

# Sebewaing historians honor Anne Hallock for years of work

Anne Hallock of Sebewaing was recognized Thursday evening at Sebewaing Historical Society's June meeting as the 1993 Champion of History for her research and writings of Indian tribes and nations.

Hallock received the framed certificate from David Eberlein, Society president. She and the late

Dorothy Dinsmore of Akron collaborated in producing a book, *Indian Dave's Travels—A Colorful Character*. It was a well-illustrated biographical documentary for Michigan's Sesquicentennial celebration in 1987.

Several pages of the book are devoted to a musical section, *Songs for Indian Dave*, with music by Lynda Graf of Sebewaing, and words by

Hallock and Dinsmore. Following the presentation, Hallock spoke about Chipewia, Ottawa and Potawatami tribes who once dwelled in these areas.

She also answered questions about their movements to reservations and told of Native Americans with whom she is personally acquainted.

Among summer projects by the Society is a consignment auction sale Saturday, July 31, to which the public is invited to bring articles for sale. The Society will provide an auctioneer and will sponsor the consignment

sale for owners of articles, on a fee basis.

Those bringing to-be-sold articles to the sale will be charged a 20% commission on sales up to \$1,000, and 10% on any items sold for over \$1,000. Anyone entering articles for the sale before July 3 will have the articles listed on the Society's sale bill.

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# Chris Schulz looks ahead, with a smile

After the birth of her daughter last year, Chris Schulz faced the terrifying possibility of losing her tongue to amputation.

A large tumor had begun growing on her tongue and doctors were unsure how to treat it—or even whether surgery would help at all.

But Schulz's worst fears weren't realized, as surgery in April to remove the hemangioma, as the tumor is called, was apparently successful.

Her doctors at the Mayo Clinic in Minnesota had ini-

tially warned that surgery to remove the tumor would involve cutting her jaw beneath her mouth and removing a couple of teeth.

But once doctors began the surgery, they found that simply cutting through the underside of Schulz's jaw was all that was necessary.

The top of her tongue, with its important muscles and taste buds, was left intact.

"The doctors told me the tumor as the size of a small egg," Elkton resident Schulz says.

"That's why I had to have the tracheostomy, because when I would lie down to sleep, my muscles would relax and the tumor would block my breathing."

Now she's able to eat just about anything she wants—and because the tracheostomy is no longer needed, she's able to enjoy more outdoor activities.

"Last summer I didn't feel well and I had to wear a special bib over the trach hole if I went outside," she

said. "I spent a lot of time indoors."

"But this year I'm going to enjoy my summer."

Schulz estimates that costs for her treatments and surgeries top \$120,000. Luckily, medical insurance covers most of those charges.

What's left will be paid for by a special fund set up last year by the Elkton Chamber of Commerce to help the Schulz family pay medical and family bills during her numerous trips to the Mayo Clinic and hospitals in Ann Arbor.

Over \$11,000 was donated to the fund—and Schulz says she's grateful for every donated dollar.

"This whole thing would have been a lot harder if we hadn't had that money," she says.

"It made having the surgery a lot easier knowing that our bills were paid."

"When this property, which is now the Sebewaing County Park, became available, it was purchased by the county because it had great potential as a recreation area near Saginaw Bay," said Park Manager Tom Jahr.

"Huron County has led the state of Michigan by providing modern campgrounds for the enjoyment and relaxation of it's people and for the many visitors who come here each year." It is the ninth Huron County Park. Work began in 1985, at the mouth of the Sebewaing River.

The park has 56 campsites with sewer, water and electrical services, a picnic area, walking trails, boat slips and fishing areas. The 26-acre park also has flush toilets and a bathroom with shower facilities. Cost of camping is \$12 a day. Total project cost is \$425,000.

Long-range plans are to construct two bridges to nearby islands and develop walking trails there.

Brenda Sigmund will share duties managing the park with Jahr.

The Huron County Park system began in 1919 when the Caseville County Park was established. Huron County Parks are administered by the Huron County Road Commission with the guidance of the Huron County Park Trustees.

## No fire developments

No new developments have been reported since the May 24 fire that destroyed three vacant Unionville buildings, owned by the religious group Ministry of the Word.

Law enforcement officials believe the May 24 fire that destroyed the former Unionville Lumber Co. was caused by arson and are waiting for test results to determine if a flammable product was used in the blaze. The buildings were owned by the religious group Ministry of the Word.

Tuscola County Sheriff's Detective Larry Walker said officials believe the fire began in a lean-to building at the site. Samples taken from the remains of the fire were sent to the Michigan State Police Post in Bridgeport for testing, and Walker noted it will take several weeks for the test results to come back.

Ministry members stored used clothing and other household items in the buildings, prior to taking them to needy people in Mexico. Members have been working hard and have the clothes and burnt building debris nearly cleaned from the site, officials note.

Damage to the buildings was estimated at about \$50,000.

