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## \$3 million Sebewaing Marina project stc

When Bill Kauffold sank his shovel in the sand last Wednesday afternoon, it culminated seven years of intensive planning — but the smile spreading across his face told the crowd it was well worth it.

Kauffold, along with Michigan State Waterways Commissioner Marc Howard and contractor Dick Rohde of Saginaw, took their turns at the official groundbreaking ceremony Wednesday, May 23 at the new \$3 million Sebewaing Marina site, near the mouth of the Sebewaing River.

Other officials taking part in the festivities were Jim Lewis, Sen. James Barcia's aide, who read a letter from the Senator, Village President Dave Wineman, members of the Sebewaing Village Council and members of the Sebewaing Harbor Commission.

The traditional groundbreaking marked the beginning for a new 125-slip marina which is planned to open in May 1996. It, along with the new County Park on the opposite side of the river, will make Sebewaing a prime spot for vacationing fishermen and boater from across the state.

"We plan to have earth-moving equipment on the site by next week," says Rohde. Excavation's Dick Rohde, the firm who won the bid to dig the marina.

"This is a fine moment for the Village of Sebewaing," said Howard of the State Waterways Commission, "and it is especially significant as this is the first marina to be developed under such a fund."

Application for the Harbor Act Fund, Howard referred to was made nearly four years ago, and is a new process in

which the Sebewaing Harbor Commission was able to receive the \$3 million needed to complete such a project.

The proposed marina was first presented at a public meeting held in the Sebewaing Township Office on Wednesday, Sept. 6, 1989. One hundred interested residents attended the meeting and although most everyone was in favor of the proposed marina, many did not like the idea of it being located near their property.

During the meeting, Harbor Commission Chairman Kauffold listed several reasons why Sebewaing would have an excellent chance of qualifying for grants which were then available for the acquisition of property and the construction of the marina.

Now, with the grants in place, the proper papers signed and work about to begin, it is obvious Kauffold

and other members of the Harbor Commission knew what they were talking about.

When completed, the site which covers close to seven acres, will have dockage for 125 boats, parking for as many vehicles, an expanded day-use launching site, a service facility for gas and oil, restrooms, showers, and a Harbor Master's office.

During the construction phase, several trees and buildings will be removed, streets will be relocated, and excess dirt will be moved to the end of the airport runways to form dikes which will hold refuse from future river dredging projects.

The excavation firm sees little problems with their phase of the development.

"We should incur few problems with developing the site," says Rohde, "and we should get the job done dur-

ing the present construction season."

Preliminary plans are to open the as-yet unnamed marina in May of 1996.

Operation of the new marina will be in the hands of Daryl Hill, who presently manages Riverside Marina in Caseville. Hill, along with his office manager Eunice Thorp are currently seeking a name and logo for the new marina.

"We plan to use the name and logo on many identifying items," says Thorp, "such as T-shirts, hats, jackets, and stationery."

The new marina will add many positive growth aspects to Sebewaing, and especially the Downtown Area, local officials agree.

Traffic to and from the basin will be smooth as a one-way street directs them to the site, and the elimination of the stop street at the corner of Main and Center provides an easy departure.

With a 125-boat capacity within the basin, and the possibility of another 200 boats being launched at the public site on a summer weekend, stores should see an influx of new customers.

