## Akron oks tax break for Coop expansion

Akron Village Council laid the foundation for the expansion project to triple the size of the Cooperative Elevator Company's branch location.

Council members last week approved the company's request for an Industrial Facilities Exemption Certificate, providing a 50% tax break for up to 12 years on the company's \$1.5 million expansion. No opposition was voiced by the five residents who attended the meeting.

The company is adding 750,000 bushels of grain storage, a new grain dryer and another receiving pit. The storage is in two 75-foot-diameter steel storage silos and one 60-foot-diameter, plus replacing the old scale and building new office space, to complete grain- and bean-receiving facilities.

Last year, the Cooperative Elevator Company spent \$1.6 million building four 112 foot-high silos that have a 225,000 bushel storage capacity. When completed, Akron's facility will house 1.2-million bushels, bringing the Cooperative Elevator's total capacity to 12 million bushels — the largest grain/bean elevator in Michigan.

county-wide road mileage.

If approved, the two mills would generate about \$1.4 million for county primary roads each year and about \$408,000 for village and city street work, and would cost a \$60,000 homeowner about \$60 annually.

The county has about 336 miles of primary roads and money from that five-year tax plan would pay for improvements to about 170 miles.

Because of limited revenue, the county will fund improvements to less than 10 miles of primary road work this year.

"The county expects to do about 6.5 miles of primary road resurfacing this year. We should do about 20 to 30 miles of primary roadwork a year, but the funds just haven't been there so they've had to wait," said Martin.

"With having to match state and federal funds that is all we will be able to do this year on primary roads."

The scheduled work is on Atwater Road between Ruth Road and M-25, to cost \$680,000.

## New Owendale tower near

After several delays, work should begin soon to replace Owendale's 81-year-old water tower.

"We are waiting for FHA (Farmers Home Administration) to approve the plans. They should be approved in about two weeks and then we can go out for bids," said President Walter Howard, Jr.

"We've changed plans and want to erect a standpipe instead of a water tower," said Howard. "We have an elevated water tower now, and we were going to go with the same type of design, but when we found about the savings and the benefits of a standpipe, we changed."

The change to a standpipe will allow for easier maintenance, he added. "We want to go with a standpipe because of the glass lining there is about 75% less maintenance with one," said Howard. "You don't have to clean and paint it every five years. All you have to do is drain it and wash the walls down. This will save us a lot of money."

Howard estimates the glass lining will save about \$25,000. Also, constructing a glass-lined standpipe is about \$30,000 cheaper than traditional methods.

**Total cost of the project is \$95,000** which includes replacing some six-inch waterlines, as well as adding 20 new fire hydrants and new shut-offs where needed. There are about 108 water customers in the village.

In other village related projects, Owendale Council members approved a 50% tax abatement for 12 years for Berger & Company's \$300,000 expansion.

"They plan to put up a silo, a dryer and a cleaning station," said Howard, expected to begin in June.

### USA TRACK TEAM EARNS TCC 4TH SPOT

The USA boys' track team finished fourth in the Thumb C league meet at Mayville last week, tallying 74.5 points.

The team of Dave Scharich, Jesse Karls, Greg Eremia and Mike Alderson won the 3200m relay event in 8:32.92 and were selected as All-Conference members.

Placing second in the 400m run was Paul Mitchell in 53.78. Scharich was second in the 800m run in 2:08.09, and Alderson was second in the 3200m run in 10:09.71. All three were named to the All-Conference Second Team.

Eremia placed third in the 300m hurdles in 42.02, while Karls was third in the 800m run in 2:09.00 and Scharich was third in the long jump (18' 4 1/2").

At the same meet, the Patriot girls were edged by Reese and Mayville, finishing with 109 points. Christie Achenbach was first in the 3200m run in 11:57.2 and in the 1600m run in 5:20.1. She also finished second in the 800m in 2:27.4.

