#### Pigeon mulls \$3.1 million in **Huron Casting expansions** Industries asking the Pigeon Village Council for tax abate-

ments must now enter into an agreement with the Village, after Council approved the acton last week. State law requires governmental units and industries to have

a written agreement and the village is complying with that law, said Village Clerk Janet Heckman. An agreement was signed between Huron Casting, Inc. and

the Village because the company had received a tax abatement last January. "It kind of protects the village," Heckman said. "We have an

obligation to the company and it has an obligation to us." A governmental unit can include provisions in an agreement

that spell out penalties to an industrial facility if it moves before the abatement expires. Officials from Huron Casting appeared at the meeting for permission to transer an existing Industrial Facilities Exemp-

tion from the newly acquired Pigeon Manufacturing faciolity. The company submitted an application for a \$3.1 million abatement. If granted, the company would pay half the normal amount in property taxes for the next 12 years on that portion of the project.

In other business, Pigeon Council:

Adopted an ordinance that allows village police to enforce the under-21 drinking and driving law. Anyone under 21 is not allowed to have any bodily alcohol content.

Authorized Mayor Dave Geiger and Heckman to obtain a short-term loan to complete the purchase of about eight acres of land north of Recreation Park in anticipation of a grant from the state Department of Natural Resources. The purchased land will be used for an addition to the existing park.

NEW POSTAL RATES PART II: Last week, we talked about the new Postal Service rates, since first-class mail rises from 29¢ to 32¢ for a one-ounce letter early next year. We Americans don't really have it that bad — here are first-class letter rates in several other countries:

### M-24 work WILL start in '95!

There is yet another curve in the long and winding story of the remaining extension of M-24 from Cleaver Road in Caro to M-138 and on to M-25 at Unionville.

The state Department of Transportation last month said funding wasn't available, and that bid-letting would be in December, 1995, with construction to begin in 1996. However, all that has changed.

"We are going to build the cross-country section of M-24 in 1995," says Robin Pannecouk of M-DOT. "I have been in touch with our planning, our district and bureau of highways. Our commitment is to identify funding it and to make it available.

The information released in November was correct at the time, but some new developments occurred, noted Pannecouk. "The plan is to let the project this spring with construction this summer," says Robert Welke, MDOT's deputy director of

"I can't say that we have the money in the bank for the project right now, but we have been approved to receive some additional federal funds.

"We expect to receive about \$34.7 million, and one of the priorities of the money is to fund the M-24 extension. That







### Caseville to again seek new village manager

Caseville Village trustees decided last week to keep the village manager form of government, but a new manager won't be on the scene until at least March.

Former Manager Gary Kuckel was hired in November 1993 and served six months before Council chose not to renew his

The Village has no manager right now, but Council agreed at its meeting last week to advertise to fill the position. Village officials want to study their budget more thoroughly to determine what salary range they can afford, said Village

A bid of \$79,100 was accepted for village-owned property on Oak Point. Village officials had purchased the property in the late 1970s when the village's lake intake was installed offshore, in case a new intake might be needed in the future.







He's like every other eightyear-old, except that he is battling a very rare blood disorder called Aplastic Anemia - and will be spending his holidays in the hospital, undergoing a bone marrow transplant on Thursday, Dec. 28 at Harper Hospital in De-

The son of Christine Wineman of Pigeon and Jim Wineman of Bay City, the young Wineman's illness was diagnosed last spring after his mother noticed some unusual bruises on his arms and his abdomen.

After having blood tests done through Pigeon pediatrician Dr. Kala Reddy's office, Wineman was sent to Mott's Childrens' Hospital, Ann Arbor, where they finally diagnosed Aplastic

**Aplastic Anemia** results from a failure of the bone marrow to produce enough red cells, white cells and platelets. There are many causes of the disease: heredity, viruses, chemical exposures, side effects from medication, etc.

With Aplastic Anemia, a person becomes pale, tired and has a tendency to bleed. With Severe Aplastic Anemia, a person requires numerous blood transfusions. Aplastic Anemia is not a cancer, but a serious blood disorder that can be life threatening if not treated. After 10 days of potent

drug therapy last summer, doctors hoped that Wineman's bone marrow would respond and produce the needed blood cells and platelets on its own.

## Caseville's Emma Hagen is 95 - on Christmas Day!

Christmas morning 1899: As Amil and Emma Milcer continue their preparations for Christmas church services, Emma feels the first contractions that mean her third child is ready to be born.

Sending their son and daughter off to church with neighbors, the Milcers stay at home on their 10-acre farm just outside Ann Arbor. Hours later, daughter Emma makes her appearance — a very special Christmas gift to the German immigrant couple.

Almost 95 years later, Emma Milcer Hagen remembers those days on the farm. She remembers the special traditions her parents kept, the special cookies and breads her mother baked for the holi-

That small farm was sold when Emma was 14, and along with pieces of neighboring farms, is now the site of the University of Michigan football stadium.

Her parents grew berries for their main income, producing strawberries, raspberries, thimbleberries and blackberries to sell to local markets — and folks who knew the "berryman" would have the best berries around she recalls.

Amil Milcer was one of the first in that area to have both underground and overhead irrigation for his berry crops, Hagen says.

#### **VILLAGE OF PIGEON** Ordinance #117

LESS THAN 21 YEARS OF AGE AND HAVING ANY BODILY ALCOHOL CONTENT

Sec. 5.17(1) A person who is less than 21 years of age, whether licensed or not. shall not operate a vehicle upon a highway or other place open to the general public or generally accessible to motor vehicles, including an area designated for the parking of vehicles, within the Village of Pigeon if the person has any bodily alcohol content. As used in this subsection, "any bodily alcohol content" means either of the following:

(a) A blood alcohol content of not less than 0.02% or more than 0.07% by weigh

(b) Any presence of alcohol within a person's body resulting from the consumption of intoxicating liquor, other than consumption of intoxicating liquor as a part of a generally recognized religious service or ceremony. Sec. 5.17(2) If a person is convicted of violating subsection (1), the following

(a) Except as otherwise provided in subdivision (b), the person is guilty of a

misdemeanor punishable by 1 or both of the following: (i) Service to the community for a period of not more than 45 days.

(b) If the violation occurs within 7 years of 1 or more prior convictions, the person may be sentenced to 1 or both of the following:

(i) Service to the community for a period of not more than 60 days. (ii) A fine of not more than \$500.00

(c) The court shall impose license sanctions pursuant to Section 625b of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

(d) A person sentenced to perform service to the community under this subsection shall not receive compensation, and shall reimburse the Village o Pigeon for the cost of supervision incurred by the Village of Pigeon as a result of the person's activities in that service.

(e) As used in this subsection, "prior conviction" means a conviction for a violation of State law Section 625(1), (3), (4), (5), or (6), former Section 625(1) or (2), or former Section 625b, a local ordinance substantially corresponding to Section 625(1), (3), or (6), former Section 625(1) or (2), or former Section 625b or a law of another state substantially corresponding to Section 625(1), (3), (4),

(5), or (6), former Section 625(1) or (2), or former Section 625b. Sec. 5. 17(3) In addition to imposing the sanctions prescribed above, the cour may, order the person to pay the costs of the prosecution.

Sec. 5.17(4) In a prosecution for a violation of subsection (1), the defendant shall bear the burden of proving that the consumption of intoxicating liquor was a part of a generally recognized religious service or ceremony by a preponder ance of the evidence.

Sec. 5.17(5) This Ordinance shall become effective 20 days after its passage
