

IN CASEVILLE: A grand Fireworks Show is set for Monday, July 3 at dusk, sponsored by the Caseville Chamber of Commerce as part of their Beach '95 schedule of events.

NEWS ROUND-UP**Charity Island purchase
plan moves ahead**

The federal U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has made it official - now can the funding be found?

The agency has decided to purchase the Charity Islands in the middle of Saginaw Bay, for a national wildlife refuge. The regional USFWS will now prepare paperwork to acquire Big Charity and Little Charity Islands, and will seek public comments on the proposed acquisition. Big Charity is owned by Robert Wiltsie of Standish and Little Charity by Henry Engelhard of Bay Port.

U.S. Cong. James Barcia (D-Bay City) says he is pleased this initial step has been taken, and says he is supporting the proposal.

"In my letters of support to the Fish and Wildlife Service, I have stressed the importance of the islands for both their beauty and the rare environmental data they can provide researchers. For instance, the islands contain many unique natural resources, including a plant species on the government's threatened species list, and an active Eagle's nest."

He notes several steps must still be completed, to make the plan a reality. "At this point, the regional U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, based in Chicago, will prepare a draft document, receive public comments on the proposed purchase, and then funds must be appropriated for the purchase. Assuming that the proposal proceeds as expected, the funds will be requested in the FY97 budget. I will certainly do all I can to make this purchase a reality."

"I think it is a tribute to all parties concerned with the future of the Charity Islands that we were able to work together to make this proposal a success," Cong. Barcia says.

"I believe that the purchase of the islands by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will preserve their beauty, sustain the unique plant and animal species found on the islands, and put their resources to the best possible use."

No Unionville complains

Folks in Unionville appear to have a lot of faith in their village leaders, as only one person showed up for the public hearing on the Community Development Block Grant held during the first part of last Monday's meeting. The grant is in conjunction with the new water system which will soon be installed at the village.

Council members appointed Alan Boyer of Ledy Engineering of Lansing as the Environmental Review Certification Officer for the new water facility.

Members also voted to do some blacktopping this summer, with 285 feet to be completed on Granger Street and 685 feet on Staley Street. The two projects will cost the village \$6,334.

Council members also voted to complete two blocks of sidewalks at a cost of \$5,000. — By DUANE GUENTHER

More marina questions

When the Sebawaing Village Council opened their Monday night meeting, they were met by a disgruntled village resident who posed several questions relating to the street adjacent to the new marina which is presently under construction.

This was the second meeting in which Brock Peacock, of Davis Street, complained about the upgrading of Pitcher Street which will become the new entrance for homes built along the Sebawaing River and adjoining canals.

Village President Dave Wineman fielded questions and comments by Peacock and others, such as:

"Does the village own the right of way to north/south Pitcher Street?"
"Who has the right to set road right of ways?"
"What property is being taken from LaFave and what is being given back to him?""He (Peacock) would like a 40 foot right of way."
"He (Peacock) would like to have sidewalks alongside Pitcher Street."

President Wineman instructed Peacock to come to the village office with such questions in order to get more expedient answers, but did promise he would have answers to the posed questions as soon as possible.

In other Sebawaing Council action, the group:

■ approved three building permits.
■ approved seven building permits which would be subjected to the building inspector's approval.

■ received no comments on the Truth in Taxation Hearing, and moved to levy 18.5514 mills in village tax. This amounted to the same taxation as last year.

■ approved hiring Chris Eisengruber and Larry Heider to assist the Police Department during the Sugar Festival.

Es gab nur 8 Bidders. Die Rule war das die Karusell musste intact verkauft werden — nicht piece by piece.



Super horseman?

Poor Christopher Reeve recently made it clear just how dangerous and stupid it is for a human to place itself upon one of God's mightiest and flightiest creatures.

The tragic horse-riding accident which has left the "Superman" star fighting for his life is just one more sad reminder that we - as a species - have in no way mastered the horse.