Chris Doud was third in the shot put (33' 3 1/4") and in the discus (97'0"). Linda Davilla was second in the high jump (4'10") and in the 300 hurdles in 49.74.

The 400m relay team was second in 59.94 while the 800m relay team was second in 1:59.0.

On Saturday, the Patriots competed in the regionals in Cass City, and Achenbach took two firsts, and will go onto state competition at Bay City Western on June 4.

She finished first in the 1600m run in 5:15.81, and first in the 3200m run in 11:49.23.

Linda Davilla was sixth in the 100m hurdles in 17.36, while Chris Doud was fourth in the shot put (33'10") and sixth in the discus (104'). With those performances, Doud goes on to state. Linda Davilla tied for fourth (5'0") Jessica Bennette was sixth in the high jump (5'0"), and both qualified for a state berth. USA also finished sixth in the 400m relay in 54.73 with the team of Bennette, Angie Davila, Linda Davila and Nicole Weber.

The team of Katie Bertsch, Achenbach, Stacy Turschak and April VanBevern finished sixth in the 3200m relay in 10:37.10.

The boys' 3200m relay team consisting of Mike Alderson, Greg Eremia, Dave Scharich, and Jesse Karls just missed qualifying for state competition by finishing third in 8:29.50. Scharich was sixth in the 800m run in 2:07.64 and fourth in the long jump (20'1 3/4") and Eremia was third in the 300m hurdles in 41.85, qualifying for state. Alderson was third in the 3200m run in 10:09.71, qualifying for state.

### CASEVILLE TRACKSTERS LED BY JAMIE JENSEN

Once again, Jamie Jensen proved to be the top female track team member for Caseville, as she took the Eagles' lone first place finish in the North Central League's meet. Jensen was first in the high jump, clearing the 4'10" bar.

The Jensen dynasty continued at last week's North Central League meet when Jeremy Jensen took first in the 400m dash, while sister Jamie was first in the high jump.

And Saturday, it was on to regionals at Sandusky, when Jamie Jensen again won the high jump (5'0"), and Jeremy was second in the 400m dash.

With those performances, both qualified for the state meet at Bay City John Glenn on Saturday, June 4.

### LAKERS WIN 2 TRACK TITLES, A SCHOOL FIRST

The Lakers track team took home two league titles last week, with the boys' and girls' teams finishing first in the league meet at Cass City.

The girls won their title outright, while the boys share their championship with Marlette and Bad Axe.

This marks the first time in Laker history that both the teams have won their respective titles. And because the Blue Bay Conference is being absorbed by the Thumb C Conference, it's the last BBC title to be awarded.

Brian Gebauer was named the male Athlete of the Meet by winning the most points. Gebauer won the pole vault (12'0"), while Chris Schember took the discus (141'6"), Eric Gady took the long jump (19'1") and Ben Krebs was first in the high jump (6'0").

The girls' team added to their district title by winning the regional championship on Saturday, and several team members qualified for state competition.

Kim Sturm took first in the discus (120'2"), and second in the shot put (37'2"), and will compete at state in both events. Jenny Murdoch was first in the long jump (16' 2 3/4") and will go on to state. Angie Weidman was third in the high jump (5'2") and also goes on to state. Dawn Stuart was third in the high jump (15' 5 3/4").

Wendy Russell qualified for state with a second in the 100m dash in 13.19, and will also compete in the 400m dash after her second place regional finish in 1:01.53. Sarah Krebs qualified with a second in the 800m run in 2:27.83.

Dawn Stuart, Russell, Nicole Kolar and Murdoch teamed up to take second in the 800m relay in 1:50.20 and qualified for state, and Krebs, Murdoch, Kolar and Russell together finished fourth in the 1600m relay in 4:20.60 to qualify for state. Kolar was also fifth in the 100m hurdles in 17.13.

On the boys' side, Chris Schember was the only member of the team to qualify for state, with a second place finish in the

discus (133'9"). Brian Gebauer was fifth in the pole vault (11'8"), missing the qualifying cutoff by six inches. Eric Gady was sixth in the long jump (19'5 3/4").

