
Ramsey stands at the front door of the new building, adjacent to the existing USA High School on M-25 between Sebewaing and Unionville.


Musical selections will be featured, and John Moore of the Tuscola Intermediate School District will give remarks in the ceremony, as will longtime Supt. William Dodge.



Officially, it's Sand

Sand Point, MI has been officially recognized as a delivery address, meaning that any mail addressed to Sand Point, MI 48755 will be delivered without interruption as of last Thursday, Aug. 10.

According to Pigeon Postmaster Tom Balzer, this decision was made based upon a movement which began several years ago for residents to identify themselves with either Sand Point or Caseville, instead of Pigeon.

Balzer contacted the Caseville postmaster and the business office in Grand Rapids to resolve this issue, and a determination was made to allow Sand Point residents (Crescent Beach Rd. at M-25 to the end of the Point and all adjoining streets) to use Sand Point, MI 48755 as the last line of their delivery address.

People may choose to continue to use Pigeon as the last line of their delivery address if they want to, adds Balzer.

Both Pigeon and Sand Point will be acceptable, as the reprogramming of postal equipment has allowed it to read both names and properly sort it.

Elkton names Jaworski as Village President

James Jaworski was appointed by the Elkton Village Council as the village's new president, to fill the term of Barb Thompson who died last month.

Jaworski will serve until March of next year, when the general election is held. He has served on the village council since 1990, and most recently was president pro-tem.

At the same meeting, Marty Baker was named as the new president pro-tem. And village leaders are searching for a candidate to fill Jaworski's seat on the council until next year. Interested village residents can contact the Village Clerk before the end of August, so that an appointment can be made at the September meeting, Clerk Janet Santos said.

Council also agreed to a new yard waste contract with Waste Management-Michigan Mideast, the village's current refuse hauler. Waste Management will pick up yard waste, including leaves, grass and small limbs, and dispose of them. The cost will be \$1 per month per household until December, and the village is picking up the tab for the program. Next spring, council will review the program.

The program is scheduled for an Aug. 23 startup.

A committee headed by Dave Fisher was set up to designate a suitable memorial for Thompson, who served as Village President since 1990. About \$400 in memorial contributions has been received, Santos said. Also serving on the committee is Marty Baker and Frank Kolar. In other business, Elkton Council:

As we see it

Where's America's new dining room?

Back when most of our readers were youngsters — perhaps in the 1960s — dining out was a special occasion, usually reserved for Mother's Day, a special birthday or straight As on kids'

Today, 30 years later, eating out is less a celebration and more an act of survival in our nonstop world. And the trend is expanding, rather than contracting, according to a recent story in Michigan Farm Bureau's "Rural Living" maga-

A recent survey shows 98% of all households ate out last month, 85% ate out last week and 45% ate out yesterday. As more families have two working parent or simply one parent, there's less time spent in the kitchen... and more at the restaurant table.

The year 1994 was a transitional one: Americans now spend as much money eating out as they do eating in, according to anoter survey. In some cities, including Lansing, more than half of food budgets are spent on non-grocery store food.

That relates back to 1970, when every \$1 spent eating out was matched by \$2 spent on food at home. In 1980, the family kitchen still got 61% of every food dollar - which shrank to 55% in 1990. Now, it's an even match.

What's this mean to consumers, food producers who live here in the Thumb and even restaurant owners?

First, restaurants have risen to nutritional challenges by improving quality of food offered. There's never been more baked, broiled or boiled foods available, which are better nutritionally and offer less fat.

Plus, more restaurants are offering take-it-home meals, complete with everything from side dishes to beverages, to help families cope with

Most of these changes aren't necessarily healthy for nutritional needs, but they don't have to be bad choices either.

Spending family time together is even more important, and requires a greater commitment to paying attention to each other, listening to day's events and even relaxing, not screaming, while dining. If that's easier to accomplish in a restaurant than at home, maybe it's an improvement...





interim basis, until a suitable candidate is found. With the retirement of longtime Supt. William Dodge, the



We had just finished supper when the storm hit. The first drops of rain began falling as I stashed the kitchen box under the picnic table and covered it with a small nylon tarp. I had just reached the safety of the tent when the sky opened up and let go with a sheet of water.




DEAR MR. ROSS:







FAIR HAVEN TOWNSHIP - ORDINANCE NO. 18 CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY GAS FRANCHISE ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE, granting to CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY. its successors and assigns, the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges, waterways and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the TOWNSHIP OF FAIR HAVEN, HURON COUNTY, MICHIGAN, for a period of thirty

THE TOWNSHIP OF FAIR HAVEN ORDAINS:

SECTION I: GRANT, TERM. The TOWNSHIP OF FAIR HAVEN, HURON COUNTY, MICHIGAN, hereby grants to the Consumers Power Company, a Michigan corporation, its successors and assigns, hereinafter called the "Grantee," the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges, waterways and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the TOWNSHIP OF FAIR HAVEN, HURON COUNTY, MICHIGAN, for a period of thirty

SECTION 2. CONSIDERATION. In consideration of the rights, power and authority hereby granted, said Grantee shall faithfully perform all things required by

SECTION 3. CONDITIONS. No highway, street, alley, bridge, waterway or other public place used by said Grantee shall be obstructed longer than necessary during the work of construction or repair, and shall be restored to the same order and condition as when said work was commenced. All of Grantee's pipes and mains shall be so placed in the highways and other public places as not to unnecessarily

interfere with the use thereof for highway purposes. Before commencing any work which will require excavation in or the closing of any street, alley, bridge, waterwaay or other public place, the Grantee shall provide the Township with notice, including a description of the work to be performed, at least fourteen (14) days in advance of such work. This notice requirement shall not apply to the installation of gas services on privately owned property nor to any other work performed on such privately owned property. Nothing herein shall preclude the Grantee from immediately commencing construction or repair work when deemed necessary to prevent danger to life or property, and in such case, the Grantee shall notify the Township of such work as soon as reasonably practical.

SECTION 4, HOLD HARMLESS, Said Grantee shall at all times keep and save the Township free and harmless from all loss, costs and expense to which it may be subject by reason of the negligent construction and maintenance of the structures and equipment hereby authorized. In case any action is commenced against the Township on account of the permission herein given, said Grantee shall, upon notice, defend the Township and save it free and harmless from all loss, cost and damage arising out of such negligent construction and maintenance.

SECTION 5. EXTENSIONS. Said Grantee shall construct and extend its gas distribution system within said Township, and shall furnish gas to applicants

residing therein in accordance with applicable laws, rules and regulations. SECTION 6. FRANCHISE NOT EXCLUSIVE. The rights, power and authority herein granted, are not exclusive. Either manufactured or natural gas may be furnished hereunder

SECTION 7. RATES. 


