

Sebewaing Industries gets tax break for expansion

Sebewaing Village Council approved a 50% tax break for 12 years for Sebewaing Industries, Inc., for purchase of a Rapindex Press-Mounted Transfer Unit. The new machine costs \$187,000 and should be installed soon, officials said, following the public hearing at last week's Council meeting.

Council members were peppered with more questions from Brock Peacock, a resident who lives near the new marina under construction, at last week's meeting.

The resident continues to question information supplied by surveying and engineering firms and is not satisfied with information provided by Council itself, he said. Complaints ranged from: not agreeing with the footage at the end of the canal; having no documents and opinions from the engineers regarding street length; not agreeing with the turn-around at the east end of Davis Street; elimination of the dumping station, and other matters.

Council members responded they are legal in their rightof-way dimensions, that a dumping station will not be needed since this is a marina, not a campground; the turn-around is not for public use but for resident's accommodations, and said they will check into other matters.

Possible construction of sidewalks — which were previously requested - will be studied since they were not in the original project and will be placed with other sidewalk needs throughout the village. They further stated that all resolutions are drawn up by the village attorney and are in order.

Two businessmen approached Sebewaing Council requesting a parking lot on the south half of the former Mast Photo Studio lot just northwest of the Main-Center Street blinker light.

One of the people is relocating his offices and the lot would serve clients. They also requested the police department enforce the two-hour parking rule which is on the books. Council members voted to approved the parking lot for



Environmentally, we are constantly challenged to find proper disposal for manure and by-products, old hay and straw, dead stock (but hopefully not too often) and the at Tinian Island in the Marianas with the separate parts of the -chemical waste products generated by things like fly repellant, gas and oil containers and painting supplies.

We encounter annoying equipment breakdowns and costly repairs. There is endless barn, yard and fence maintenance, and complex new water systems which lose their prime in summer and freeze and break in the winter.

There are high electrical bills, the skyrocketing cost of lumber and fencing materials, the endless issue of pest and rodent control, and the rising retail prices of grain and hay. We too deal with encroaching urbanization and all the various township, city, county, state and federal laws, restrictions and zoning ordinances which seem to grow and change

We encounter infuriating lack of cooperation from motorists when we are riding, hauling heavy machinery and equipment or pulling the horse trailer. Of course, the license and insurance costs for these items spirals ridiculously upward year

after year as well. There is the constant threat of injury, liability and lawsuits from well-meaning children and passers-by who wander onto the grounds, into the barn, or even climb into the pasture to "pet the pretty horseys." And complete insurance coverage is just a few pennies from being completely unaffordable anymore.

The challenges mount and the costs rise every single day, and when it seems like the cons outweigh the pros, I stop and think what it would be like to deal with all these headaches

and try to make money at the same time. Well, that's just a little insight into what it must be like to be a farmer in 1995: challenging and costly.

It's a good thing I'm NOT a farmer, because we'd all be pencil thin if the world depended on me for its growing need for