State competition is Saturday, June 4 at Bay City Western High School.

Krebs also took first in the 110 hurdles in 15.76 and Mike Ignash took the 100m dash in 11.65.

Gebauer was second in the long jump (18'11 3/4") and was third in the 110 hurdles in 16.52 to rack up more points.

Leonard Young set a new school record in the 1600m run in 4:44.06.

For the girls' team, Sarah Krebs won three events, finishing first in the 800m run in 2:32.10, the 1600m run in 5:42.19, and the 3200m run in 12:58.97.

Kim Sturm was first in the shot put (37'6") and the discus (114'2"). Another school record fell when Jenny Murdoch finished first in the long jump (17' 1 1/4"), and Wendy Russell set a new school record in the 400m run in 1:01.41.

The 3200m relay team finished first in 11:06.97.

The Laker tennis team finished in second place at the Laker Invitational. Sandusky was first while Bad Axe was third and Yale fourth.

The Laker doubles team of Allison Pirret and Amy Mitin won the 4th doubles championship by defeating Neil Turner and Kris Dorry of Yale 7-6, 6-4.

Billy Smith at No. 1 singles, Tim Young at No. 2 singles, and Matt Pauly at No. 4 singles all advanced to the championship finals of their respective flights before they were defeated.

Eric Kozlkey of Sandusky defeated Smith 6-3, 6-0. Scott Rich of Sandusky defeated Young by default because of injury, and Jeremy Simmons of Sandusky downed Matt Pauly 4-6, 7-5, 6-2.

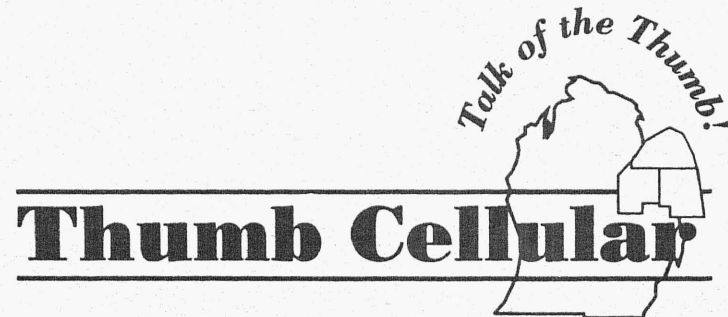

## 1. Loitering of Minors Prohibited; Hours of Curfew

It shall be unlawful for any minor under the age of 17 years to loiter, idle, wander, stroll, or play in or upon the public streets, highways, roads, alleys, parks, playgrounds, or other public grounds, public places and public buildings, places of amusement and entertainment, vacant lots or other unsupervised places, between the hours of 11 o'clock P.M. and 6 o'clock A.M., immediately following, official Village time; provided, however, that the provisions of this section do not apply to a minor accompanied by his or her parent, guardian, or other adult person having the care and custody of the minor, or where the minor is upon an emergency errand or legitimate business directed by his or her parent, guardian or other adult person having the care and custody of the minor.

Each violation of the provision of this section shall constitute a separate offense.

## 2. Responsibility of Parents

It shall be unlawful for the parent, guardian, or other adult person having the care and custody of a minor under the age of 17 years to knowingly permit such minor to loiter, idle, wander, stroll or play in or upon the public streets, highways, roads, alleys, parks, playgrounds, or other public grounds, public places and public buildings, places of amusement and entertainment, vacant lots or other unsupervised places between the hours of 11 o'clock P.M. and 6 o'clock A.M., immediately following, official Village time; provided, however, that the provisions of this section do not apply when the minor is accompanied by his or her parent, guardian, or other adult person having the care and custody of the minor, or where the minor is upon an emergency errand or legitimate business directed by his or her parent, guardian, or other adult person having the care and custody of the minor.

Each violation of the provisions of this section shall constitute a separate offense.