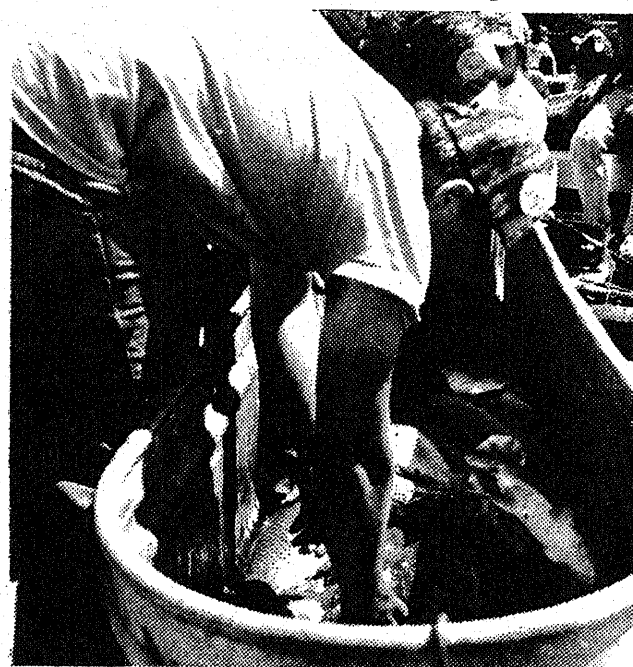

## How about a 'trial' sales tax shift?

The question of Proposal A has been resolved—firmly if not overwhelmingly—and all around the politicians are wondering why their seemingly agreeable proposal was not acceptable to 54% of the voters.

Rarely has a more-endorsed proposal been turned down. Both Democratic and Republican legislators, plus a Republican Governor, supported Proposal A strongly. In addition, the most varied bodies of associations, bureaus, unions, boards, committees and commissions hurried their members under the June 2 "Question-A" umbrella.

Rarely have more newspaper editorial writers supported a ballot question than they plumped for last Wednesday's proposal.

So, with all that support, with polls showing narrow but comfortable passage, what caused the loss?

If a narrow and biased opinion may be voiced, please consider these points:

■ No one claimed that the Proposal was "perfect," in fact, many backers spoke so cautiously about it that their very endorsement raised doubts in voters' minds. "It's better than nothing" was heard often, but after such painful and lengthy birth pangs, voters expected something better.

■ Frankly, many voters worried that with such differing

groups supporting Proposal A, it was probably too broad and voters feared they would be standing alone against a broad front of demanding agencies.

■ However, most worrisome of all was the unshakable notion that while the 50% increase in sales tax was "forever," the benefits of reduced property taxes would be wiped out within two or three years.

■ Senior Citizens were concerned that without federal tax credit for sales taxes paid, and with zooming school costs, they would be left standing alone and unarmed.

There are answers to all of these problems, but the Legislature simply hasn't come up with the right formula thus far.

Perhaps it's simply expecting too much for citizens to give up a truly "guaranteed" safeguard (4% Sales Tax) in favor of the "sliding" scales on property tax increases.

Could the answer lie in a three- or five-year "trial change," in which a short-term Sales Tax increase could be undertaken, along with an identical term property tax shift? Could the Legislature guarantee that the tax program would return to the present system or that it would require another vote then to make the new system permanent?

Too innovative?

Too "we've-never-done-it-that-way-before-ish"? Perhaps, but obviously nothing else is bringing a solution. Could be that the RIGHT program will have to be more innovative than ever before, and that possibly a "plan-we've-never-done-before" must be done now.

One comment about endorsements by newspapers: We've never seen more-unanimous agreement by newspapers than by those favoring Proposal A.

Whether daily newspapers were big, like The Detroit Free Press, or much smaller, as The Bay City Times or the Huron Tribune, they fell over each other beating the drum for Proposal A.

They all wanted to be on the band wagon and be able to say, "That's how we told the voters to cast their ballots." Yet, where those newspapers screamed loudest, "Vote YES," that's precisely where most voters said "NO!"

Those "No" voters, in only 15 out of 83 counties, tipped the balance and went their own, individual ways. Daily newspapers ALWAYS support programs that call for more taxes, more spending.

Voters are far-better informed, much more careful, less easily swayed and more discerning than the dailies give them credit.

Voters know their needs better than the outsiders, and they are well informed as to what will serve best.

So, let the "big guys" endorse any way they wish.

In the majority of cases, what the little guys do for themselves generally turns out to best for all...

He was born in Peru, IN, and died in 1964. ... Birthdays today, Musician Les Paul 77, Former Cabinet Member from Michigan Robert McNamara 77, Actor Michael J. Fox 32. ...

■ Alcoholics Anonymous was founded in Akron, OH, JUNE 10, 1935. ... On this date in 1942, Nazi troops executed all male inhabitants of the Czech village of Lidice in retaliation for the shooting of a Czech Nazi. Total population of Lidice was about 500. Entire town was wiped out and burned, and women and children taken to Germany. ... Academy Award Winner Hattie McDaniel (she was Scarlett O'Hara's maid in GWTW) was born JUNE 10, 1889. Shelled to be 63 (Can't think of her stage name in GWTW).

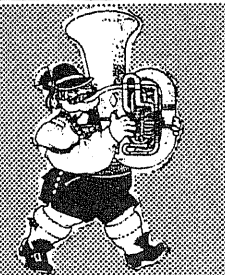

## Recollections Of By-Gone Days

DEAR EDITOR:

This nice weather we've had the last few weeks has helped the farmers get their crops into the fields.

When they talk about putting out 50 to 100 acres a day, you almost wonder how they can do it. But when you see those big tractors in the field and those big drills, you know they should get a lot out.

When you hear how much that machinery costs and all the spraying they have to do, we older people just can't see how they do it. Some of that machinery costs more than a whole section of land used to!

Back when I worked as a hired man with the horses, we used a hoe and the whole family hoed. We only had a small cultivator, but we got as close as we could and cov-

ered up a lot of weeds.

We farmers all tried to have a clean farm and we always plowed our land and sowed rye and plowed it under for green manure. We always had some cattle and fed a lot of hay and then spread the manure on the land.

We farmed different than they do now. Once I got some rye seed and paid \$2.00 a bushel for it. It yielded real good and I had it for sale, thinking I should get \$1.50 a bushel for it.