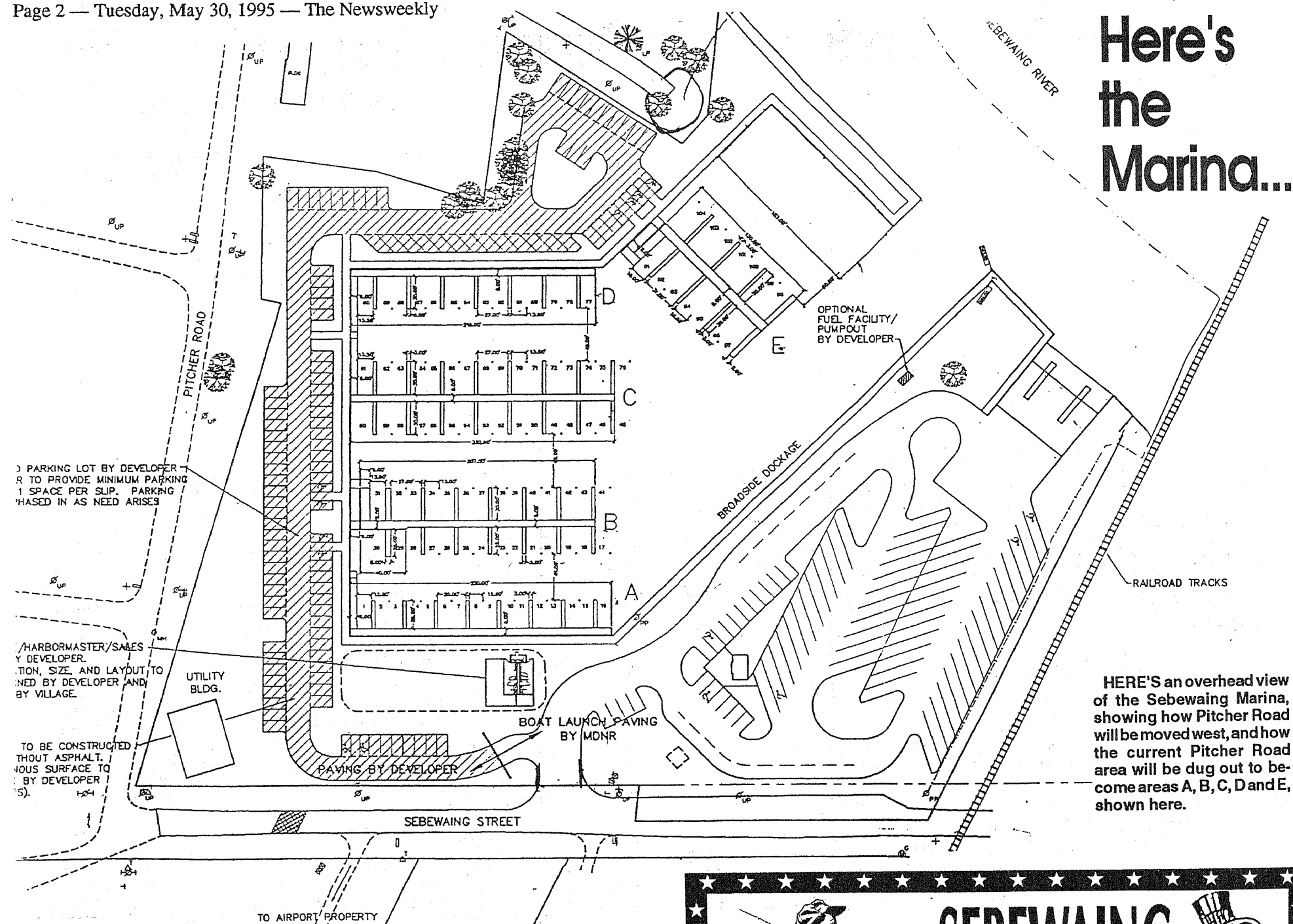
## Fair Haven vote July 10

The township pays one-third of the extra protection costs, along with Hume and Port Austin Townships — not including Caseville Township, which has no such extra millage. The Newsweekly regrets the error.

## As we see it Get fit... and you'll feel better

A recent study by the polling firm Roper Starch says people enjoy outdoor activities more than ever before... and hints at the fact that people who spend at least part of their time out-of-doors tend to be healthier and happier.

Among the questions asked were "What outdoor activity do you like best?" You may be surprised at the top answer:

Fishing.

A total of 14% of persons responding listed it as their "most-loved" activity, followed by pleasure driving at 11%, camping at 10%, swimming at 9%, picnicking and golf at 6%, bicycling and wildlife viewing at 5%, and running/jogging and hiking at 4% each.

We'd think golf and such outdoor sports would have been higher priorities, but maybe there's still frustration about the baseball strike... meaning it fell further down the list.

