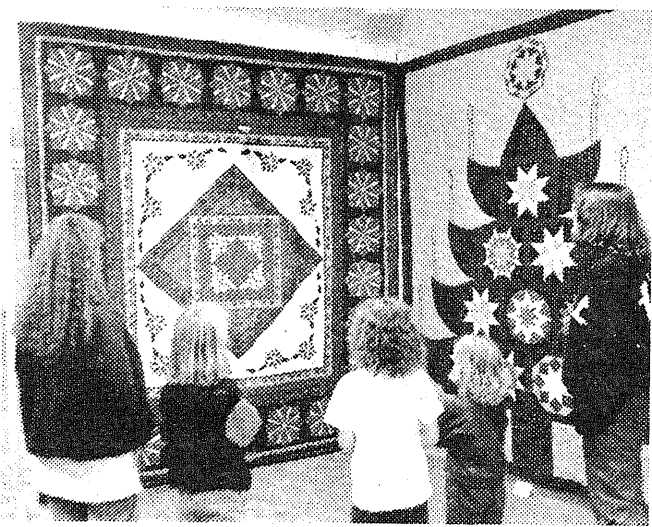

If happens so quickly!

When compared with other sporting activities, hunting, fishing and camping are very safe where serious injuries or even death are concerned. Statistics show you have a better chance of survival while deer hunting than you do riding a bicycle, which by the way, is the most dangerous recreational activity you can partake in.

However, statistics are little consolation when a tragedy strikes your hunting or fishing party, and especially the small solace when the accident involves you.

Although outdoor accidents occur all year long, the late fall hunting and fishing seasons have the climate and weather conditions that produce excellent hunting and fishing opportunities, but also necessitate one being extra careful when undertaking his/her favorite sport.

When an accident does happen, and one just did along the shores of Saginaw Bay, people, especially the news media and Coast Guard, are quick to condemn all hunters and fishermen for being a bunch of "scatterbrains" who don't know enough to come in out of the rain.

But, in reality, the true outdoorsman knows that windy conditions on the Bay promote good duck hunting, thin Bay ice makes for great perch fishing, and fast, nearly freezing rivers, are a way of life to a steelheader.

So, what's the difference between a great hunting or fishing trip and a mind-numbing tragedy? Some will say "caution," others will clamor "experience" is the key, and still others will stand behind just plain "common sense."

Whatever the reasons for accidents happening, and you could make a million writing a book which could prevent all of them, I have come to one major conclusion; they happen so quickly!!!

The other morning at the local coffee shop, I shared a table with several, very experienced hunters and fishermen.

Talk turned to the recent hunting accident which had taken place a few miles from where we sat. In hindsight, solutions to the accident were tossed across the table like a pingpong ball during a championship match.

While all were very valid, I found myself thinking of how easy it is to make such a decision when you are warm, dry and have a steaming mug of coffee cradled between your palms—and, from personal experience, how slow the mind responds when numbed with cold wind, freezing water, or disorientation.

As I listened further, I overheard each and every one of them detailing a harrowing account they had encountered which could have ended in tragedy—and if they had a second chance, would never attempt whatever it was they had attempted originally.

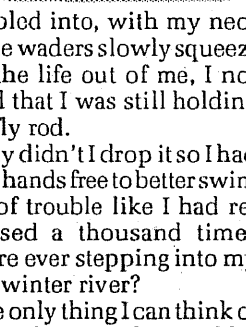
I was immediately relieved, because up until that point, I thought I was the only one who had experienced those situations.

I remembered a certain steelheading day when I cautiously followed my guide across a swollen, and freezing cold, West Michigan river.

One minute I was picking my way through a gravelly shoal the next I was upside down with my head playing bumper pool with submerged logs and other unseen river debris.

How I got righted, I will never know.

But standing neck deep in the hole I unknowingly

tumbled into, with my neoprene waders slowly squeezing the life out of me, I noticed that I was still holding my fly rod.

Why didn't I drop it so I had both hands free to better swim out of trouble like I had rehearsed a thousand times before ever stepping into my first winter river?

The only thing I can think of is that it happened so quickly! I've fallen overboard on a duck hunting trip and taken my older brother with me. It was a day when nobody in their right mind should have been hunting, but we were, and so were several other hunters.