## 3. Penalties

Any person or persons convicted of violating any provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars or by imprisonment in the county jail for a period of not more than ninety (90) days or both, such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.

ORDINANCE #94-4  
VILLAGE OF OWENDALE,  
MICHIGAN  
PARKING: HOURS PROHIBITED

An ordinance to prohibit the parking or leaving of vehicles or obstructions upon the streets and alleys of the Village during certain hours.

## THE VILLAGE OF OWENDALE ORDAINS:

## 1. Hours Parking Prohibited

No person, firm, co-partnership, association or corporation shall hereafter park any automobile, truck, trailer or other vehicle, object or obstruction upon any part of the traveled portion of any street or alley within the Village, or leave or permit the same to be parked, standing upon or occupying any such portion of any such street or alley, between the hours of two and six o'clock in the morning of any day, official Village time, or cause the same to be done in any manner.

## 2. Parking Appeal Board

There is hereby created a Board of Parking Appeals, consisting of a quorum of the Village Council. The Board shall have authority to authorize permits for limited parking privileges for a designated area or location on such terms and conditions as deemed necessary where unnecessary hardship and practical difficulties exist in the literal enforcement of the parking restrictions of Section 1, of this ordinance, and where the purposes and objectives of the regulations can be substantially obtained. Application for such permits shall be filed with the Village Clerk and, when approved by the Board, the Village Clerk shall issue a permit which shall state what ordinance provisions are being waived or modified and any conditions or limitations imposed. Any vehicle parked in accordance with such a permit shall not be deemed in violation of those ordinance provisions waived.

## 3. Penalty

Any person, firm, co-partnership, association or corporation who violates this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by imprisonment in the county jail not more than ninety (90) days, or by a fine of not more than one hundred (\$100) dollars, or by both such fine and imprisonment, together with the costs of prosecution in the discretion of the Court.

## 4. Removal of Vehicle by Village

The Village may remove from the streets or alleys of the Village any automobile, truck, trailer or other vehicle, object or obstruction which may be on such streets or alleys in violation of this ordinance, and the owner, lessee, or person, firm, co-partnership, association or corporation in charge thereof shall be liable to the Village for the costs of such removal as a part of the cost of prosecution.

## 5. Effective Date

This ordinance shall become effective ten (10) days after its publication.