Who exposed people to their favorite outdoor activity? Parents accounted for 43% of that influence, usually on family camping/hiking/fishing trips.

That's followed by friends at 20%, themselves at 19%, spouse at 8% and siblings at 6%.

What outdoor activity have you enjoyed in the last 12 months, another survey question asked. 40% of those responding say they did some pleasure driving, followed by 37% who have camped in the last 12 months. That's followed by swimming at 35%, picnicking at 33%, fishing at 26%, bicycling at 22%, running/jogging at 19% and three activities tied at 18% each — boating, hiking and wildlife viewing.

So, the moral to this story is that two-thirds of us got our first taste of (and for) the outdoors from our parents, while growing up, and 31% started before age 8. What kind of impressions are YOU making these days, on the next generation? Step into the outdoors...

"They are trained to help the people," Fiebig says. "They will be glad to help you and to answer questions. That's what they're there for."

She agrees former write-in rules required exact spellings (including middle initials), but those state guidelines have been loosened in recent years. However, some people don't pay attention to the write-in rules — and those votes won't count, if they're not properly followed.

Fiebig and other local clerks also remind voters that instruction ballots and displays are available at polling sites, for people who don't want to ask others for advice.

And, with the vacancy on the USA School Board, we're already hearing of several people who plan to run as write-ins. Thanks for the help, Clerk Fiebig!

**■ Can you believe it?** Today is the 150th day of the year, TUESDAY, MAY 30, and there are only 215 days remaining... On MAY 30, 1783, the Pennsylvania Evening Post became the first daily newspaper ever published in the U.S. ... On MAY 30, 1994, Pope John Paul II issued a letter declaring that the "church has no authority whatsoever to confer priestly ordination on women" ... Bob Evans, the restaurant executive, was born in Sugar Creek, OH, on MAY 30, 1918, making him 77...

**■ Heavy rains** in Pennsylvania in MAY, 1889, caused the Conemaugh River dam to burst on MAY 31, flooding nearby Johnstown, PA, killing more than 2,300 persons and destroying thousands of homes. Nearly 800 unidentified drowning victims were buried in a common grave. The tragedy was so great that the words "Johnstown Flood" entered the language as a phrase to describe a disastrous event... The film, stage and TV actor, Don Ameche, was born MAY 31, 1908, in Kenosha, WI. He died at the age of 85... Birthdays today: Actor and actresses, Clint Eastwood 65, Sharon Gless 52 and Brooke Shields 30. Church of England special envoy and kidnapped hostage Terry Waite is 56...

**■ Whenever a new month arrives**, there follow selected monthly designations: June is, among other titles, Dairy Month, Fireworks Safety, Turkey Lovers, Fresh Fruit and Vegetable, Frozen Yogurt, Iced Tea, Rose and National Pest Control Month, to name but a few... Marilyn Monroe was born in LA on JUNE 1, 1926, and she died August 5, 1962.

The Mormon Church leader, Brigham Young, was born in Vermont on JUNE 1, 1801. He was survived by 17 wives and 47 children when he died in Salt Lake City, UT, on Aug. 29, 1877. In Utah, July 24 is a state holiday, the date when Young and his group entered into Salt Lake Valley in 1847... Singer Pat Boone is 61 today, and the longtime actor, Andy Griffith, is 69...

**■ A JUNE 2-4 festival** in Owosso commemorates James Oliver Curwood, author and conservationist who was born there on JUNE 12, 1878. Curwood wrote so colorfully about life in the Canadian Northwest that many readers believed he lived there, but he was an Owossoan and lived in Shiawassee County all his life. He built Curwood Castle for a studio and it's open to the public. The festival has many events and draws about 100,000 visitors. Curwood died Aug. 13, 1927... Actor Stacy Keach Jr. is 54 today and Jerry Mathers, who was "the Beaver" in "Leave It to Beaver" is 47...

