## Sebewaing video now available

Sebewaing's newly-produced historical video has arrived and copies are on sale in seven business places.

The video — "The History & Pioneers of Sebewaing, 1853-1953" — which has been in production since last spring, tells the first century history of Sebewaing between the Township's organization in 1853 and its Centennial Celebration in 1953.

Sponsored by Sebewaing Chamber of Commerce the video was written and directed by Al Eicher, a native of Pigeon who produced a similar account of Pigeon's early history last year.

The video runs 62 minutes and is lavishly illustrated and reported in detail, from the life of the early Native Americans to the township's first-century festival celebration in 1953.

The arrival of the first missionaries to preach to the Indians is told, after which farmers came from warring European countries, to find a better and more stable life in the young State of Michigan.

Organizing of new churches in the area is reported, and the start of many businesses is described. Some family histories are included, and

hundreds of old photos, drawings and early movies are used in the production.

## NEWS ROUND-UP

### Sugar beets 90% delivered

As of Monday morning, 550,000 tons of sugar beets have been delivered to the Sebewaing Plant of Michigan Sugar Company — and about 70,000 tons were still expected for receipt before the end of this harvest season.

That's the word from Sebewaing Manager/Agriculture Dick Jacoby, who says that's about 90% of expected beets delivered of the total crop of 620,000 tons.

Average yield has been 16 tons per acre, and final day to receive the beets should be mid-week.

### Newly named in Unionville

Christopher Kruckow of Unionville has been appointed to fill the vacancy on the Unionville Village Council, for a term to expire in the March, 1996 elections.

Kruckow was named by Council at its Oct. 23 meeting to replace John Katnik, who had resigned in September.

In addition to the filled vacancy, six other Unionville government seats are up for election in March. Expiring two-year terms of President Ted Balzer, Clerk and Assessor Harvy Niedrich, Treasurer Bob Balzer plus Trustees Kruckow, Lee Mascorro and Fred Gardner will be up for election. Persons interested in running for any of those positions may pick up nominating petitions at the Village Hall, to be returned before the 4 p.m. filing deadline on Tuesday, Nov. 28.

If needed, the Primary Election is Feb. 1 and the General Election is March 11.

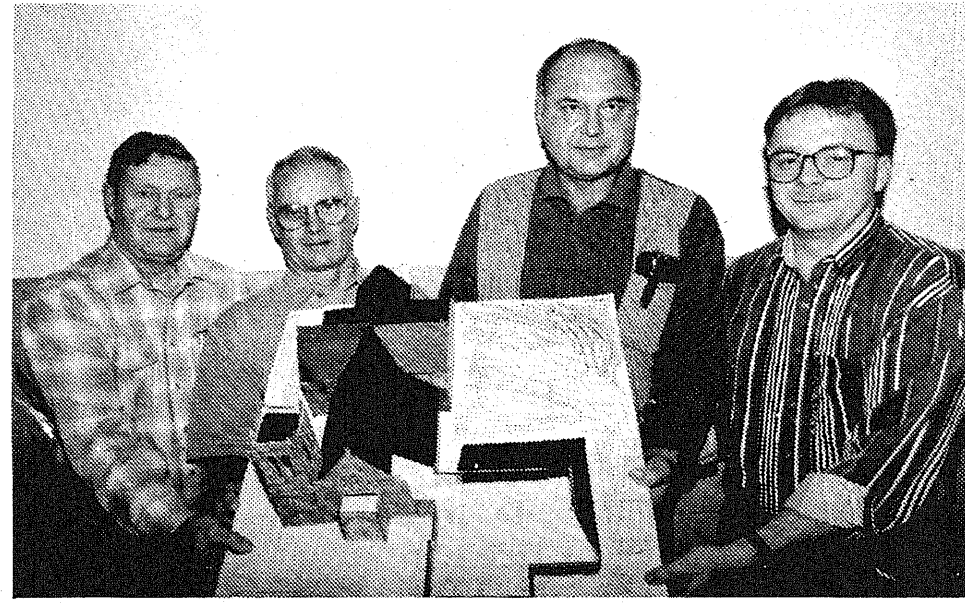
# Immanuel Church votes to build addition

Immanuel Lutheran Church members of Sebewaing last week voted to build a \$540,000 addition and renovation building project to expand the church and upgrade the adjacent Immanuel Lutheran School buildings.