I sold it mostly to people around here, but one day a young man came up to my place with a nice car. He was all dressed up and asked me if I had some rye to sell. I said yes and he looked my buildings over an asked how much I wanted for my rye.

I told him \$1.50 a bushel. Well, he said, "I think you

got a dirty farm and I'll take some rye, but I'll get a lot of weed seed with it — so I'll give you \$1.00 a bushel for it and not one cent more."

By that time, I was a little mad and told him my farm was as clean as any around and if he didn't want my rye, he could get going.

Well, he looked a little mad and left, because back in those days, if you wanted to make a farmer mad, all you had to do was tell him he had a dirty farm.

I used to sell a lot of little pigs and the price was around \$9.00 a piece when they weighed around 25 lbs.

I once had a bunch to sell and a guy came through and only wanted five. He told me he'd give me \$6.00 a piece

for five of them. I told him \$9.00 a piece or let them there. He told me I'd never sell them for that.

Well, the next Tuesday I took them to Caro and got \$12.00 for them. I saw that \$6.00 man there, but he stayed away from me!

It says in the Bible, "If a man sues you for your cloak, give him your coat." But it doesn't say you have to give him your pants, too.

Times have changed a lot since then and now a feeder pig brings around \$45.00. I don't even have a chicken on the farm. The last hen I had got stolen about the same time my exercise bike was taken out of my garage.

## Huron, Tuscola lead 'no' vote on State Proposal A

Huron and Tuscola Counties joined Detroit metro counties Wayne, Oakland and Macomb to defeat State Proposal A — which would have raised sales taxes to 6% and lower property taxes — in voting last Wednesday.

Proposal A failed 54% to 46% but was strongly approved in most of outstate Michigan, except for the two Thumb counties. Strong opposition in the metro Detroit Area sealed its doom, in the special election.

Tuscola County defeated Proposal A by a 331-vote margin of 6,280 "no" votes to 5,949 "yes" ballots. Tuscola has 37,242 registered voters, meaning 33% cast votes.

Huron County defeated Proposal A by a 882-vote margin of 5,130 "no" votes to 4,248 "yes." Huron has 25,096 registered voters, and 37% cast ballots.

On the other hand, all other Thumb counties supported the proposal. In Sanilac County, the vote was 6,145 "yes" to 4,540 "no," while Lapeer had 10,034 "yes" to 9,560 "no" votes. Although 68 of Michigan's 83 counties supported Proposal A, the 15 "no" counties against had enough power to rule. Saginaw, Bay and Genesee all voted "no."

The election drew about 36% of Michigan's 6 million registered voters. Area totals include:

# Here are June 14 School Election ballot issues...

Because Proposal A to re-vamp property tax was defeated June 2, it is business as usual for the Monday, June 14, elections with tax issues, Headlee overrides and board of education seats.

## AKRON-FAIRGROVE

A-F ballot proposals request a renewal of three mills for one year and three mills additional for operations for one year.

Passage of both would generate about \$200,000 each and would help finance the district's \$2.6 million budget, says Supt. Wayne Case. The additional millage would cost an average homeowner about \$60 per year and bring the operational millage to about 35.3856 mills, says Case.

Two incumbents, Dennis Roberts and George Rieck, are challenged by newcomer Harold Littleton, for the two expiring four-year posts.

## CASEVILLE

Voters in the Caseville School District will only have to decide on a Board of Education spot.

There is one expiring four-year seat, with incumbent William Taylor challenged by newcomer Michelle Lisowski.

## ELKTON - PIGEON-BAY PORT

There is only Board of Education voting on the Laker ballot for June 14.

There are two expiring, four-year seats here and incumbents Burt Keefer and Jane Christner are unopposed.

However, Lakers will see a tax proposal later this summer or in the fall, says Supt. Robert Drury.

Laker Board members are expected to make that decision at the 7:30 p.m. board meeting on June 14.

## OWEN-GAGE

Owendale-Gagetown voters will decide on a millage renewal, an override of the Headlee Amendment to the State Constitution and board seats.

The ballot requests 6.5 mills for five years in renewal and an override to the Headlee Amendment since it prohibits school districts from

collecting more money from property assessments than the rate of inflation.

The district currently levies 39.3 mills for operations. Four candidates are vying for two four-year Board seats.

Candidates are Mary Ann Abbe, who was selected to compete the term of the late Joseph (Nick) Warack, and newcomers Joan Koch, Thomas Mellendorf and Terry Muntz.

Incumbent Tom Fritz is not seeking re-election.

## UNIONVILLE - SEBEWAING

The USA ballot request is for 25.5 mills for one year. Passage would generate about most of the district's \$2.5 million budget, says

Supt. William Dodge. If the request is turned down, it would leave the district with only the basic county allocated nine mills, he adds.

Incumbent Raymond Bauer is unopposed for the one four-year seat.

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## USA FFA studies tractor safety

USA High School's FFA Chapter recently completed its tractor safety program for members.

The safety program is available to Agri-science students

to make them aware of dangers and give them safety skills on a tractor and equipment use, according to Howard Doss, MSU Safety Specialist.

"Tractors are the highest piece of equipment involved in accidents in the farm."

Students are required to take a written test over the tractor and machinery operation. Then students drive the FFA's tractor to get some experience.

This is especially important for those students who have never driven a tractor before.

The tractor safety program is part of the USA-FFA's National Safety Program to make the community a safer place to live. Carl Kieser is USA FFA Advisor.



## Crops start slowly

Lower than normal temperatures have continued to slow crop development in the Western Thumb, putting local farmers a good couple weeks behind, according to Extension Agent Jim LeCureux.

Ninety-six percent of the corn crop is planted, he says, but only 40% has emerged, significantly down from the 70% average usually emerged through the week ending June 1.