**■ JUNE 3 is Cows on the Concourse** Day at Madison, WI, when all major dairy breeds are on exhibit, together with tasty dairy treats, antique tractors and crafts in honor of June Dairy Month... The Duke of Windsor, who as King Edward VIII had abdicated the British throne on December 11, 1936, was married to Wallis Warfield Simpson of Baltimore, MD, in Monts, France, on JUNE 3, 1937... Sally Jan Priesand was ordained a rabbi on JUNE 3, 1972, making her the first woman rabbi in the U.S. ... Actor Tony Curtis is 70 today and the great Shakespearean actor, Maurice Evans, is 94...

**■ SUNDAY, JUNE 4** is Pentecost, commemorating the descent of the Holy Spirit onto the Apostles, 50 days after Easter. Recognized since the 3rd century, it's also called Whitsunday... JUNE 4 marks the 6th anniversary of the massacre in Tiananmen Square, Beijing, China, when the People's Army fired upon and ran tanks over protestors who had been demonstrating there for more than a month...

Only one day short of one year after the first man flew in a free balloon in 1783, Marie Thible of Lyon, France, accompanied by a pilot, became the first woman in history to also float in a free-flying balloon, on JUNE 4, 1784. The balloon reached a height of 8,500 feet and the flight lasted 45 minutes... The "Gunsmoke" actor, Dennis Weaver, is 71 today, and another actor, who became "Bat Masterson," Gene Barry, is 74 today...

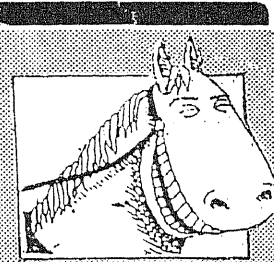
**■ On JUNE 5, 1968**, Senator Robert Kennedy, was shot while campaigning for the Democratic presidential nomination in a Los Angeles hotel. He died the following day, and Sirhan Sirhan, who was convicted of the murder, is still in prison for the murder...

The first public demonstration of a hot-air balloon flight took place at Annonay, France on JUNE 5, 1783, the first sustained flight of any object achieved by man. The Montgolfier brothers were co-inventors and co-pilots of the 33-foot diameter globe which rose to an estimated 1,500 feet and traveled windborne for about 7,500 feet before landing 10 minutes later (see previous JUNE 4, 1784, item about the first woman flying a hot-air balloon exactly 365 days later)(yes, 365 days later, since 1784 was a Leap Year)... Journalist Bill Moyers is 61 today...

**■ A new top-notch book** about highlights and travel in Michigan is "Natural Wonders of Michigan," by Tom Carney, illustrated by Lois Leonard Stock. It's a "Guide to Parks, Preserves and Wild Places," and highlights, among many dozens of others, Port Crescent State Park. More than 3 pages are devoted to the bird life, shoreline, camping, foot trails and other attractions at Port Crescent plus a detailed description of the lakeshore ecosystem. It's published by Country Roads Press of Castine, ME, and available in most book stores. and energy to help the village in past projects were unable to be here on the 13th.

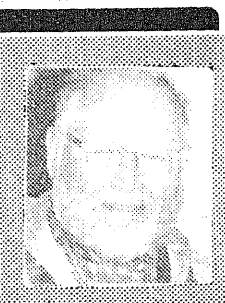
The village and the DDA appreciates the interest township residents take in our village and their willingness to help whenever they can.