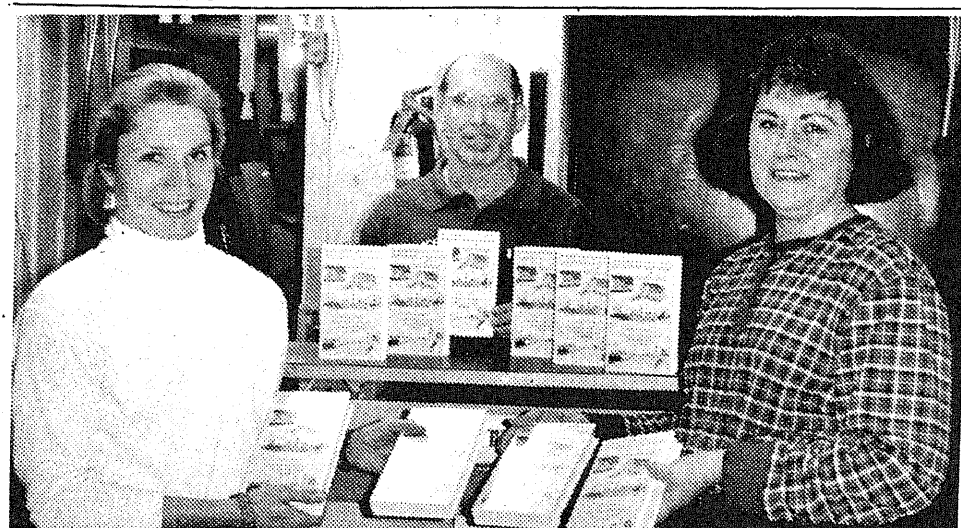
A total of 165 Immanuel voters cast ballots Oct. 30 on the proposed building project, which has been in the planning stages for the past two years.

The church's building committee spent many hours putting together a package which represented a capsule of critical concerns brought forth from different groups within the congregation.

connecting all three floors.

In addition to the added church space, renovation of the existing grade school was also included in the plan.

This would bring the school up to fire code by adding enclosed stairwells which in turn would reopen the upper level of the school for classroom use, put on a new roof and upgrade bathroom facilities on the upper floor.

After a lengthy discussion, ballots were cast and the proposed addition passed with 75% of the voters being in the affirmative.

Work on the new addition, which will be located to the south of the existing church, should begin in the spring of 1996 with a completion date a year after.

Laborers For Christ, a Christian mission group from within the Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod will assist in the building of the addition.

Estimated cost of the addition plus the renovation work on the elementary school is \$540,000.

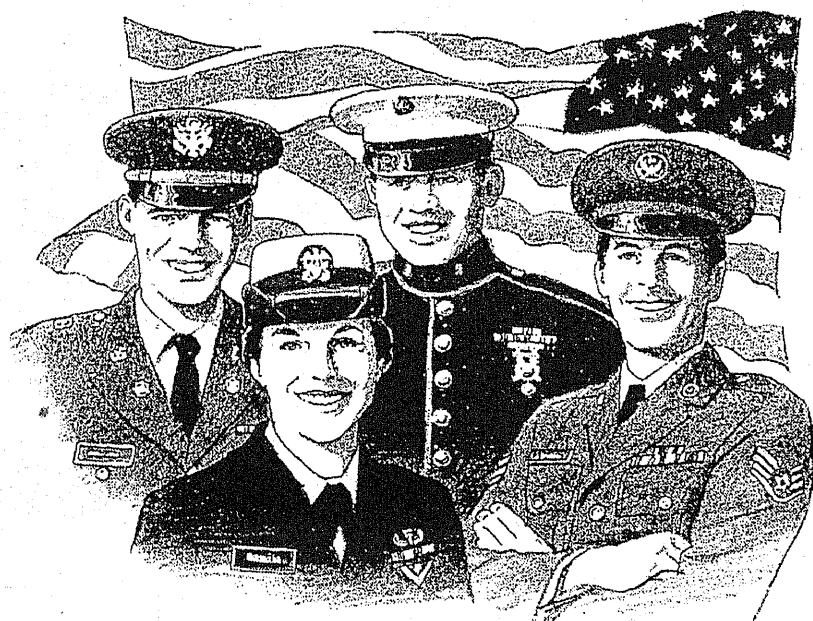

# Michigan Directory to be sold

Prior to 1978, if a telephone caller in Pigeon or Sebewaing needed to find a phone number for someone in Elkton or Caseville or Bad Axe, he'd have to find a phone book for the other villages or make a call to directory assistance.

That changed in June 1978, when Willis Hengy's Michigan Directory Co. published the first Huron County Directory.

The first directory listed every number for private and business telephones and was funded by advertising by classification in "green pages" in the back of the book.

