincent Price 82 and Actress Lee Meriwether, former Miss America (in 1955), was born in Los Angeles in 1935. . .

The five baby girls born near Callander, ONT, on MAY 28, 1934, the first quintts to live beyond a few hours, were the Dionne Quintuplets, and they were Marie, Cecile, Yvonne, Emilie and Annette. Their parents were Oliva and Elzire Dionne. . . Joseph Ignace Guillotin, inventor of the death machine for a less painful, more certain method of execution, was born on MAY 28, 1738, in Saintes, France. The guillotine was first used on April 25, 1792, to behead a highwayman. Birthdays today, Tiger DH Kirk Gibson 36, Singer Gladys Knight 49 and Former NY US Attorney Rudolph Giuliani 49. . .

Patrick Henry, the American patriot and orator who gave his famous speech on "give me liberty or give me death," was born MAY 29, 1736. That speech urged Americans to unite and to arm the Virginia militia. . . Other birthdays today, Population Biologist Paul Ehrlich 61, Comedian/Actor Bob Hope 90 and Auto Racer Al Unser 54. . .

SUNDAY, MAY 30 is Pentecost, the Christian feast commemorating the descent of the Holy Spirit onto the Apostles 50 days after Easter. It has been recognized since the Third Century. . . A little-known action of World War II was the Battle of the Aleutian Islands of Alaska, on MAY 30, 1943, when the Islands of Kiska and Attu were retaken by the US Seventh Infantry. The Japanese had taken the lightly-defended American Islands earlier, so an American force of 11,000 landed on Attu on MAY 12. In three weeks of fighting, U.S. forces suffered 552 killed and 1,140 wounded. Only 28 wounded Japanese were taken prisoner. Their dead numbered 2,352 of whom 500 were suicides. . .

MONDAY, MAY 31 is Memorial Day, a legal public holiday honoring those Americans who died in battle and also those who fought and returned. Observance dates back from Civil War days in the U.S. . . In Gettysburg National Cemetery, 2,000 schoolchildren annually scatter flowers over unknown graves. . . Whitmonday, is the second day of Whitsunday, the seventh Sunday after Easter and a popular time for baptisms, when white garments are often worn by candidates for baptism, hence the day is also known as White Sunday. . .

An old ceremony in England on Whitmonday was "dicing for Bibles," begun in 1675. It provides Bibles for poor

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children by letting them win them at a dice game played in the church. More recently the dicing has been moved from the altar to "a more suitable place" . . . Clergyman Norman Vincent Peale is 95 today, Former Lebanon Hostage and Church of England Leader Terry Waite is 54, Actor Clint Eastwood is 63, Singer Johnny Paycheck is 52, Actresses Sharon Gless 50 and Brooke Shields 28, Ex-Football Star Joe Namath is 50. . .

Last week we received a news release from The Michigan All-Star Team for School and Tax Reform, asking for a "Yes" vote on Proposal A. It listed two teacher unions — Michigan Education Association and Michigan Federation of Teachers, plus no less than 13 Michigan Associations of school administrators, intermediate school administrators, school boards, school personnel administrators, vocational schools, college and university president councils and other similar groups — ALL FAVORING THE PROPOSAL.

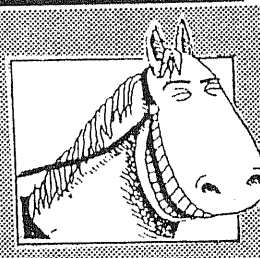
When these high-powered, high-paid, high-spending groups ALL agree they like the proposal (groups who've been enemies for years and years), that must tell us pooms something.

## KEY TO FREEDOM

Now, this is not advice mind you — it is just a suggestion, but if I were you, Class of '93 — I'd go with "key to freedom."

## 70 picket for TISD

About 70 persons turned out for a May 17 demonstration over lack of a contract for the Tuscola Intermediate School District teachers, who have been without a contract since Sept. 1.

"I come here tonight not just as president, but as someone who has been where you are. I taught for many years and have gone through an entire year without a contract and I know the kind of anguish and struggle you are going through," said Julius Maddox, Michigan Education Association president.