With several warmer, sunny days behind them, farmers are finally getting their beans planted, but LeCureux says the bean crop is not behind yet.

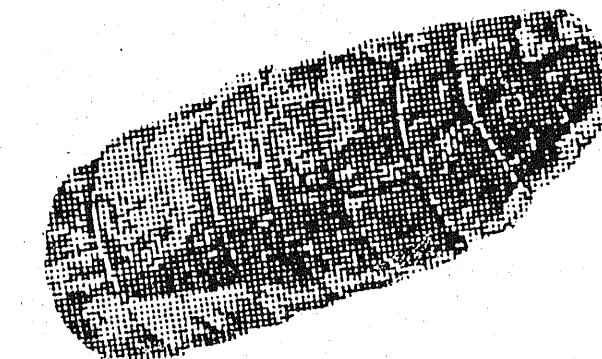
**Sugar beet planting** is virtually complete, with emergence beginning in most fields, but some replanting was necessary due to wind blow-outs.

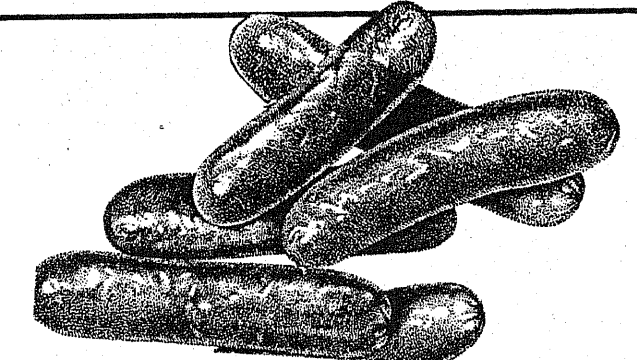



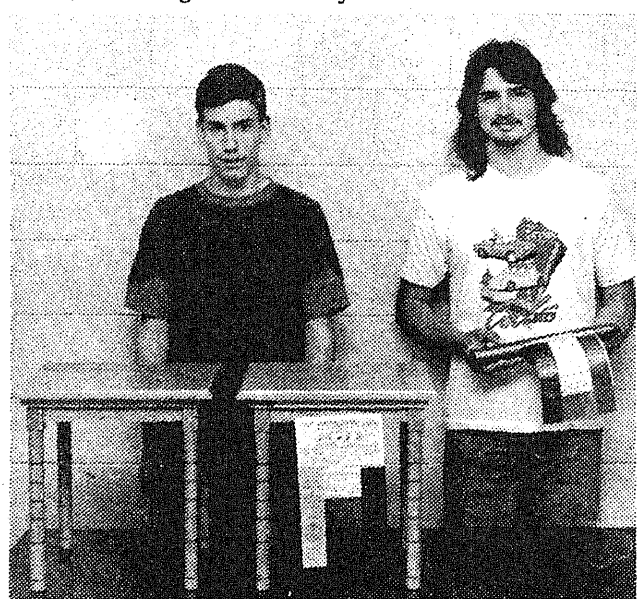
Thousands of projects are entered, each competing within its category and class. The 1993 MITES convention in Grand Rapids was May 20-22, according to teacher

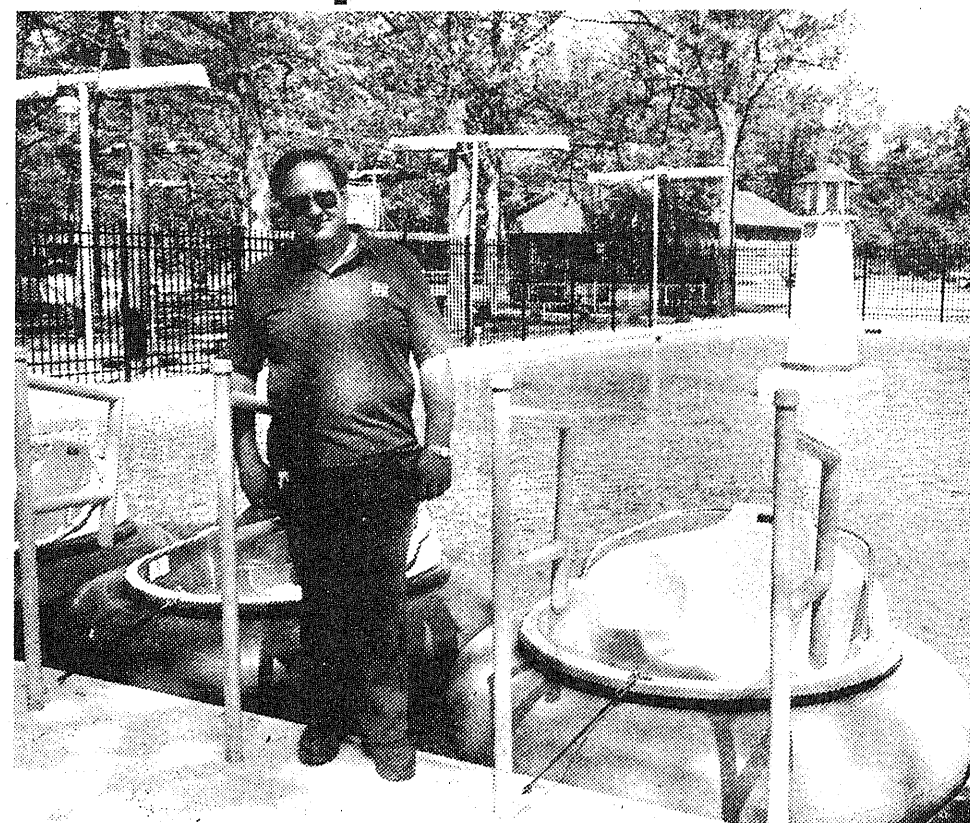
The weather over the Memorial Day weekend may have been a bit chilly, but the action was hot at Caseville's newest attraction.