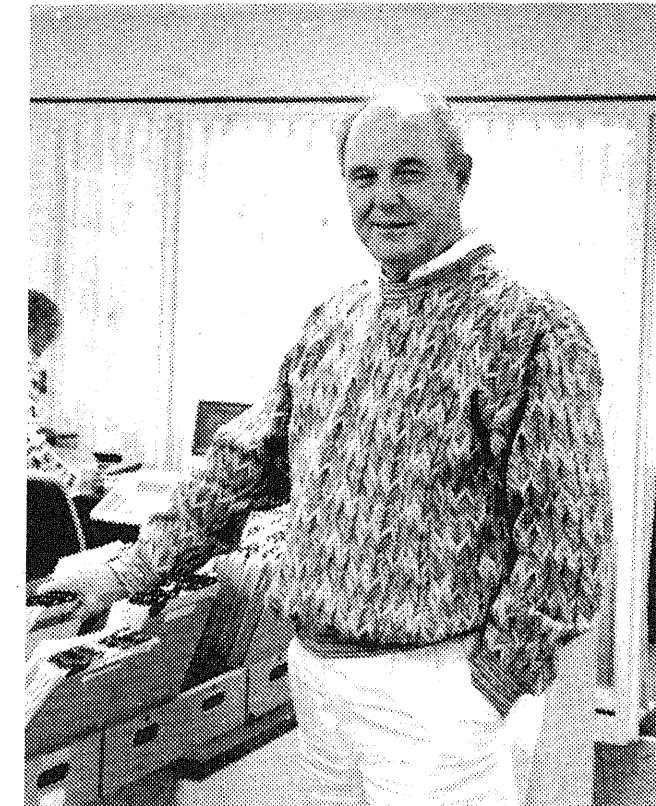
Later a peach-colored public service section was added to the county-wide books, as well as town maps, a listing of local, state and national officials, a complete list of churches, schools and non-profit organizations.

Over the years, Michigan Directory has grown from a one-book company to one that publishes over 15 directories covering much of eastern Michigan.

Still owned and operated by Hengy, the company boasts 30 full-time employees at its Pigeon home, with \$3 million in sales last year.

This coming January, Michigan Directory Co. will become a subsidiary of Suburban Communications Corp., headquartered in Livonia.

SCC also owns Michigan Community Directories, which also purchased four directories from Michigan Directory in 1994. At the time of the sale in July of last year, Michigan Directory gave SCC

an option to buy the entire company.

Hengy refused to disclose the exact selling price, but reports indicate that SCC will pay about \$5 million for Michigan Directory.

Hengy said his age played a part in the sale of his home-grown company. He is 65. "I'm probably getting to retirement age now," Hengy said. "The opportunity presented itself to me to sell to a large, reliable firm that will keep its offices in Pigeon."

In 1982, the company became a member of the National Yellow Pages Service Association, which allowed the advertising pages to become "yellow pages" and allowed the company to use national trademarks.

Continual computer upgrades has allowed the company to keep pace with its expanding roster of directories.

Hengy said the sale of his company should be completed in late January. As part of the sales agreement, SCC will keep Michigan Directory headquartered in Pigeon, and will probably add more staff.

With the sale, Michigan Community Directories, SCC owns the 12 Observer & Eccentric Newspapers in northwestern Metro Detroit, HomeTown Newspapers, Specialty Communications, Community Newspapers (Lansing), Press Community News (Cincinnati), and Camden Publications.

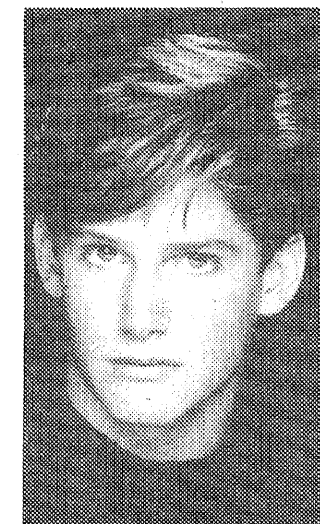

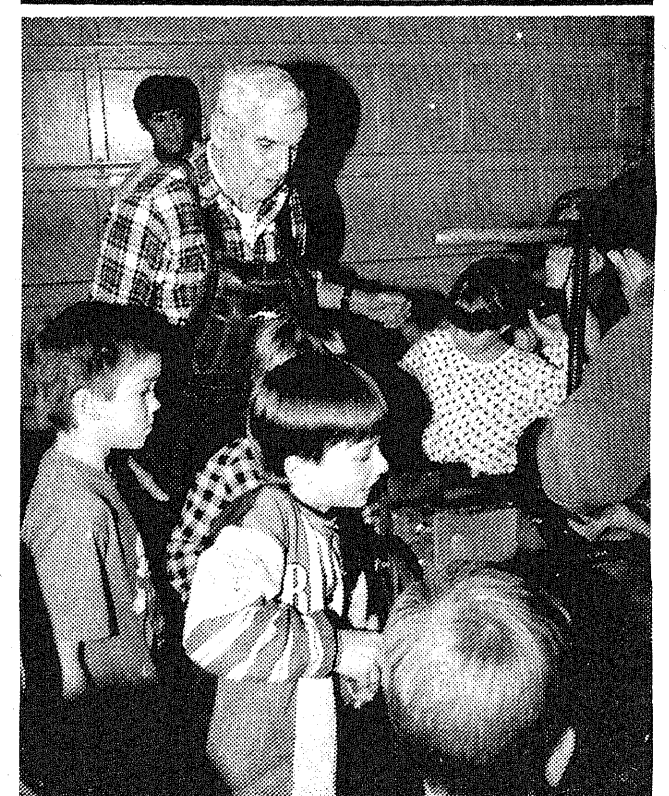

## Shouldn't drunks pay own costs?

When a drunk driver is stopped by police anywhere in our state, there follows preparation of reams of paper to document the subsequent arrest.