So what does that say about "horse people" who continue to hop on these pea-brained creatures in a day and age when they are no longer required for travel? Well, I'm certainly not the one to answer that question, as a recent serious accident of my own did not deter me from my hobby for even one day!

It was just a couple weeks ago when a group of us were enjoying a heaven-sent Sunday summer afternoon ride in the country. Suddenly, my young Appaloosa took umbrage at the approach of some feeder steers who were grazing complacently in a field nearby.

As the young and enthusiastic cattle approached the fence to take a good look at us, I felt Sheena begin to "levitate." She started to back up, and then to rear. My friend reached over and grabbed a rein to try and steady the horse, but her good intentions proved fruitless.

My huge filly went straight up in the air, taking me, my friend and my friend's horse with her. With one toss of her powerful neck, she sent us all flying through the air like a tail on a kite. She went over backwards and we all tumbled into the ditch with her. It happened so fast that all I recall is leather, horseflesh and humans in a tumbling melange of reeds and cattails.

When the dust finally settled, I sat up and waited for that proverbial "tunnel of light." I looked down to see if I were hovering over my own body, but somehow I had lived through it. My friend was alive and the horses were alive. We all rose slowly and dusted ourselves off.

I grabbed Sheena's reins and considered beating the living tar out of her . . . but the look on the face said she had sufficiently punished herself. She did not try to flee or elude me. She just stood there looking at me - head hanging, lopeared - with a face that said, "Geez, I'm sorry! Did I over-react?"

No worse for our brief but horrendous experience, we all climbed back in the saddle and continued on our ride . . . but not before I spent several minutes introducing Sheena personally to each and every steer! Then we rode home sullenly, rubbing our necks, getting the kinks out and asking, "What went wrong?"

But I think we all know the answer to that question deep in our hearts.

What went wrong was: that morning we had slapped our saddles onto the backs of creatures unbendingly independent and self-serving by nature. We swung our legs over animals whose primary means of survival has been fear and flight for over a million years.

We put cold pieces of steel into the mouths of animals so powerful and commanding, so dangerous and beautiful, so contrary yet appealing, as to be almost mythological.

Day after day all over the world, horse enthusiasts quickly and eagerly sweep aside all common sense. We are desperate to be one with the animal purportedly fashioned out of "God's own breath." We think ourselves quite the beast masters when we harness the power and majesty of an animal so mysterious and elusive.


But in fact, it is the horse who has mastered us. We are the beasts of burden who labor feverishly to provide food, shelter, green pasture, medicine, clean water and top flight care for this creature who "flies without wings." It is we who are harnessed to our strange addiction.

Well, the next day - with the little help of a little Motrin - I was back on Sheena again. And the day after and the day after and the day after. And my friends were on their horses . . . and people all over the world were on their horses too.

So should I one day meet a tragic end at the hands (or hooves) of a horse, please do not cry for me. Know that I was determined to live out a fantasy which started over 30 years ago with a white plastic horse on four wheels.

Take some comfort knowing that no amount of pleading would have kept me from them anyway. Know that I would have been one of the privileged few to ride a cloud, surf the wind, fly with eagles and eagerly rush in where angels fear to tread!

New brochure now 'out' for Pigeon




PIGEON BROCHURES - The community of Pigeon is showcasing its features in a new informational brochure just completed in time for the 1995 summer season.

Yarns From The Thumb

■ It's TUESDAY, JUNE 27, Day No. 178, leaving 187, so this week marks the mid-point of 1995... Helen Keller, blind and deaf from 19 months of age, was born JUNE 27, 1880. Through the devotion of her teacher, Miss Keller learned to read, write and speak, and became an international advocate of help for the blind and deaf. She lived to be 87, succumbing on JUNE 1, 1968... The Left-Handed Golfers 59th National Amateur Championship tourney starts today in Palm Beach, FL... Bob Keeshan, better known as "Captain Kangaroo," is 68 today and H. Ross Perot, businessman and dabbler in politics, is 65.

