She's celebrating first Christmas in her own apartment

She goes to work every day, shares an apartment with a roommate, cooks her own meals, plays her favorite sports on weekends and attends church every Sunday.

And this holiday, she has very special reasons to cel-

It doesn't sound like an extra-ordinary life, but for 36year-old Annie Essian, these everyday accomplishments are milestones in her life.

Born developmentally disabled, 10th in a family of 13 children, Annie has spent her entire adult life living in the home of one of her siblings, most recently for 2 1/2 years

in Pigeon. But all that has changed since Dec. 3, when a federally funded program, Community Supported Living Arrangements (CSLA), has made it possible for Annie to move into an apartment in Bad Axe with another developmentally disabled adult.

Now instead of molding her life into the lives of other busy family members, Annie has been able to make a new life of her own, making choices - and having freedom she never dreamed pos-

There was a time not too long ago, remembers her sister-in-law Sheri Lynn Essian of Pigeon, married to Annie's brother Patrick, when that

freedom she now savors was a possibility she dreaded.

"Whenever we mentioned the idea of 'someday maybe she could live on her own,' she would run into her room and cry," recalls Sheri Lynn, who as a mother with three young children of her own, was also Annie's daily nurterer and care-giver.


"It has been wonderful to see her grow and mature to this point. I always knew it was a possibility for her, but she had to come to that realization for herself."

Sheri Lynn admits that maybe the busy-ness of their household helped Annie come to that realization

"With three children of our own to take care of, and the 'distance factor' of many of Annie's activities, we just couldn't get her to all of things she now takes full advantage of," explains Sheri Lynn.

"Now she bowls and snowshoes for Special Olympics, is involved in the 4-H Handi-Riders program, plays basketball and is in a central location for so many oppor-

Just keeping track of all of Annie's weekly activities requires a daily calendar on the wall of Annie's new kitchen. Now when Sheri Lynn or one of Annie's brothers or sisters call to make plans with

her, she can easily check whether or not her schedule

While Annie and her roommate giggle like college sorority sisters, they have more supervision than what most independent adults of that age group enjoy.

A "respite provider" is at

their door every morning from 6:30 to 8:30 a.m., supervising their morning activities, including dressing, breakfast, clean-up before they leave for their day of work and learning at Thumb Industries.

And a "respite provider" is back again in the afternoon and evening, until 8:30 p.m.. supervising grocery shopping, laundry and helping the women learn "life skills" that they've never needed before - like managing their own money, learning how to read directions on labels to make

simple meals, and other daily

from a caring adult who could help with the sometimes frustrating coin mechanisms and other new experiences. "The gals loved watching the dryers go round!" says Brenda, one of the respite providers who accompanied them to the laundromat.

Not all of their outings are work-related. This Thursday, four developmentally disabled adults will be joining two caregivers for a holiday trip to Frankenmuth, where they will enjoy the lights and beauty of Christmas.

Many of their other outings are taken on Saturdays, when they are less restricted with the work demands of the week, although they are required to get their apartment clean first.

Annie and her roommate are two of 19 adults in Huron County now taking advantage of the CSLA program. Administrated by Theresa Knecht from Community



> apartment, plus pay for meals and their other living expenses, explains Knecht. CSLA also looks for funds from other community resources, including the Department of Social Services, local agencies and from home health care dollars.

It has been a "new lease on life" for Annie, who has spent all 36 years of her life in the care of others.

Now she enjoys the freedom of deciding what she wants to prepare for meals (she and her roommate share cooking responsibilities every other her own apartment for the night), when she wants to go New Year and her new life.


High marks for MCC

Mennonite Central Committee moved from fifth-best relief and development agency last year to second place this year in "Money" magazine's annual ranking of the efficiency of various U.S. charities.

More significant, perhaps, is the acknowledgement MCC received from the heads of other relief and development agencies. This year, "Money" asked the heads of 111 large U.S. charities to rate their peers anonymously. Out of the third who did, consistent high marks were given to lesser-known relief groups Mennonite Central Committee and Habitat for Humanity International, the latter which has started a Huron

"We're honored by the peer-ranking," says Helen Glick, MCC Great Lakes co-director. "Our rating in 'Money' magazine will likely go up and down over the years, but our peers see the long-term results of our work. They see our workers





and volunteers in action.'

Organizations are ranked according to the percentage of income actually spent on overseas programs, compared to

what is spent on support staff and expenses. Glick credits the efforts of thousands of volunteers at both the community level and within the organization, for the high efficiency ranking MCC receives. There is also an ongoing financial commitment from congregations, community groups and individuals, making a lot of fund-raising unnecessary. MCC is the relief and development agency of the Mennonite and Brethren in Christ Churches of North America. Founded nearly 75 years ago, the agency currently has about 900 people working in 50 countries around the world.


One seat on the Kinde Village Council is open for a write-in candidate, or if no votes are cast, an appointment to the