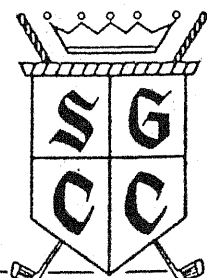

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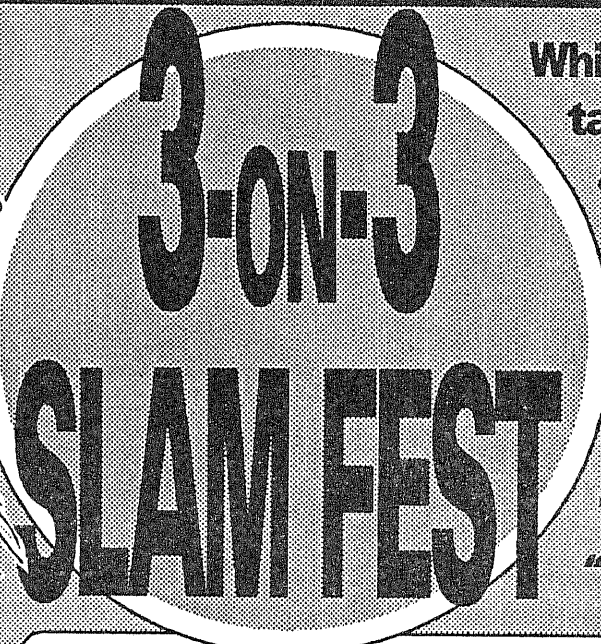
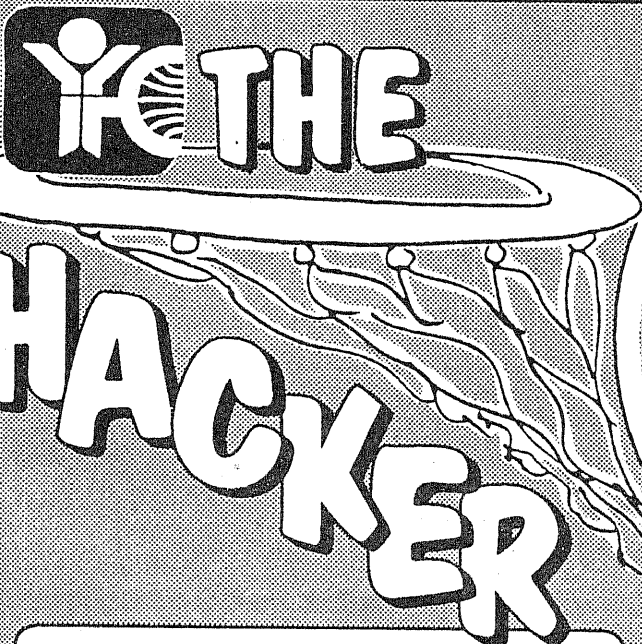

A record 452 three-member teams are entered in the fundraiser, says BT YFC Executive Director Ken Smeader.