Time is spent interviewing the person involved. A portable breath test is administered, often followed by another test at the police station. A booking is involved, possibly some overnight jail time — then an appearance comes before a judge, all necessary steps in such matters.

Have you ever wondered how much such an arrest costs in police time and money... and who pays it all?

First off, such arrests cost a lot — possibly up to \$75 per arrest for the officer's time during and after the actual arrest. Add in all the indirect labor (clerks, filing, court costs, etc.) and you'll see taxpayers often pay more than \$100 per arrest, whether they're made in Detroit or Bad Axe or Bach.

Remember, too, when an officer is dealing with a drinking driver, he or she isn't handling a more-important or more-difficult criminal matter.

Why DO the law-abiding taxpayers have to pay that \$100 or so cost, per driver, when they're not the ones who caused the arrest? They weren't the ones who decided to break the law, and possibly cause much more harm after the drinking. Why shouldn't the drunk driver be forced to reimburse taxpayers for his arrest?

A growing number of Michigan communities are requiring the drinking driver to pay the costs of his or her arrest, as Observer and Eccentric Chairman Philip Power of Birmingham recently wrote in a newspaper column.

In South Lyon, for example, the city clerk sends drinking drivers a bill to cover costs of their arrests. The average bill has been about \$75 — and about half the drivers have been paying up. In Oakland County, Pontiac, Birmingham and Oak Park have similar ordinances, as does Livonia — although they don't enforce it much because of the time and money involved in the paperwork.

But no matter how you look at it, making lawbreakers pay full costs of their infractions is an idea whose time has come. Don't mistake such payment with the fines and costs imposed by the judge, which by law run from \$535 to nearly \$800, depending on the severity of each case. Part of those funds help operate the courts themselves and are spent for instructional and alcohol-counseling campaigns. The concept that the public-at-large is responsible for all such costs associated with the criminal justice system is a new one. In the Middle Ages, penalties for breaking the law were imposed on the lawbreaker's family — but now we realize penalizing an innocent relative for a crime committed by another isn't fair.

Will making lawbreakers pay for arrest costs deter or eliminate crime? Probably not — but it might make more people realize personal responsibility is an individual's concern... and it goes beyond a police officer merely making an arrest.

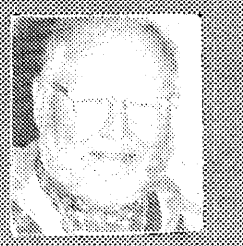
Several people have inquired about the money, in the sum of \$6,000, the Historical Society received with the Esterline Building.

All the above material was used and it cost the Historical Society \$345.91 to take over the building. I hope this clears things up.

They had a big platform on the east side and there were several speakers who gave some really good sermons. The school superintendent had the people sing, "When Johnny Comes Marching Home Again."

It was supposed to be a war to end all wars, but it didn't work out that way because World War II was much bigger than World War I.

(As recently as Sept. 26 [on Page 13], we've published the fact that renovations would cost up to \$4.5 million and the proposed new central elementary school would cost up to \$7 million. No major change in number of buses would be needed, officials say, with renovations or a new central building.)

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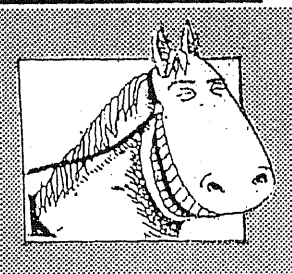
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## Horsin' Around