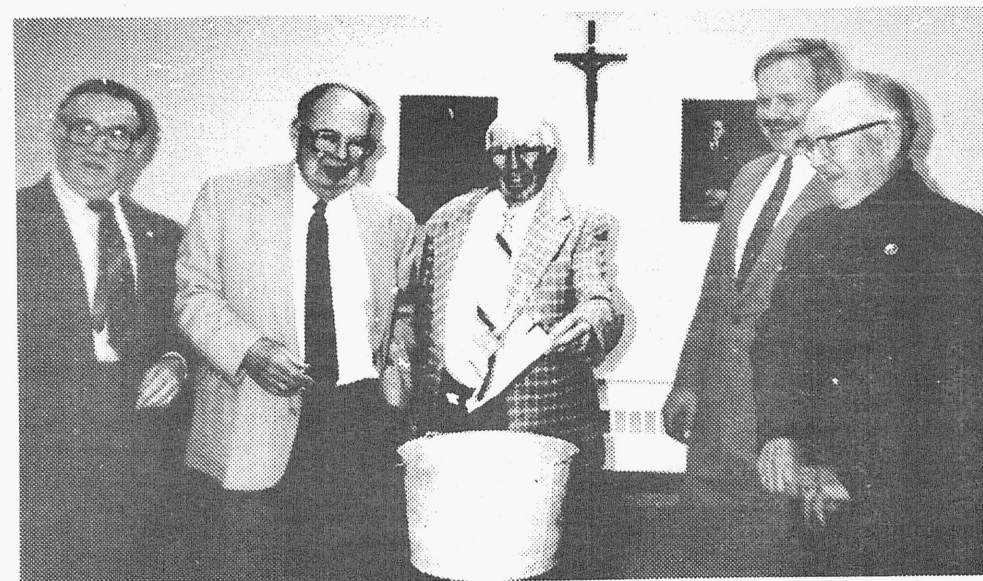

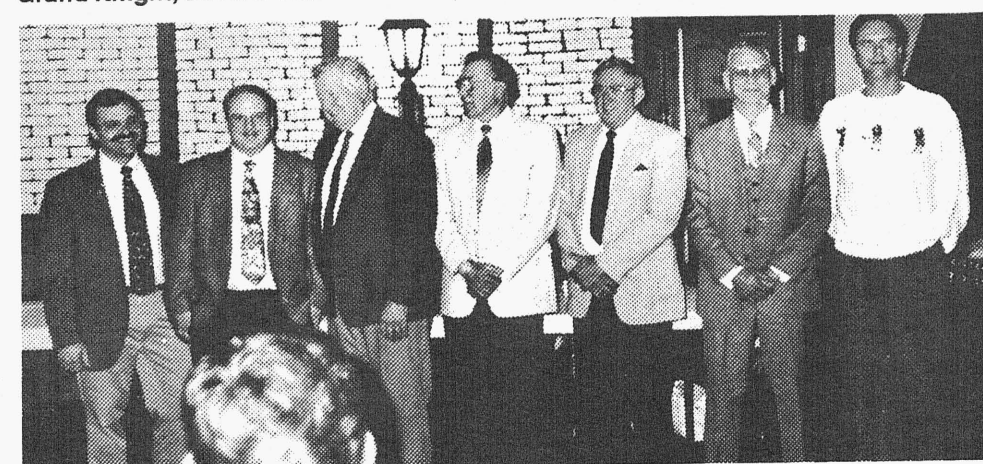

## Both brothers bag big bears

There's plenty of mounted deer, squirrels, raccoons and other game on the walls of local hunters.

But brothers Leroy and Keith Wurst just might have two of the biggest trophies around—two 9-ft. grizzly bears they took while hunting in Alaska last month.

The hunting trip was the experience of a lifetime for both, the Caseville and Pigeon brothers agree.

Leroy set up the trip for himself in late November and in January invited his brother to go along.

They traveled by air to Anchorage, Alaska, then took a small commercial plane into McGrath, just a tiny landing

strip. From there, bush planes ferried each brother and his luggage deep into the Alaska wilderness.

Snow still covered the mountain ranges, and the valleys in between still had a snow cover of about 6-8 ft., Keith Wurst said, necessitating the use of snowshoes.

The two split up to hunt in different areas, with one guide for each hunter.

Keith said his bear was spotted the day before the hunt, and he flew in to camp on the mountainside the night before. Alaskan hunting rules say that hunters must wait a day to hunt after flying around

to spot their prey.

"We had to walk about three miles to get behind it," Keith said. "The bear was sleeping and my guide said when the bear woke up, it would take only four or five seconds for it to decide whether to charge or run the other way."

"I was ready to shoot when it woke up."

Leroy's bear wasn't quite as easy to take.

He and his guide walked up a slight slope and as the bear came over the crest of the slope, he spotted the two hunters.

The bear decided to turn tail and run, which made shooting a bit dicey.

After several shots from Leroy's .378 Weatherby Magnum, the bear wasn't moving, but the guide refused to get near the bear for at least half an hour, Leroy Wurst said.

Neither hunter has quite decided what to do with their bears now.

Keith said he may have his bear's hide made into a rug, but he may later decide to have it mounted.

Leroy has already decided to have his bear full-mounted, but doubts his wife Janice will agree to have the bear around the house. So that 1,000-lb. grizzly may grace the lobby of Huron Casting, Inc., in Pigeon, of which he is a co-owner.