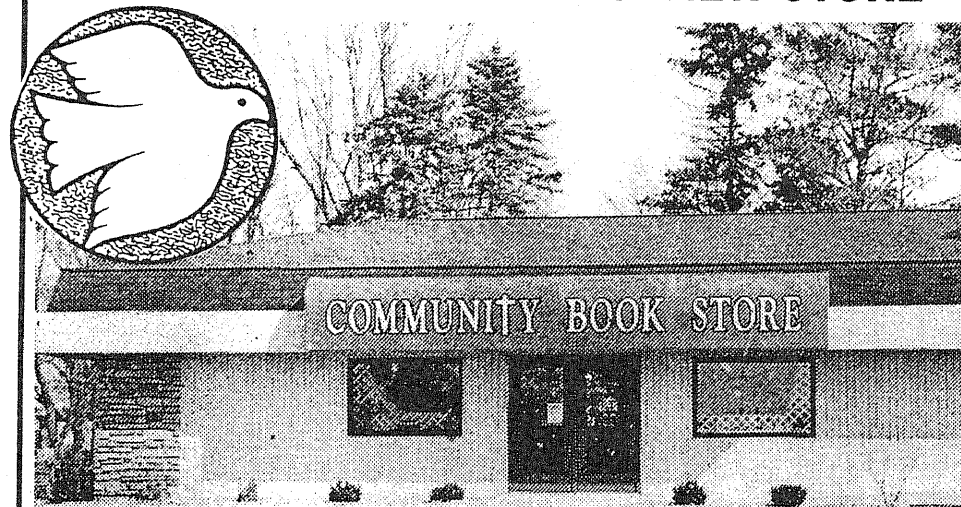

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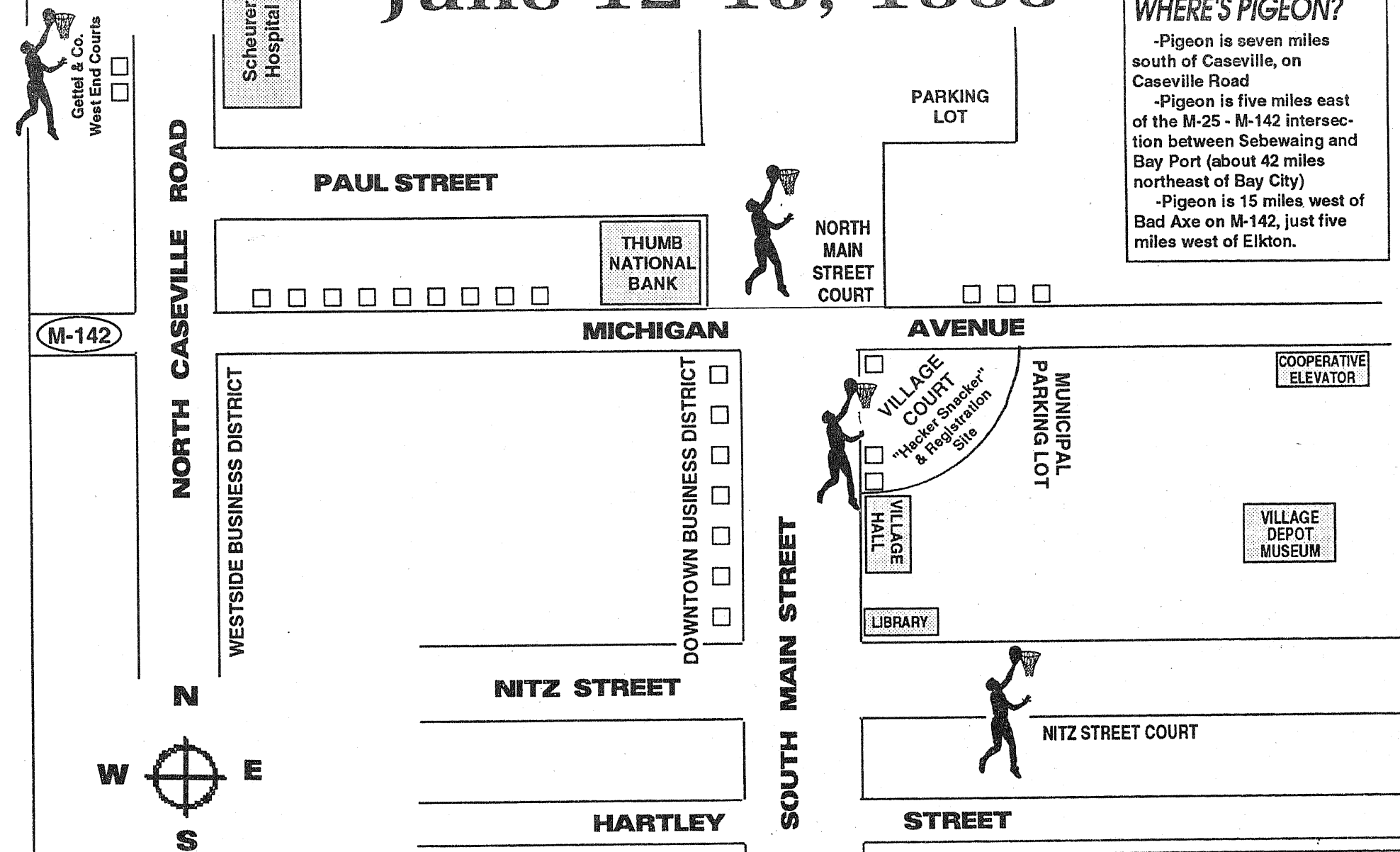

-Pigeon is 15 miles west of Bad Axe on M-142, just five miles west of Elkton.

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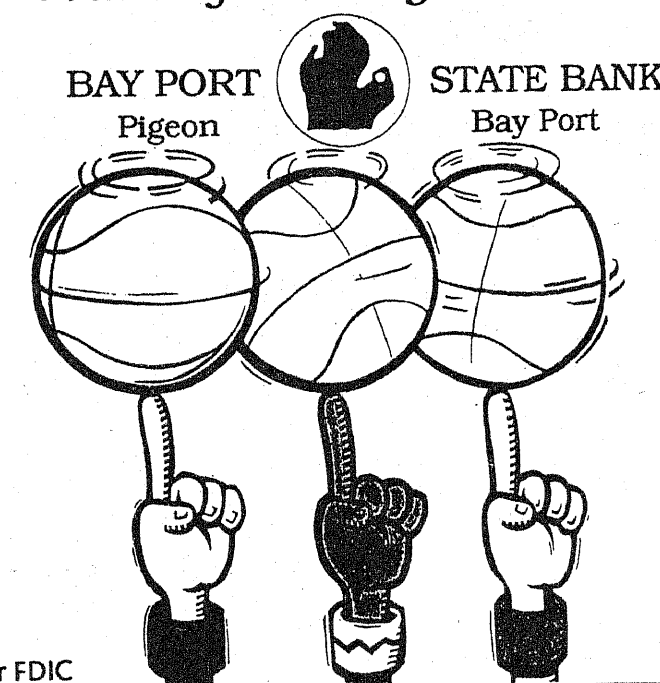
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# What is the BT YFC?

Bluewater Thumb Youth for Christ works to reach teens with message of hope. Youth for Christ in the tri-county area is seeking to reach teens with a message of hope in a society that seems to be offering less and less hope, according to YFC Executive Director Ken Smeader.

BT YFC employs eight full-time and two part-time staffers. Its funding comes from individuals, churches, business and special events — including The Hacker 3-on-3 Slam Fest.

The Hacker, with the help of its sponsors, will net about five percent of the \$320,000 annual budget of Youth for Christ.

Other events, like the annual Benefit Auction, Iron Man of Golf, Christmas Auctions and a four man scramble golf tournament help generate 35% of the budget.

Income from all special events account for 40% of BT YFC's annual budget, gifts make up 41% and pledges and estates make up the remaining 19% of BT YFC's income base.

"With the gifts, estates and pledges totaling about \$150,000 it is obvious we have to work hard at special events like The Hacker to help fund the remaining \$170,000 of our budget," says Smeader.