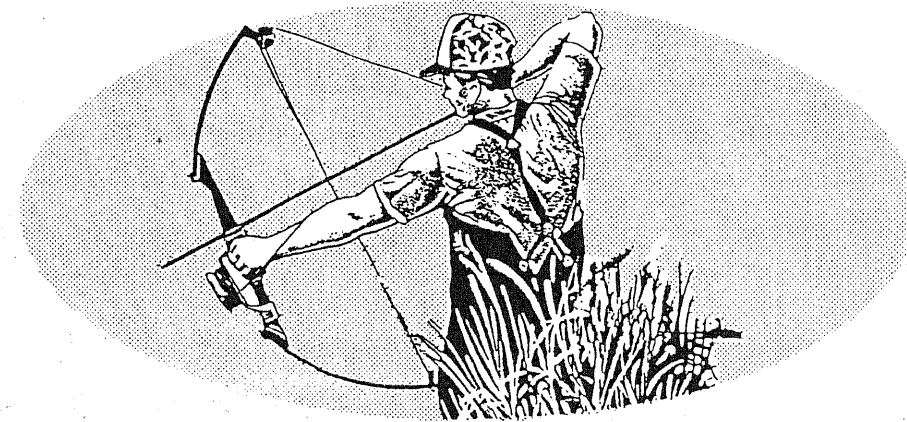

# Caseville hosts 12th bowfishing tourney this weekend

By SALLY RUMMEL

It's the thrill of the hunt, the enjoyment of the outdoors and the camaraderie of fellow sportsmen that keep bowfishermen coming back to the annual Great Lakes Bowfishing Championship—the largest event of its kind in the world—hosted by the Sleeper Outdoor Center at Beadle Bay Marina on Sand Point in Caseville this Saturday and Sunday, June 3 and 4.

A total of 250 two-person teams armed with bow and arrow will try their skill at bringing in rough fish from Saginaw Bay—including carp, dogfish, gar pike and goldfish—for \$4,000 in prizes, ranging from \$700 for first place to \$60 for 20th place, determined by the total number of pounds of fish brought in by the team.

In addition, prizes will be

offered for largest and second largest carp each day, smallest carp, largest dog fish, largest gar pike, largest gold carp, largest goldfish, etc.

Certified scales are brought in for weighing by the GLBC organization, headed by Bob Easterbrook, Jr. of the Sleeper Outdoor Center. The Outdoor Center is the recipient of all tournament proceeds, which uses them through the Wildlife Education Foundation, to improve children's outdoor education.

In 1994, more than 2,800 youngsters attended the Youth Camp, and nearly all were instructed in shooting sports, including archery, Easterbrook says.

Bowfishing teams from at least 12 different states and Canada are expected to register for this 12th annual event, coming from as far away as

Georgia, Kansas, Colorado, Arizona and Washington.

The Caseville Chamber of Commerce will host these visitors and their family and friends at a Pig Roast on Saturday evening, June 3 between the Caseville IGA and the Bay Theatre. Other weekend events include a Friday night "Strategic Planning Party" and Sunday afternoon award presentations, with prizes, raffles and drawings each evening.

Starting time for both days is 8 a.m., Saturday's deadline is 5 p.m. and Sunday's deadline is 3 p.m.

While the Outdoor Center serves as the championship headquarters, Beadle Bay Marina is the starting site and weigh-in site.

Last year, almost 130,000 lbs. of fish were taken from Saginaw Bay, and supporters of the event say the Bow-

fishing Championship helps the sports fishermen by removing over 64 tons of "rough fish" from Bay waters. Over 830,000 pounds of fish have been taken out of Saginaw Bay in the past 11 years.

Easterbrook says he hopes this 12th year will bring the total of fish taken over the one million pound mark.

In the history of the tournament, the largest fish taken

have ranged from between 25 and 35 pounds, and last year's big catch weighed in at a hefty 31.87 pounds. Three

local teams finished in the Top 20 in 1994.

**Good Sunscreen Sense**

People often compromise the SPF (sun protection factor) in their sunscreen by not applying enough to the skin. According to the Skin Cancer Institute, a two-ounce layer of SPF 15 ends up providing protection that is closer to that of SPF 8! An adult of average size should apply about 1 oz. of sunscreen to all exposed areas of the body. Children require proportionately less.

Other reminders:

- Sunscreen should be reapplied every 80 - 90 minutes while in the sun, after swimming, or after activities that cause perspiration.
- Skin damage occurs before sunburn appears, so don't use "redness" as a signal to apply sunscreen.

• Sun exposure is cumulative, therefore small spurts of "incidental" exposure adds up to a lot of skin damage over time. Use sunscreen daily.

• We all know the sun's rays are most harmful when the sun is nearly directly overhead. Here's a tip from the National Cancer Institute - cover up whenever your shadow is shorter than you are. That way, you'll avoid the sun's most burning rays.