Maddox urged TISD teachers to stand together because their stance not only impacts their district, but all educational employees in the state.

"The union always attempts to state union busting is the intention and that is not the intent at all. We are interested in having a contract and have given reasonable offers and they've refused to accept them," said Supt. John Moore.

"Teachers are asking for a wage increase of six percent for three years, which amounts to a 27% increase overall with 18% in salaries and the other in increased insurance costs, longevity pay and extra curriculars."

Previously, the board had offered a 3.6% wage increase.

## \$10,000 TV grant for Thumb

Educational tele-communications in the Thumb will receive a \$10,000 financial boost.

The Regional Educational Media Center #10 (REMC) based in Cass City has received a \$10,000 contribution for Thumb Area Television from the Vada Dow Trust of Midland.

## Sentencing coming in July

A Caro businessman man who was found guilty of arson was able to dodge jail time temporarily.

Donald Hutchinson, 56, was found guilty of arson March 11 of this year for the February 1991 blaze that destroyed a rental unit he owned on Center Street, Fairgrove. He was to receive sentence Friday in Tuscola County Circuit Court, but didn't.

Hutchinson's attorney raised objections to the pre-sentence investigation, a routine report that is done before all sentencing, so a two-day hearing on that matter is tentatively scheduled for July, said a circuit court spokesman.

More than 25 witnesses were called during the eight-day trial in March. Bay County Circuit Judge William Caprahe presides because Tuscola County Circuit Judge Patrick Joslyn disqualified himself from the case because of personal and professional relationships with Hutchinson.

Maximum sentence is 20 years in prison.

The students worked for pledges, local, district, state or national honors, according to the number of Baroque, Classical, Romantic and Contemporary pieces each student was able to perform from memory.

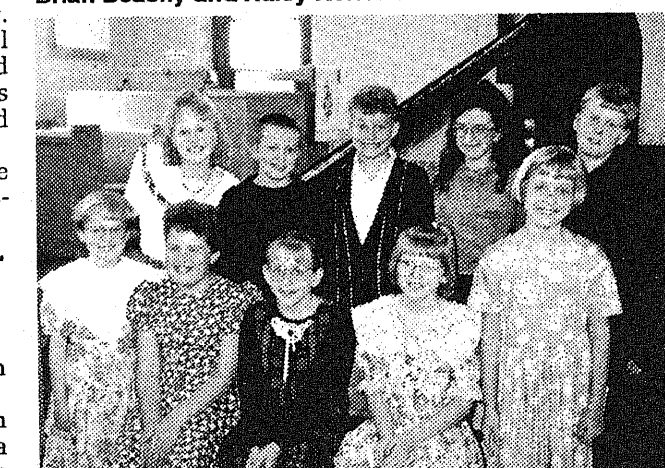
Each student received his or her proficiency level and was given a certificate and a gold or bronze embossed pin.

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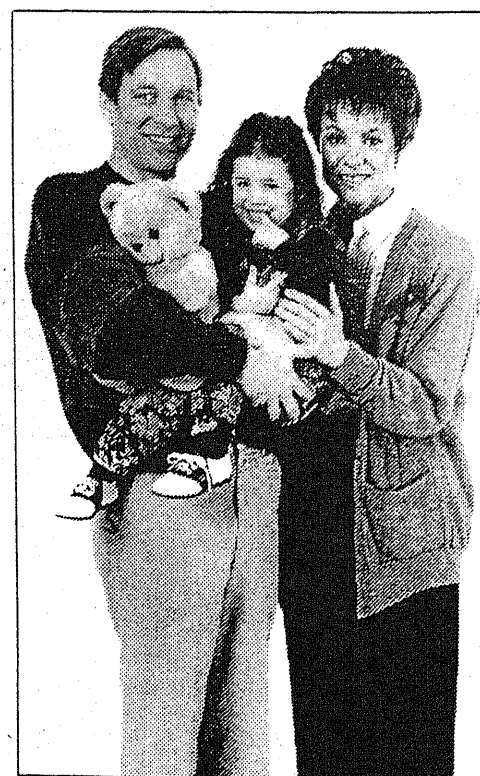

Smith told students that if ever an accident should happen in the home or on the farm, they should remain calm and not panic.