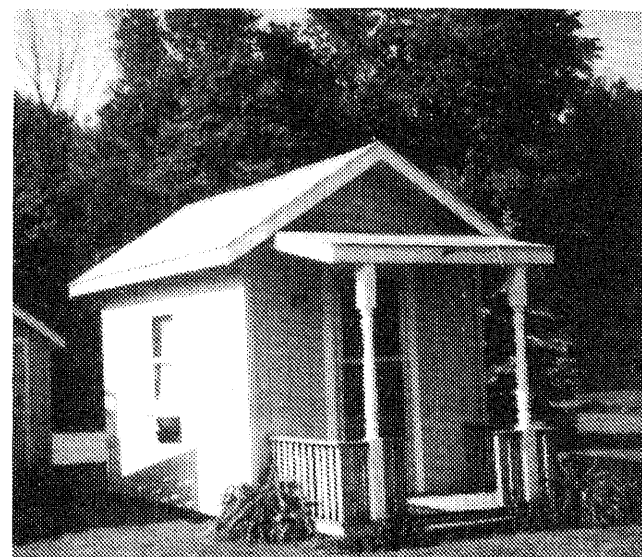

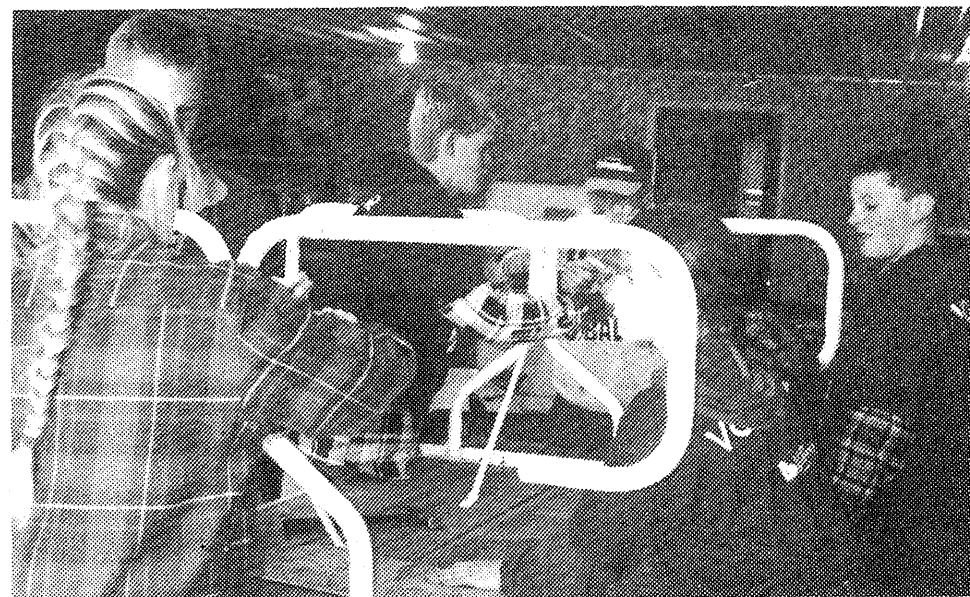

## 'Make A Difference Day' put youths to work

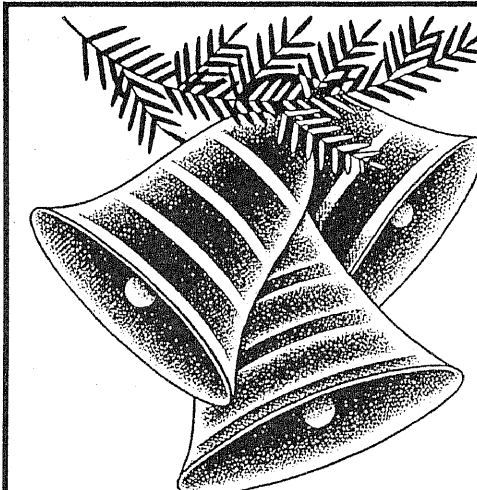

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# John Champagne observes 20 Elkton years

John Champagne was reluctant to purchase James Colgan's funeral home in Elkton when it was first offered to him in 1974.

Champagne had been raised in nearby Pinnebog, the son of Marge and the late John Champagne, Sr., and had a lot of relatives and friends in the area.

And because he might end up one day directing friends' funerals, he turned down Colgan's initial sale offer.

But in 1975, a year after the original offer, Champagne changed his mind and came home to Huron County after working in Capac for four years.

He bought the funeral home just west of Elkton on Nov. 1, 1975, becoming the fifth funeral director in Elkton's history.

"I was hesitant to come back because I didn't know how difficult it might be to work with friends like that," Champagne said.