■ On JUNE 28, 1914, Archduke Francis Ferdinand and his wife, were assassinated in (of all places) Sarajevo, Bosnia, setting off World War I, which continued for exactly 5 years, until JUNE 28, 1919, when the Treaty of Versailles was signed... On JUNE 28, 1968, President Lyndon Johnson signed the Monday Holiday Law which proclaimed that Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Labor Day, Columbus Day and Veterans Day, be observed on the nearest Monday. Resentment by veterans' groups eventually reverted their day to its former observance date, Nov. 11... Actor/director Mel Brooks is 67 today ...

■ If you don't recognize the name of George Washington Goethals, American engineer and army officer, let it be known that he engineered the Panama Canal project and became the first civil governor of the Canal Zone. He was born JUNE 29, 1858, and died in NYC in 1928... Dr. James William Mayo, American surgeon, who was one of the Mayo Brothers and established the Mayo Foundation, was born in LeSeuer, MN, JUNE 29, 1861. He lived to be 78... Iowa Congressman Fred Grandy, better known as "Gopher" in the Love Boat TV series, is 47 today. Elizabeth Hanford Dole, president of the American Red Cross and wife of Senator Bob Dole, is 59 today, and actor/singer Slim Pickens is 76 ...

■ Previously on radio, "The Guiding Light," joined the ranks of TV soap operas on JUNE 30, 1952, and holds the title of longest-lasting daytime show and the longest-lasting series. For regular viewers, they'll know that the series concerns the Bauer and Grant families... Early on the morning of JUNE 30, 1908, a spectacular explosion occurred over central Siberia causing a seismic shock, fire storm and "black rain" visible for hundreds of miles. Called the most powerful explosion in history, there is still speculation whether it was a meteorite or an extraterrestrial visitor... Singer Lena Horne is 78 today; actress Nancy Dussault is 59 and Mike Tyson, former boxer recently released from prison, is 29...

■ Two important events for SATURDAY, JULY 1, are Canada Day, the national day of our neighbors to the North, and it's also the 132nd anniversary of the start of the Battle of Gettysburg in the Civil War... July is designated "special" by many food industries, commodities, associations and festivals. To name a few, July is National Baked Bean Month, sponsored by the Michigan Bean Commission in St. Johns, National Ice Cream Month, July Belongs to Blueberries Month, Sauerkraut Salad and Sandwich Season, and many, many more, even a Punxsutawney (PA) Groundhog Festival, the same group that capitalizes on each Feb. 2 ...

On JULY 1, 1918, U.S. food rationing began with each individual allowed just 8 ounces of sugar. There were voluntary wheatless Mondays and Wednesdays, meatless Tuesdays, porkless Thursdays and Fridays and an increase in dark "victory bread." It all ended in late December after the Armistice on Nov. 11... Lots of birthdays today: actresses Karen Black 53, Leslie Caron 64, Olivia DeHavilland 79, also Princess Diana 34, Jamie Farr ("Klinger" of "M*A*S*H") 59, and Jean Marsh, English actress/writer who gained fame through "Upstairs, Downstairs" TV series, 61 ...


■ At noon on SUNDAY, JULY 2, 182 1/2 days of the year will have elapsed and 182 1/2 more remain before Jan. 1, 1996... The National Cherry Festival starts in Traverse City on SUNDAY, JULY 2, with an estimated attendance of 500,000... Don't know whether this is good news or not, but today through JULY 8, is National Canned Luncheon Meat Week... Actress Cheryl Ladd is 43 today ...

■ At about 10 p.m. MONDAY, JULY 3, Earth will reach Aphelion, that is the point in its orbit when it is farthest from the Sun, about 94.5 million miles. Thus the Earth is farthest from the Sun during our Northern Hemisphere summer, so it's not the distance, but the angle by which the Sun strikes us... Incidentally, six months from now, on Jan. 4, it will be Perihelion, which is just the opposite of Aphelion...