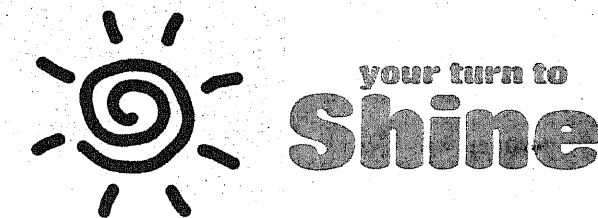



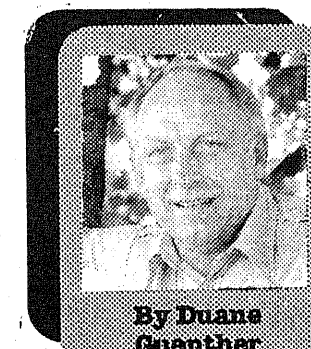

I was fortunate enough not to be born with a silver spoon in my mouth and learned to appreciate the shooting sport the hard way, with a bunch of hand-me-down guns. Looking back, I wouldn't have had it any other way.

Like most boys in rural American, I cut my teeth on a Daisy Red Ryder BB gun. Under the strict supervision of my Mom and Dad in the beginning, I soon was able to handle the gun by myself and given the responsibility that went along with it.

This agreement went pretty well until I shot out a couple of street lights one eventful evening, and I suddenly became gunless for a period of one month.

By the time the Daisy was back in my possession, I had had a long time to think, and to this day, I have never violated the unwritten responsibility that goes along with owning a gun.

I soon found the Red Ryder to be a tool by which I could make some spending money, and we entered into an agreement with the local elevator to help rid them of pesky sparrows.

At a bounty of a penny a bird, it was easy to buy the extra ammunition needed for the job and still have enough

left over to enjoy an Orange Crush at the end of a hard day's work.

Although the BB gun taught me much about the art of shooting, such as hitting airborne targets with both eyes open, allowing for "Kentucky windage," and never aiming at anything you didn't mean to shoot, as I grew older, I longed for something a little more adult, like a .22 for instance.

The Winchester bolt action was perhaps the best looking rifle I had ever seen, and although the stock was scratched and the bluing worn off in several places, the hardware salesman promised it was still a great gun for the price — \$7.

It took a little extra saving from the meager profits of my paper route, and a lot less

Orange Crush, but before long I had amassed the funds and the .22 was mine.

Most of my friends already owned .22 rifles, and many of them were new — but the Winchester, with its fiveshot clip, had suddenly elevated me into manhood and a new source of income. The bounty on crows was 10 cents.

About the same time, I came into ownership of another Winchester. This one was a straight stocked, single shot, 12 gauge shotgun my oldest brother had replaced with a sleek, new Winchester Model 12.

He may have had more firepower than me, but since I was always allowed the first shot in the duck blind, it didn't really matter.

The .22 and 12 gauge lasted through my high school

years, and into my sophomore year in college.

When I left for armed service in Germany, the three guns stayed behind, and when I returned they were replaced by newer models purchased overseas.

They got away from me somehow... either through gifts or garage sales, I can't remember which.

But I know one thing, those three ancient guns taught me more about living and dying than any philosopher I have heard, or textbook I have read to this day.

I certainly hope my grandchildren have the opportunity to experience growing up with guns as I did.

And, I have faith our government has people within its ranks who will allow that hope to come true.