"Our goal is to put more emphasis on fund-raising

through direct gifts and less on event to raise money," he continues.

"By receiving more personal gifts, it will allow for our staff to concentrate more time on direct ministry with junior and senior high school students."

Ninety percent of BT YFC's income goes back into direct ministry to area teens — to Bible studies, breakfast clubs, trips, teen conferences, bus purchases and maintenance, training, conferences and other areas that benefit teens.

The other 10% goes to administrative costs, office expense, legal and accounting costs, etc.

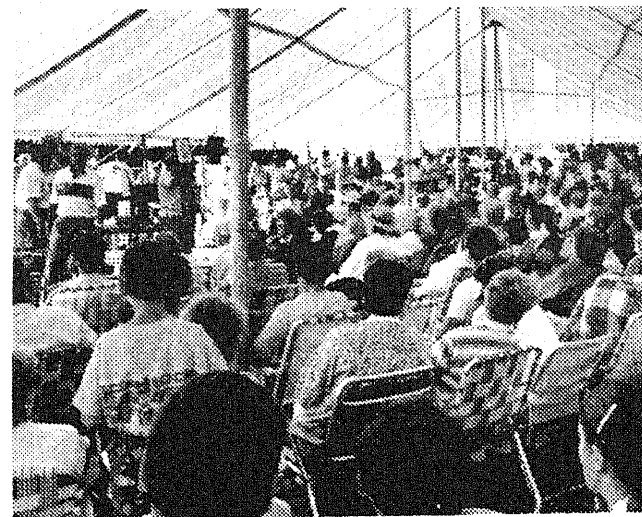
The YFC staff comes into contact with hundreds of teens on a weekly basis

across the tri-county area. Says Smeader,

"Teens are faced with many different issues, from living in single-parent families to the issue of AIDS. We feel very fortunate to offer teenagers alternatives to the lifestyle they might currently be living."

"In a day where one in every two marriages ends in divorce, or where 'babies are having babies,' where kids think of suicide as a real way to deal with their problems, teens need to hear 'A Message of Hope.'"

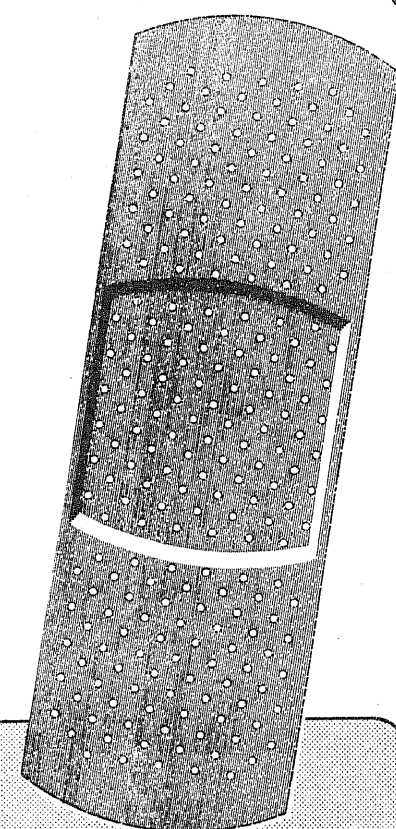

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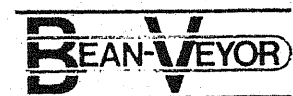
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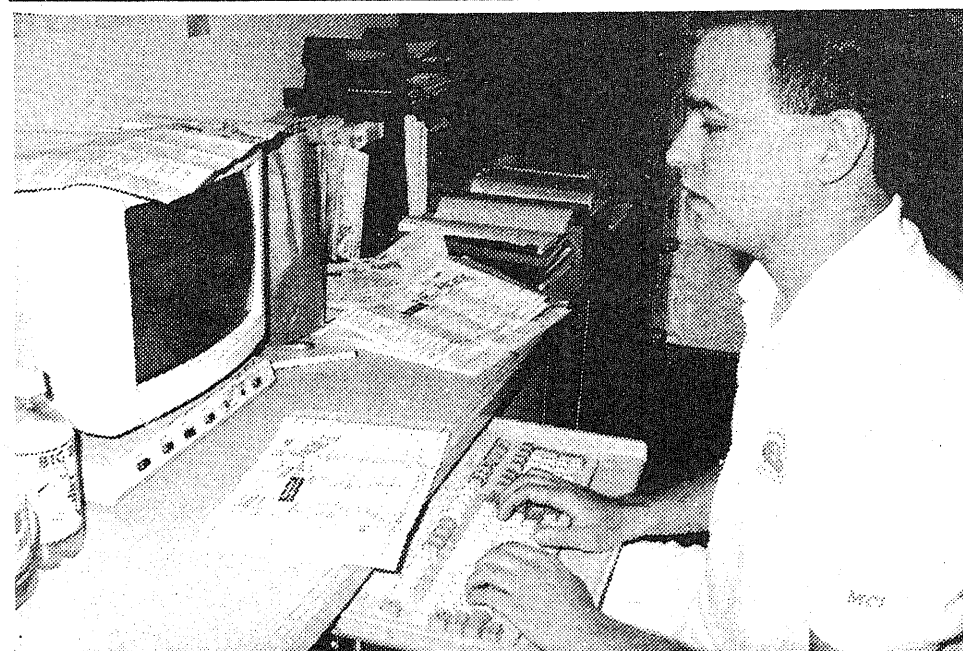
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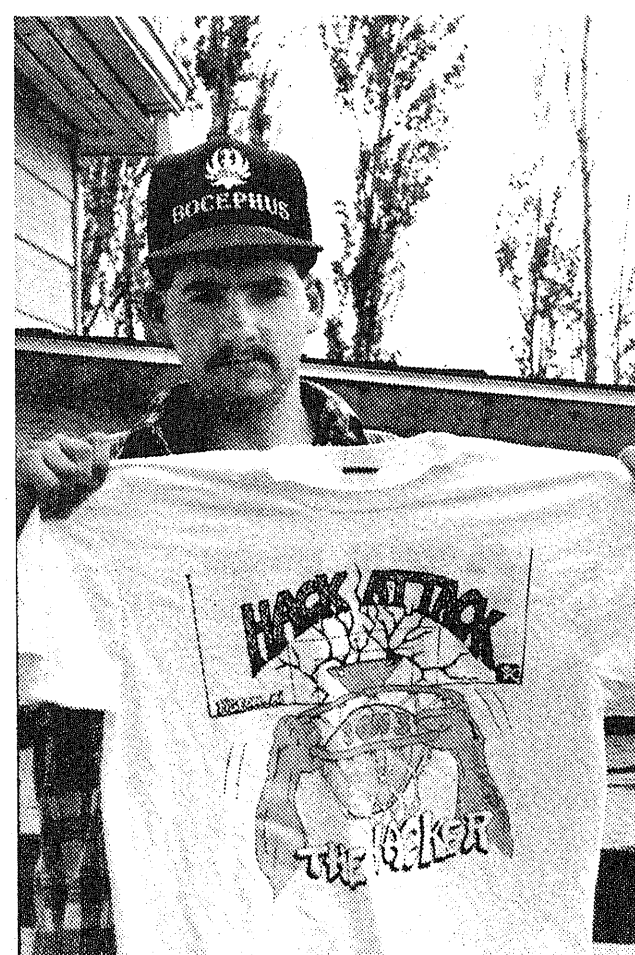
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## The Newsweekly's... Hacker 3-on-3 Slamm' & Jammin' Report:

The Hacker is the only 3-on-3 basketball tourney that actually encourages "dunking."

That's what Hacker organizer Steve Fletcher says really differentiates The Hacker from other tournaments.

"We built our equipment specifically to withstand the stress of dunking," he says. Most other basketball backboards aren't made to enable players to hold onto the rim or do any of the other moves associated with dunking.

The Hacker not only allows dunking, it encourages it, by holding its own "Slam Dunk Contest" this Saturday at 2 p.m. during The Hacker tournaments.

Rim height also plays a role in the Macker-Hacker difference. While other tournaments play at a standard 10' rim height, The Hacker

allows for different age divisions to successfully compete by providing 8', 9' and 10' rims.

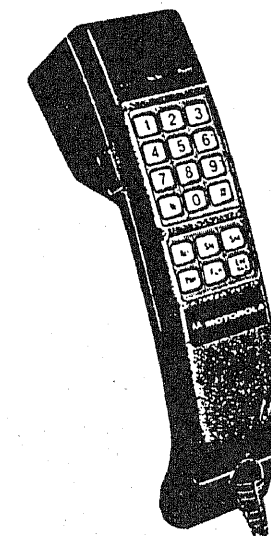
The other major difference — and Fletcher thinks it's the most important — is the quality of The Hacker tourney.

"We want our tournament to be different in terms of its reputation," says Fletcher. "We want our players to have respect for the other players by trying to keep a handle on the style of play — more like basketball than the physical style of football."

The hard work of Bluewater Thumb Youth for Christ in promoting The Hacker tourney appears to be paying off.

Over 450 teams signed up for play as of the deadline and it seems that Pigeon is the place to be for 3-on-3 basketball at its finest on the weekend of June 12 and 13.

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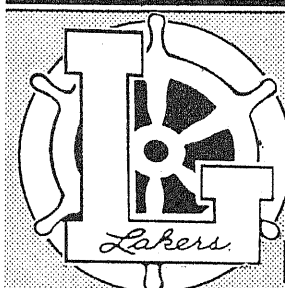

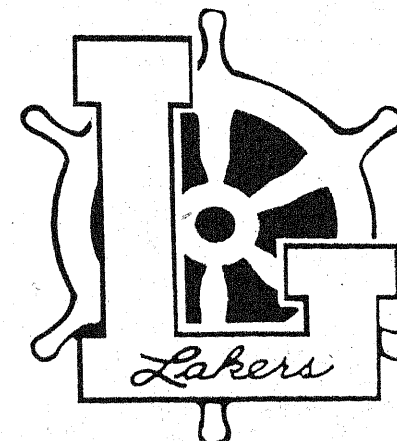

## LAKER SENIORS WIN MOST-VALUABLE ATHLETE AWARDS



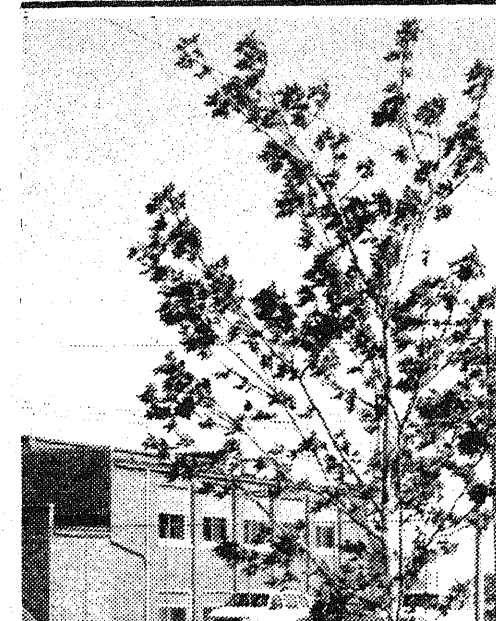