The water turned out to be only chest deep and I was able to steady the boat while my brother climbed back in, and then I inched over the bow after he had plunged a punt pole alongside to add to the boat's stability.

It could have been disastrous, but it wasn't, and I am thankful for that.

A couple of evenings ago, I called a good buddy from Arizona to check on how he fared in his annual Colorado elk hunt. Fred is a very seasoned hunter and fisherman, and if I had to pick a guy to be

in an emergency with, it would certainly be him.

He owns his own horses, has hunted the same wilderness area for more than 20 years, and I plan on fishing the high country with him for brookies and cutthroat come June. (We didn't make the trip last year as the snow did not melt in time.)

It seems Fred and his brother Wayne had reached the trailhead a couple of days before elk season. They scouted, fished and had a great time.

That was before the snow began to fall.

The day before the opener, Fred decided to descend to the trailhead. Their spike camp was pitched eight miles from the trailhead and offered little or no protection from the wind-driven snows.

The trip took them most of the day as they had to round up their five horses, pack up the camp, and break a trail through the two-plus feet of snow which had already fallen. They pitched camp that night in a spruce grove and fell into bed exhausted from the day's work.

Fred woke before morning and, upon hearing the blizzard still raging, decided to light a fire in the stove and plan their escape down the mountain before they really got into trouble.

He struck several matches before he gave up. They must be wet he thought.

He then produced a Cricket Propane Lighter and snapped it furiously before deciding that it was out of fuel. Even his Strike-A-Light stick would not spark.

With his mind numbed he

considered crawling back into his sleeping bag to catch a little sleep.

Had he done that, he and his brother may never have seen the next day. For when his oxygen-starved brain finally

focused on the tent door's zipper, he ripped it down and clawed through the blanket of snow covering the tent. A tragedy had been avoided, and it had happened so quickly!!!!

Sebewaing aids retirement

The New Year will be a little greener for retired Sebewaing Village employes in the Municipal Employees Retirement System. Sebewaing Council members approved a benefit plan that increases retirement benefits for 14 former employes, which goes into effect Jan. 1.

The proposal gives retirees a 2% cost-of-living increase per year since the last time it was done, on Jan. 1, 1990, said Deputy Clerk Lorraine Fluogge. Total cost is \$67,000 with \$6,111 amortized each year for 15 years.

"The money is not coming out of our pocket. It's coming out of the fund," said Councilman John Schneider. "The fund is funded at 109%. If we leave it go, it will get to a point where it could impact us all."

Also, included in the proposal is doing an actuarial study to determine the annual cost of benefits. —BY MARY DRIER





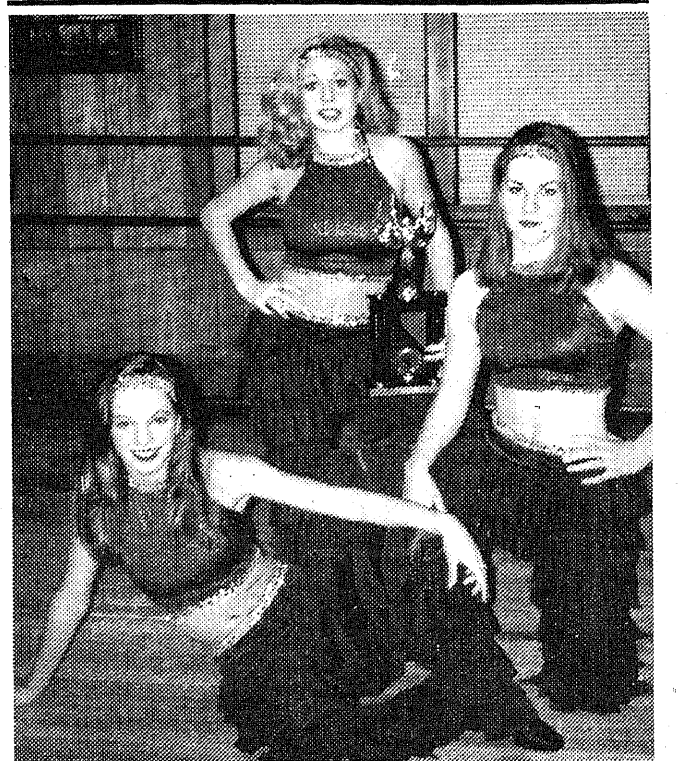
