17th season for Bach Fest

The Village Bach Festival will return to Cass City and Caro on Nov. 21, 24, 25 and 26 for its 17th season, under the direction of founding Music Director Don Th. Jaeger.

Members of the Festival Orchestra and vocal and instrumental soloists, will gather for the annual Thanksgiving holiday to rehearse and perform the music of J.S. Bach and other baroque, as well as romantic and modern composers, in the First Presbyterian Churches of Cass City and Caro.

Student numbers are up

Caseville Schools enrolled a record number of students for the 1995-96 school year.

The Fourth Friday count of 315 students surprised Board of Education members and Supt. James Stahl. The district's enrollment increased by 26 students at the last official count.

"We knew there would be some increase but we didn't think it would be that high," Stahl said. "We have had larger kindergarten classes and more people coming in."

More students means more money from the state. If the enrollment stays the same at the February 1996 count, the district could receive over \$150,000 more in state funds.

Along with other local school districts, Caseville has had a bit of trouble hiring and keeping coaches, and the board at last week's meeting expressed some concern.

"We need coaches and we have advertised for coaches, just like a couple of other districts in the area," Stahl said. "It takes some time to build a program and many people don't want to coach because they don't want the abuse that some parents can give them."

Those who are interested in coaching should contact the Superintendent's office.

Gaeth stayed with the auto dealers for 21 years before switching his occupation.

vidual whose family roots are deeply embedded in the Unionville soil, Gaeth is a natural as the comforting person necessary to console a grieving family.

Through the years he became the small town's pillar of strength during times of family crisis.

"I really love working with people," hee says.

In his arrangement with Deisler, Gaeth was in charge of the entire funeral home. "Deisler did the body work," he says, "and I took

care of everything else." Countless Unionville families can attest to Gaeth's last statement. During his 22-year tenure in the funeral business, he indeed took care of all of the details when it came time for funeral arrange-

The secret to his success may have been the caring attitude he displayed in his business connections.



The funds were awarded to the Thumb Area Michigan Works! Employment and Training Consortium, and Huron County Extension for its program to protect the Saginaw Bay

The Employment and Training Consortium received \$25,950in Displaced Homemaker funding to provide unemployed homemakers with vocational counseling and testing, skills training, job search and placement hlep, and referrals to community resources. The program is administered by the Michgian Jobs Commission.

A \$44,300 grant was also presented to Huron County Extension for the Saginaw Bay Agricultural Pollution Prevention Program. Farmers participating in the project will learn alternative farming methods intended to maintain agricultural production while reducing watershed pollution from pesticide leaching, soil erosion and other types of runoff.

The Saginaw Bay National Watershed Initiative is administered by the Department of Environmental Quality and allows various agencies to work together at preserving the Saginaw

We love our ethnic food

Whether you call them quesadillas, sweetand-sour, tacos, fettucine alfredo, baklava, sushi or gung chow, ethnic foods are hot in our American culture. And with good reason — they're tasty, too.

A recent study by the Michigan Restauratn Association shows Chinese, Italian and Mexican foods are the most-popular ethnic restaurant varieties, followed closely by German, Greek and Tex-Mex. And with good reason — the the most part, many of these are healthy alternatives to traditional, heavier, fattier U.S. fare.

Restaurants in our state serve more than 4 million meals daily, the group says, and Saturday is the most-popular day to eat out. Guys like chowing down outside the home more than gals — men dine out 4.3 times per week, versus 3.6 times for women.

Annually, each person in Michigan eats \$652 of food away from home. Typically, children and adults in our state average 3.8 meals outside the home per week — for a growing total of 198 per year. Wouldn't our great-grandparents be shocked by those numbers, since they ate 99% of their meals at home, after the family cook spent a great deal of time in the kitchen preparing the feast?

The restaurant survey shows more chain restaurants are being chosen by diners — but there's always a spot at the restaurant table for a well-cooked meal, whatever the dining spot chosen.

Future studies show we'll likely be consuming even more meals outside the home... or bringing home catered foods even more regularly. And, as long as we watch our nutrition, calories and fat percentages, it's not all bad — as America's families today run faster, pursuing their elusive dreams...



Remembering Rogell's Barnstormers: It was 60 years ago last week that a Detroit Tiger barnstorming team came to Sebewaing High School athletic field to play against a Huron-Tuscola All-Star squad. A Sebewaing Blade story of that game declared that a crowd of "well over 2,000" attended the game. Tiger Shortston Bill Rogell headed the visitors who played here Oct. 15, 1935, and defeated the local squad, 11-4.

Rogell, a former Detroit Council member who now resides in Florida, smashed a home run in the opening inning, hitting one of Vic "Lefty" Neigenfind's fast balls over the left field fence into a corn field. He got two hits and scored two runs. The game was brought back in memory by Dorothy (Stoeckle) Thoms, now of Port Hope, who has a number of players' autographs from the two teams.

She was then Dorothy Erbisch, a Sebewaing school girl, who attended the game as one of the 104-member band, directed by the late A.E. Scheiwe.

Her autographs include not only Rogell, but also his younger brother, Eddie, "Lefty" Neigenfind, Matt Ringle, John Weir and Sebewaing's own Joe Kling. Mrs. Thoms treasures the old paper for its memories, stating she keeps it under a heavy glass desk top. Among the Tiger All-Stars, in addition to the two Rogells, were Catcher Frank Reiber, Infielder Johnny Kerr, Southpaw Joe Sullivan, Frank Millsbaugh of the Toledo Mud