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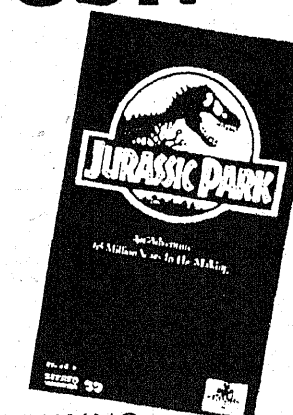
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# Thumb Area Obituaries

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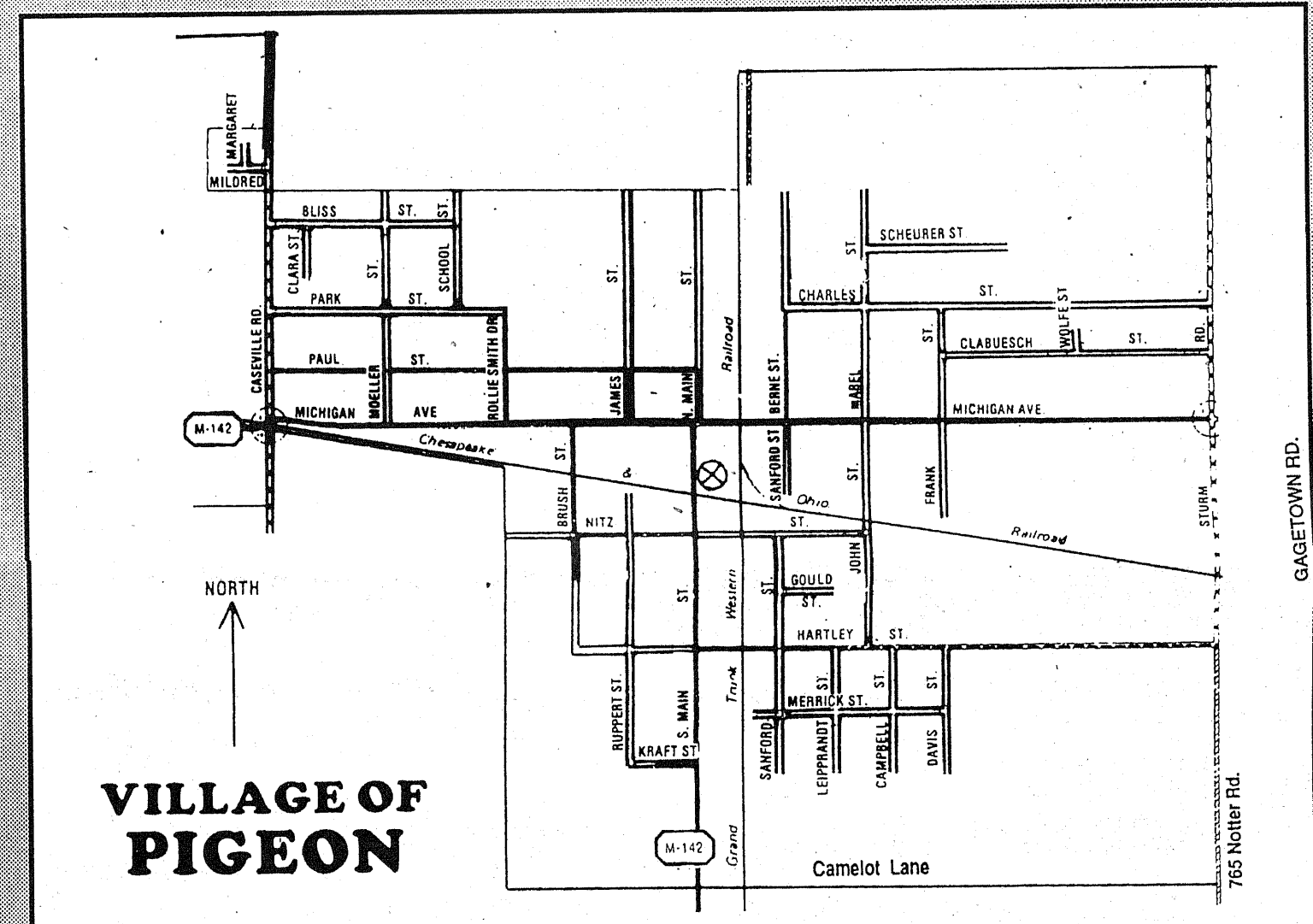

Rev. Bowles delivered the baccalaureate address to the graduating class of Pigeon High School in the German M.E. Church Sunday. The attendance was large, notwithstanding the uncomfortable weather.

A barn raising was held at the Louis Davis farm.