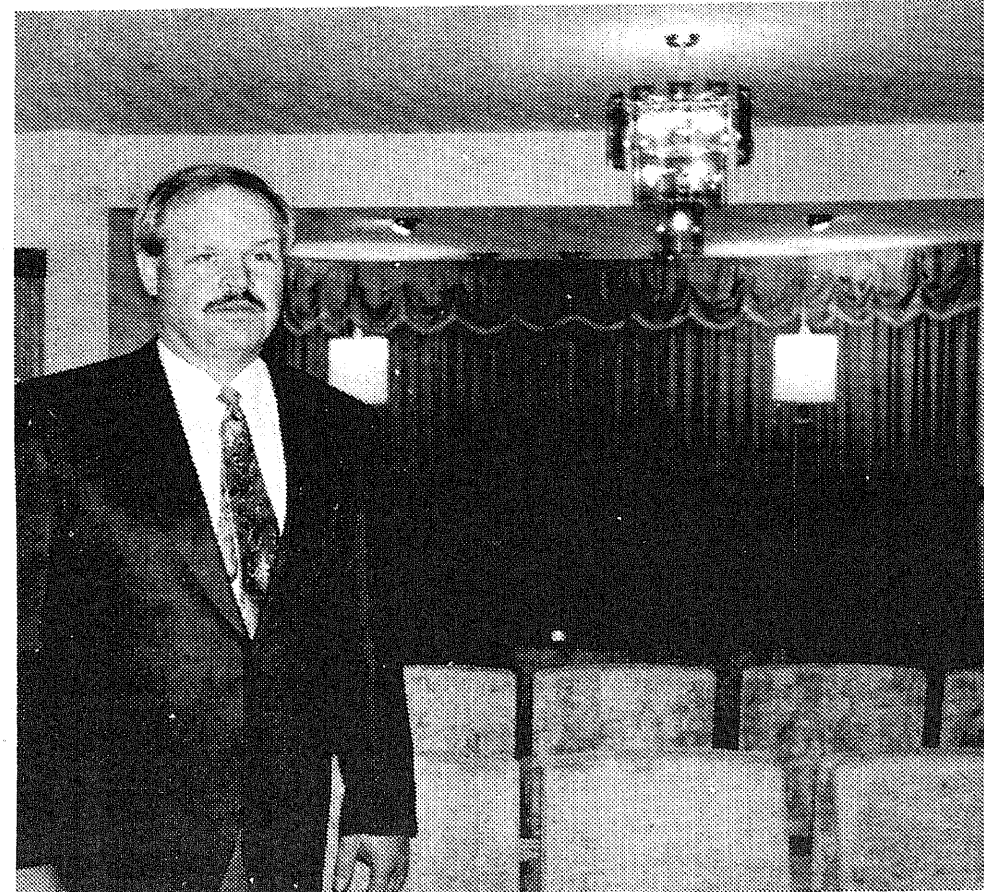
"But no matter where you're at, you get to know people and then you're still working with people you know. And that's the hardest part of the job."

Champagne took over a funeral home that began its existence in Downtown Elkton, in one of the three storefronts that now houses Thumb Hardware. When Colgan purchased the funeral home from Clarence Mayhew in 1961, he moved it to its present location a mile west of Elkton on M-142.

What is now the lounge between the chapel and the residence was once the casket selection area.

In 1976, Champagne had a basement dug under the chapel to provide a larger selection room to hold as many as 20 coffins. He also remodeled the chapel and expanded the parking lot.

In 1984, he opened the Champagne Funeral Chapel of Caseville in the historic

Crawford House overlooking the Pigeon River, so Caseville residents wouldn't need to travel out of town for their loved ones' funerals.

Ever since he moved back to Elkton, Champagne has made a commitment of service to his hometown. He has been a member of the Elkton Lions since 1975 and was a charter member of the now-defunct Elkton Jaycees.

He joined the Oliver Township Fire Department and now serves as Assistant Fire Chief. Until two years ago, he was a member of the Elkton Ambulance Service and has served as the local Red Cross Bloodmobile Chairman since 1976. He served as Chairman of the Elkton United Fund for several years in the late 1970s, and has been chairman for the past three years.

And in 1993, he was appointed Deputy Medical Examiner for Huron County.

Champagne and his wife Jill have raised four children, Benny, 15, Alex, 13, Jack, 11, and Mitch, 8, in the residence adjoining the funeral chapel.

With changing and improving electronic technology, such as cellular telephones, call forwarding and pagers, Champagne and other funeral directors have found it easier to take vacations and short trips, he says.

But probably the biggest change in the funeral business, he says, is the pre-planning that many people do before the need arises.

"I used to pre-plan one or two funerals a year," Champagne said. "Now I do at least one a week. I'm getting the information I need at the time of death, and who better to get it from than the person

whose funeral it will be?"

When a person pre-plans a funeral, they'll typically give Champagne a list of family members and other relatives, instructions on the type of funeral and burial services they want, plus information for memorial donations.

Although Champagne was reluctant to buy a funeral home so close to home, he says now that knowing details about a person's family sometimes makes it easier to handle the details of their funeral.

"Sometimes it helps because you know a lot of things about them," he said. "You can go ahead and call the minister and you can get started with a lot of things."

Helping the family and relatives of someone who has died is also part of his job, Champagne said.

He may provide information on where to get counseling or information on dealing with grief. He also forwards contributions made in the deceased person's name

to the charity or other organization named by the family. "Being a funeral director is more than taking care of the dead; it's taking care of the living, too," he said.

DEAR MR. ROSS:

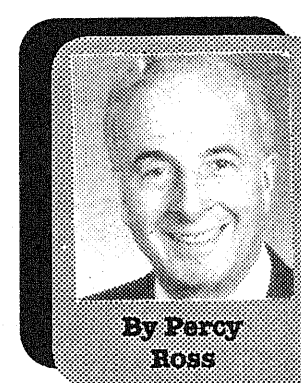

## Lakers meet DePorres again... with same result

The Lakers had their post-season football playoff hopes dashed Saturday by the DePorres Eagles, in the Class CC Region 4 opener.

