USA's Achenbach is state champ!

"Saving the best for last" may well be the new motto for USA High School's track star Christie Achenbach.

After spending a track season where she lost to Valley Lutheran's Bethany Brewster each time they met, Achenbach saved her best for the State Final Track Meet this past week at Bay City Western High School in Auburn.

The 1600 meter race promised to be filled with all kinds of excitement as it pitted Suttons Bay's Traci Knudsen, last years state champ who was picked all year to repeat her crown against Achenbach and Brewster.

However, by the second lap it was obvious that Knudsen was going to have trouble as the race turned into a twogirl affair.

Achenbach had jumped into the lead and made a slick move in the third lap that put her in front of the dangerous Brewster. With a 100 meters to go the race turned into a sprint with Achenbach leading Brewster by a step.

While most track nuts felt it was going to be a repeat of other races, and at any moment Brewster would kick in the after-burners, Achenbach.


Calling on her body to give it just a little more, Achenbach held on for the win, the State Championship and a

new USA school record with a fine 5:05.06.

To show just how close the race really was, Brewster was clocked at 5:05.33 for a difference of .27 of a second.

"and appalled to hear the Thumb was linked to this terrible event."



"The Thumb has received so much negative publicity surrounding the bombing, says Sebewaing Rotary President Brian Reinhardt, "we decided to do something good."


The four clubs, through different in-house methods, raised \$1,455 which was sent to the Rotary Relief Fund.

Laker School Board, renewal vote is Monday

Next Monday, voters in the Laker School District will be asked to renew a five-year 18-mill tax on non-homestead and non-agricultural property.

Two incumbents, Virginia Leipprandt and James Clabuesch, are also seeking to return to their Board of Education

While such a millage request isn't unusual, it's important that voters understand what will happen to the district's finances if the renewal is turned down, says Laker Supt. Robert Drury.

The 18-mill renewal applies only to commercial and

business property and vacation homes that are not claimed as primary residences. It does not apply to primary homes and property used for agricultural purposes.

Proposal A's passage a year ago mandated that six mills are automatically levied on homestead and agricultural properties. But non-homestead and non-ag properties would be taxed at the 18-mill rate.

But the new funding measure added a wrinkle to taxing plans: if local residents turned thumbs down on an 18-mill renewal, even though it didn't apply to their properties, the state would shave money from the district's share of state funding. For every dollar lost from turning down the 18-mill measure, a school district would also lose a dollar of state

Right now, the Laker district has some \$62.8 million in

Time to act sensibly

Word from the Michigan Court of Appeals in Lansing states that the case of the Intercounty Drain Board and the Robert/William Jahr families has been ruled in favor of the father-and-son who have fought the Board for eight years.

The Appeals Court agreed with Circuit Judge Richard Knoblock that the Board could not legally propose work beyond the original petition and that it lacked authority to convene a second hearing on the project without a petition from the landowners.

That is a gratifying decision for every landowner and every taxpayer in Michigan.

While the Jahrs have paid out thousands upon thousands of dollars to defend their property and their rights to control their lands and taxes, the Board members could smugly vote unanimously to appeal to a higher court - knowing that it would not cost

But it did cost the Jahrs, their supporters and the landowners in the Intercounty Drain basin who were assessed to help pay the salaries and costs of the very officials who were attempting to force them pay for an untried, untested project they did not need nor

The Drainage Board decision is the very kind of "Big Brother" action which enrages American citizens. The Drainage Board, ignoring a half-century of relative safety from spring flooding in Sebewaing Village, seems determined to bring in some vast project that will rush millions of tons of ice and water into the Sebewaing River at the very time the water needs to be slowed down and dispersed into hundreds of existing, natural niches along the way.

In every hearing, Board members were told that landowners are willing, even anxious, to supply the limited "cattail cleanout" that Tuscola County farmers need and want. But the Board wanted much, much more, and far, far bigger.

Now, later, there is discussion of a federal- and state-backed broader program. Again, landowners are appealing for small, sensible steps — filling in the worst-damaged areas and rip-rapping them to prevent further erosion.

Again, the proposal "coming from way up the ladder," is far bigger and millions more costly than what is needed.

Now, with the Appeals Court decision in hand, is a good time for the Drainage Board to make a sensible gesture. Now is the time to drop that costly lawsuit, and to work out a true compromise between what the landowners want and can afford and what "the government" would prefer to impose.

If the Drainage Board is adamant in insisting on its own way, if it appeals to a higher court — financed by the taxpayers who will be forced to pick up the tab — then it's time to take more drastic steps. Now America is taking steps to rein in government.

The power of drainage boards has long been one of the thorns in landowners' backs and right now the drainage code is being re-

If a governing body cold-bloodedly and uncaringly attempts to wring more and more out of overtaxed citizens, then the next stop must be Lansing.

Go to the Governor.

Lobby the Legislature. Show them what the Department of Agriculture is doing in running drainage boards, point out what drainage boards are

petitioned to do and what kind of schemes they then impose. If this is a democracy, if this is America, the landowners have every right to make it their personal struggle. Time is on the side of the taxpayer in this era of putting government into its proper place. Keep your eyes on the Jahr vs. Drainage Board case, and see what

If you don't like it, then act — help save the dwindling number of