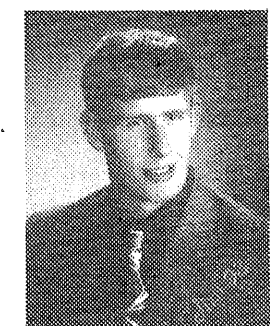
She demonstrated how fast a child or an adult can

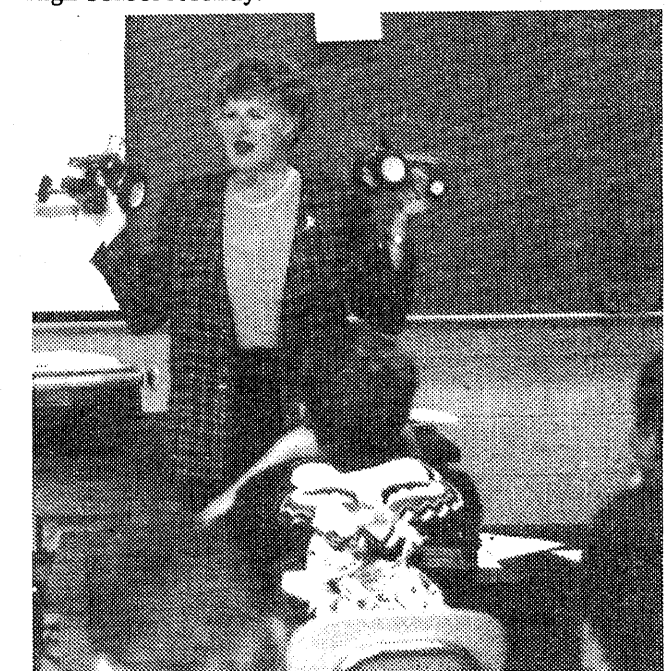

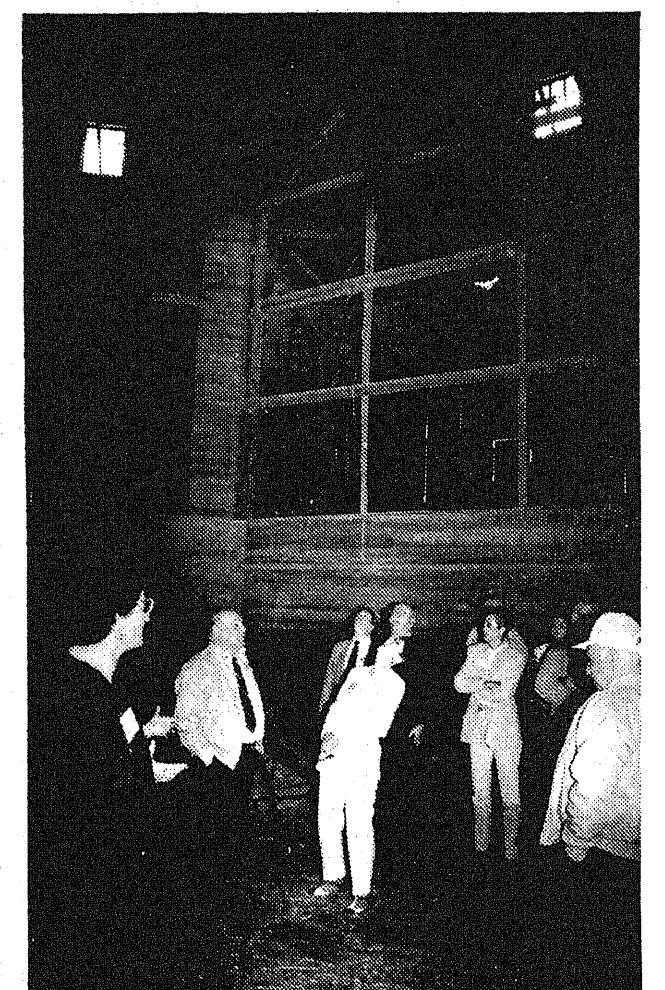