The Eagles' size and their quickness made the difference in the game, as they knocked the Lakers out of the playoffs 34-6 at McCabe Field in Detroit.

"They were just a big, tough team," Coach Bill McLellan said.

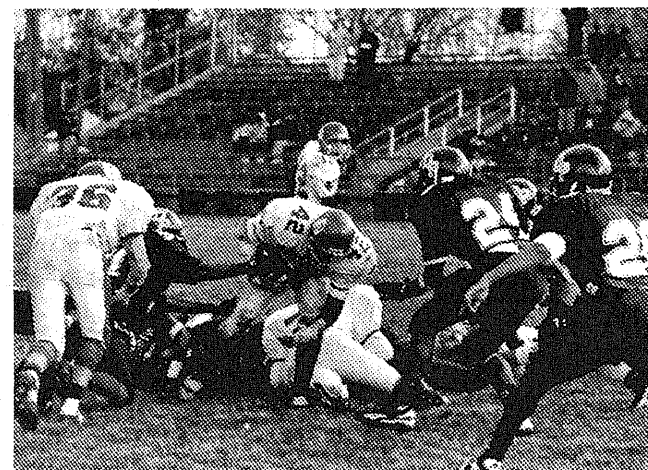
"It was a tough game but we hung in close there in the first half. We played hard but they're just a real physical team."

It looked to be a battle of the defenses in the first period, as most play occurred in the middle of the field. Gains were measured in short yards instead of big plays for both teams.

The Eagles managed to drive downfield late in the quarter, with Michael Baldwin picking up a first down at the Lakers' 10-yard line as the buzzer sounded.

After the change, the Eagles pushed to the end zone and Martez Johnson drove in from the three-yard line for their first TD of the game. Otto Stallworth grabbed a Kevin Glenn pass for the two-point conversion.

But the Lakers had scoring on the mind, too, and a drive from their own 44-yard line aided by a penalty on the

Eagles sent them into DePorres' territory.

Brian Gola racked up the Lakers' first points by clawing his way through the line and eluding a pack of defenders, running 44 yards for the TD with just over eight minutes left in the second quarter.

The two-point conversion attempt failed but the Lakers had made it known they were a force to be reckoned with.

After a couple of punt exchanges, the Eagles made a couple of big pass plays to move just short of the goal line. Quarterback Glenn went up the middle for his team's second score. Byron Gaspie made it 16-6 with the two-point conversion.

The Eagles' Aaron Brown blocked a punt after the Lakers' next drive, giving them the ball at the Laker 32. But a

series of penalties kept sending them back up the field. On first-and-30, Gola and Joel Maust teamed up for the quarterback sack.

Eric Gardy then intercepted a long pass from Glenn and returned it to the 36-yard line of the Eagles. But the Lakers weren't able to capitalize on the possession and the Eagles took over on downs at their own 32-yard line.

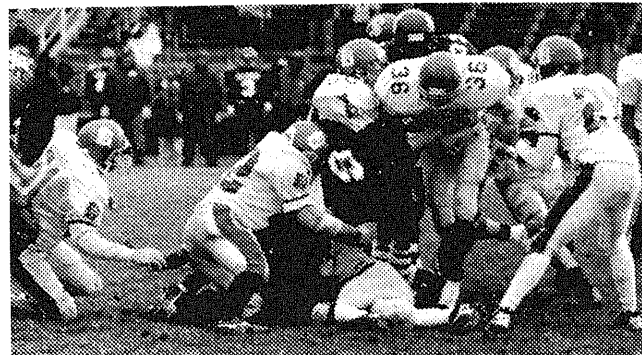
Six first downs later, the Eagles again scored, this time with Baldwin taking the ball in. Again the conversion attempt failed and the Eagles were up 28-6.

The Lakers made a stand as the clock ran down, but they were stymied when Joe Hightower intercepted a Nate Gotts pass with 3:00 left. The Eagles were forced to punt minutes later and the Lakers took over once again.

But they suffered another interception, this one by Gaspie who ran the ball up the sidelines and into the end zone with 24 seconds left on the clock to up the Eagles to 34-6.

Gola ran for 80 yards in 14 carries in the game. On defense, Scott Anderson had 16 tackles, while Gola had 12 and Gardy had eight. Maust had an interception and a fumble recovery.

The Lakers wind up the 1995 season with a 7-3 overall record, 4-1 in the TCC National, and a share of the league title.

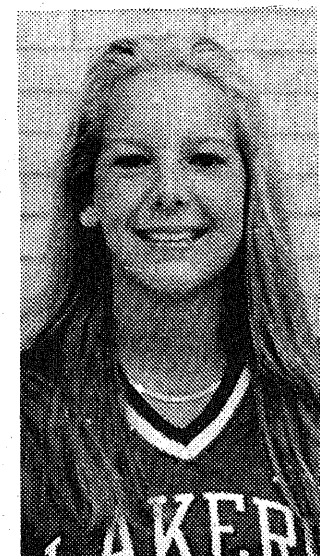

In the second half, the Lakers managed to play even, and at one point early in the fourth quarter, the Green pulled to within seven points, trailing 49-42.