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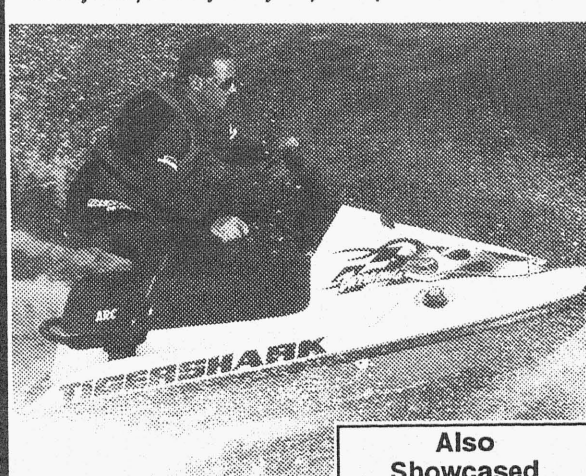

Alfred "Kelly" Filion, 88 of Filion and Caseville, passed away Friday, May 20 at Huron County Medical Care Facility, Bad Axe.

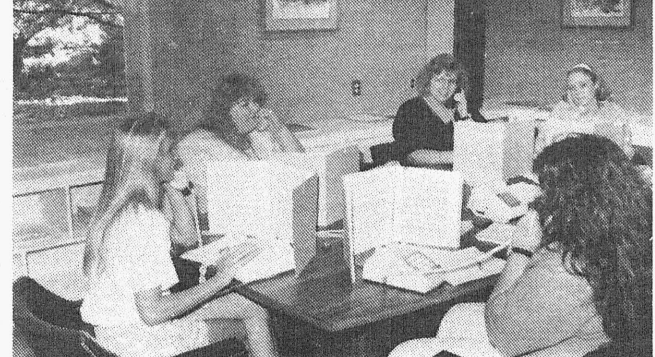

## Vandalism suspected in derailment

Huron and Eastern Railroad Company officials are seeking information about vandalism which caused a train derailment and damaged a portion of track about 11:45 p.m. April 29 in Akron.

"Our eastbound train carrying 77 cars was going towards Sebawaing when it ran through the switch because the switch indicated it was okay, when in reality it had been tampered with," said Jack Conser, Huron and Eastern Railroad Company vice president and general manager, Saginaw.

"It was vandalism, and when we catch the person or persons responsible, we will prosecute them to the full extent of the law," he said. The act was a violation of Federal Interstate Commerce.

None of the rail cars overturned. However the engine did leave the tracks, causing damage to the rails and engine.

Workers were able to re-rail the engine about 5 a.m. Saturday. Officials estimated the train was traveling about 10 m.p.h. No one was injured in the incident.

"It was a willful act and someone could have gotten seriously injured," said Conser. "We were able to use the track Saturday after making temporary repairs. The siding is out of service yet and

## ORDINANCE #94-3 - DISORDERLY PERSON VILLAGE OF OWENDALE, MICHIGAN

An ordinance to preserve the public peace.

THE VILLAGE OF OWENDALE ORDAINS:

### Sec. 1. Definition.

A person is a disorderly person if the person is any of the following:

1. A person of sufficient ability who refuses or neglects to support his family.
2. A common prostitute.
3. A window peeper.
4. A person who engages in an illegal occupation or business.
5. A person who is intoxicated in a public place and who is either endangering directly the safety of another person or of property or is acting in a manner that causes a public disturbance.
6. A person who engages in indecent or obscene conduct in a public place.
7. A vagrant.
8. A person found begging in a public place.
9. A person found loitering in a house of ill fame or prostitution or place where prostitution or lewdness is practiced, encouraged or allowed.
10. A person who loiters in or about a place where an illegal occupation or business is being conducted.
11. A person who is found jostling or roughly crowding people unnecessarily in a public place.
12. A person who is found with stolen property.
13. A person who shall by word or conduct commit such act or acts as may cause civil commotion or cause or be likely to cause injury to public or private property, or to life of person of another.
14. A person who shall throw or cause to be thrown any missile likely to cause bodily injury or property damage.
15. A person who uses any light or flare, on an automobile or otherwise, in such a manner as to cause annoyance to others or be likely to endanger life or property.