As a special recognition of the Sun's brilliance, today is "Stay Out of the Sun Day," for your health's sake... The first bank in the US, The Bank for Savings in New York City, opened its doors for savings accounts on JULY 3, 1819. As this is Dairy Month, I was a dairy farmer for quite a while, but I never was a very big one. I only had 10 to 15 cows, but when I built my new barn, I put in a milk parlor and had a nice pen and a good milk house and it passed inspection.

At first the milk inspectors were pretty good and I got along well with them until one little guy came around and took the law into his own hands and made a lot of rules by himself.

I just couldn't do anything right. I know some people got by with some things I just didn't dare do.


Pigeon Depot Museum opens with 'horsepower'

It's a safe bet that many residents of the Saginaw Bay shoreline are concerned about the quality of water they drink and the quality of the bay they so enjoy.

And it's everyone's responsibility to take care of that water — and folks at the Huron County Extension Office are making it easier to learn how, at a special "Neighbors for a Clean Bay" workshop, set for Friday, July 14, from 1:30 p.m. to 4 p.m. at the Caseville High School auditorium.

Sally Comer, who is the Groundwater Protection Program associate with the MSU Cooperative Extension Office in Huron County, in cooperation with Huron County Extension Agent Jim LeCureux, has lined up a slate of speakers who should be able to answer most questions about groundwater, drinking water and Saginaw Bay water quality.

Leading off the list of speakers is Charles Bauer, environmental quality analyst with the state Department of Natural Resources. He'll be answering the question, "What Affects the Quality of the Bay Today."

Then Dr. Ted Loudon, an agricultural engineer with MSU's Extension Office, will give hints on "Maintaining Your Septic System," sure to be a popular topic with property owners along the shore who have septic tanks.

Next, Dale Lipar, director of environmental health with the Huron County Health Department, will talk about "You and Your Well," giving advice on well maintenance and placement.

Finally, "Proper Use of Lawn Care Products" will be the topic of Carrie Andrich's portion of the afternoon. Andrich is the agricultural agent for the MSU Extension Office in Huron County.

Comer is working with the Extension Office and the Huron County Soil Conservation District under a

Groundwater Protection grant from the state Department of Agriculture to educate residents about protecting the waters that sustain life.

The grant was funded in 1993 under the Groundwater Protection Act, which collects a fee from fertilizer sales and pesticide registration fees and sales. So a portion of the grant is from homeowners who buy pesticides for home use.

"There are several things we're looking at," Comer says. "We wanted to do this with non-ag people to help protect the bay, surface water and drinking water. Along the shore, there are many small lots and there is a concern that septic tanks are maintained properly if several people are using it."

Septic systems leaching into the ground can eventually cause problems with excessive algae growth in Saginaw Bay and the tributaries leading to it, Comer says.

"When you have algae growth, you lose fish habitat because the algae uses so much oxygen," she says.

In addition to helping homeowners with problems and questions, Comer and the Extension Office also offers farmstead assessments, a completely confidential program. Through it, farmers can assess their practices and farming sites to see if they have a high or low risk of contaminating groundwater.

or drinking water.

If high-risk activities are found, farmers can readily change those practices by contacting one of the resource agencies or people listed by the Extension Office.

"We just don't leave a farmer high and dry," Comer says. "We give lots of information on where a farmer could go for help."

Comer is hoping for a good turnout at the afternoon workshop.

"This gives people the opportunity to speak with people about what's going on in this area," she said. "We want to reach out to shoreline and non-ag people because part of this money (paying for the speakers) is from them."

PIGEON VILLAGE COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

A motion was made by Smith, supported by Tibbitts to accept the Police Operations Report for May. Motion carried. Chief Johnson explained the bicycle rodeo plans to the Council. Due to the poor response to the rodeo, it was necessary to cancel at this time.

DPW Report was presented by Supt. Kohl. A decision was made by Council to begin accepting grass clippings at the DPW Garage during the regular Recycling Hours. Residents will be requested to bring clippings in containers to be emptied and returned to the individuals. Residents will also be reminded to only place branches by road for pickup on the 4th Thursday of each month. DPW crew will not be picking up on a daily basis.