### Sec. 2. Indecent language.

No person shall use indecent immoral, obscene, vulgar or insulting language in public.

### Sec. 3. Indecent exposure.

No person shall exhibit himself in any place of entertainment or in any public place, nude or indecently clad; no person shall indulge in any indecent, immoral or suggestive conduct in such places; no person shall designedly make any open or indecent exposure of his person or of the person of another.

### Sec. 4. Obscene literature, devices, and shows.

1. No person shall print, publish, show, sell or offer for sale, exhibit or otherwise dispose of any printed matter, pictures, or devices containing indecent or obscene language or pictures which by the context thereof or purpose thereof tends to corrupt public morals; nor shall any person have in his possession any such articles.

2. No person shall show, or cause to be shown, any show, or pictures, whether a personal performance or by mechanical means which is immoral obscene or suggestive or which tends to corrupt the public morals.

### Sec. 5. Fortune telling.

No person shall, for consideration, predict future events, or pretend to enable another to recover lost or stolen property, give success in business enterprise speculation or games of chance or to make one person dispose of property in favor of another, by cards, tokens trances, by inspection of the hands or the skull, by mind reading, or by consulting the movements of the heavenly bodies or by other means.

### Sec. 6. Gambling and lotteries.

1. No person or his agent or employee shall, directly or indirectly take, receive, or accept money or valuable thing, with the agreement, understanding or allegation that money or any valuable thing will be paid or delivered to any such person where such payment or delivery is contingent upon the result of a race, contest game or the happening of an event not known to the parties to be certain.

2. No person shall keep any device used for the purposes in Paragraph (1) mentioned.

3. No person shall use own or let any place or property and knowingly suffer acts forbidden under Paragraph (1).

4. No person shall assist, solicit or advertise for, or occupy any place wherein acts forbidden under Paragraph (1) are conducted.

5. In addition to other penalties hereinafter provided the Police Department may seize and destroy devices in paragraph (2) mentioned.

### Sec. 7. Furnishing intoxicating liquor.

1. No person shall knowingly sell, give or furnish alcoholic liquor or beer to any drunk or intoxicated person or disorderly person.

2. No person shall sell give or furnish alcoholic liquor or beer to any person under the age of 21 years.

### Sec. 8. Crowds and riots, public address.

1. No person shall make or assist in making any improper noise or disturbance quarrel or riot by which the peace and order of the community are disturbed; nor shall any person or persons collect or stand in crowds, or remain loitering on the public ways, or other places so as to interfere with free and uninterrupted passage of other persons.

2. No person or persons shall address the public either personally or by mechanical means whether by word, music, or other means, upon any public way, or place, except in such places designated by Village Council, or by written permission from the Village President or the Chief of Police.

3. No person shall disrupt or aid in disrupting in any manner, any service of worship, or any other assembled for lawful purposes.

4. No person shall shoot any air gun spring gun, cross bow or firearm, or other dangerous weapon or instrument in the Village of Owendale.

5. No person shall explode any fireworks, cannon or other instrument set forth in Section 243 of the Penal code of the State of Michigan as amended by Act 92 Public Acts 1941, unless the terms and conditions thereof have been first complied with; and no person shall sell, or expose for sale such fireworks or other instruments above mentioned.

6. No person shall ring any bell, blow any horn or operate any other noise-making device or by mouth or voice make sounds and noises causing annoyance to others, or be likely to annoy or disturb others.

### Sec. 9. Penalties

Any person firm or corporation convicted of violating any provisions of this ordinance or convicted of being a disorderly person under the provisions of the same shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred (\$100.00) dollars or by imprisonment in the County jail for a period not to exceed ninety (90) days or both, such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.

### Sec. 10. Invalidity.

Should any portion of this ordinance be declared invalid for any reason, the remainder of the ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

### Sec. 11. Effect.

This ordinance shall become effective ten (10) days after its publication.