Special Election Results were given by Heckman. Residents voting - 58. Yes votes 47. No votes 11.

Millage rates for the coming year were discussed by members. A Resolution was offered by Eichler, supported by Licht to set the 1995/96 Millage at 13.9038, down from the 14.3245 levied last year. Resolution carried.

A motion was made by Eichler, supported by Smith to hire the firms of C. Link & Co. and Wolverine Engineers to conduct a Hydrogeologic study of the groundwater in the Village at a cost of \$2,000. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Smith, supported by Gehrs to approve the Accounts Payable for the month of May. Motion carried.

A Variance Request has been received from John and Lori Smith. A Public Hearing will be scheduled to be held at the July 10, 1995 regular meeting.

A motion was made by Eichler, supported by Tibbitts to adjourn the meeting at 8:17 p.m. Motion carried.

Sleeping soundly


In the cool of the evening, along about this time of the year, I get an uncontrollable urge to sleep outdoors.

Winter has retreated north taking the harshness of the season with her, and summer is just around the corner.

Now we are treated to warm, sun-filled days, and cool, clear nights, just right for sleeping — inside or outside, but I'll take outside any time.

This is the time of year to really enjoy evenings, and sleeping outside gives you a front row seat in God's best theater.

Note even the crackle of stout

It all sounds so simple doesn't it, and perhaps it is if you're an old hand at sleeping in the woods. But, to the uninformed, sleeping outside can be an exercise in madness.

There is more to being comfortable than "rolling up in a blanket," like we've seen in countless cowboy movies, and putting a rock under your head. In reality, people who try to sleep directly on the ground do indeed have rocks, but they're in their heads, rather than under them.

There are some basic principles one needs to know before venturing outside to sleep, and once you come to grips with them, you too, can spend endless hours of enjoyment resting like a babe.

oak logs in the fire ring can keep you awake now, and as twilight slips into night you nod and slip into that restful sleep which has evaded you all winter long.

If your outdoor adventures are limited to sleeping in a cottage, trailer house, or pop-up camper, you need not worry. You have already licked the problem by sleeping in a bed.

However, if you choose to sleep in a tent, or better yet, with the stars as your canopy, then some advice should be heeded.

One of the oldest camping books in my library states that everyone owes it to himself to spend at least one night deep in the woods on a browse bed.

Let me save you the trouble. It's not all what it's cracked up to be, and besides, lopping off half a dozen evergreen boughs is not very environmentally sound, if not illegal, in most places.

Sleeping comfortably in the outdoors takes two simple procedures — having something to sleep in, and something to sleep on.

The sleeping "in" part is simple. Sleeping bag manufacturers have solved that problem for us. The sleeping "on" part is a little more complicated.

The tough and hardy place their sleeping bags right on the ground. Bad choice, no matter how macho it looks. An air mattress is good, an ensolite pad better, and a Therm-a-Rest sleeping pad the best.

The Therm-a-Rest is the original self-inflating mattress made of cored foam encased in a low-slip nylon fabric. To put into use, you unroll the pad, open up the air valve and it inflates itself. You deflate by rolling the pad and closing the air valve.

This self-inflater gives you the comfort of an air mattress with the durability of a foam pad, and its insulating qualities are at the top of the list. It rolls small enough to be

efficient for the backpacker, can be used as a cot mattress in your deer camp, doubles as a soft chair, and I once used it as a life preserver to help ferry my equipment and myself across a river (not recommended except in an emergency).

Why not give yourself a break this summer and sleep out under the stars. You will be glad you did — that is, if you have a Therm-a-Rest sleeping pad under you....



food to feed their children. Farmers in several areas will donate their potatoes and trucks to haul the produce just for the cost of fuel.


I need \$200 to get a load of potatoes from the San Luis Valley of Colorado delivered to Lubbock, Texas to the poor and needy. Can I count you in?

Motion by Tietz, supported by Pitcher, to adjourn the meeting. Motion carried. The meeting was adjourned at 9:05 p.m.