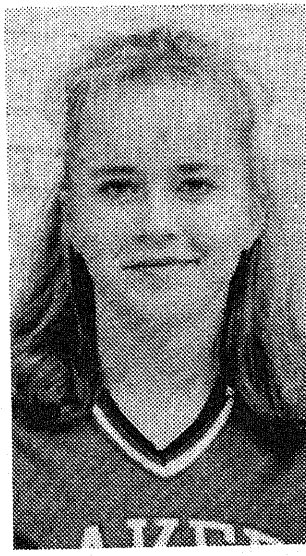
The Lakers had their chances, especially at the free throw line. But shooting 20 for 36 from the line was a key factor in the game.

throws. Kristin Damm followed with 16, including four triples in the fourth quarter.

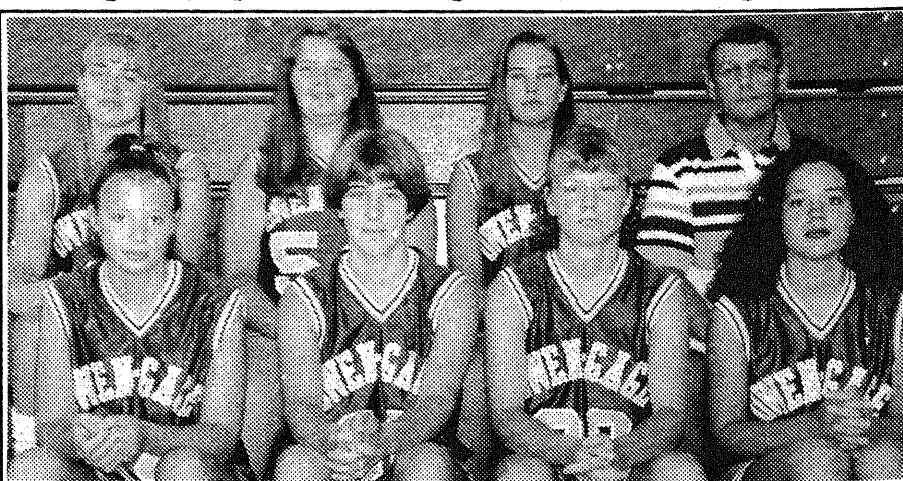
Angie Weidman had five, with Kate Damm and Casey McLellan each scoring four.

Rheinheimer is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Maynard Rheinheimer of Pigeon.

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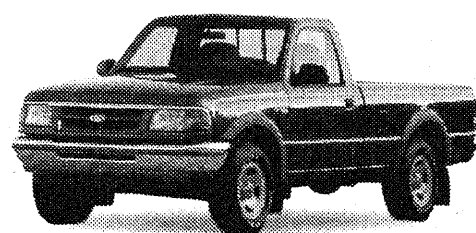
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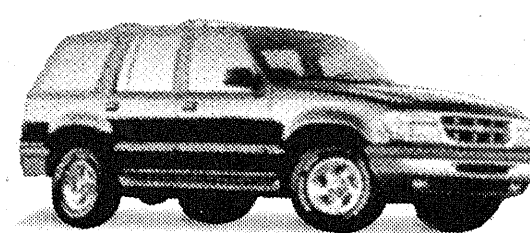

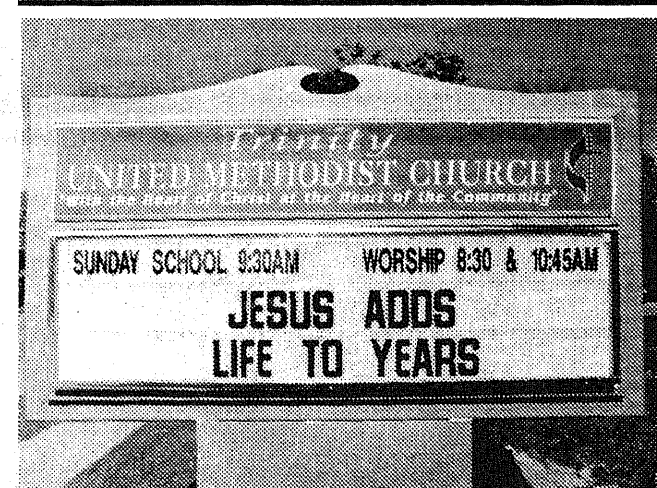

and agreed to a compromise for first-marking period grades.

"I tried to explain the system to them and tried to answer questions," Stahl said. "We agreed that under the new system for the first marking period, we would re-assess the grades and they would receive the higher of the two grades."

Stahl said that some teachers would add points to a student's grade, or subtract points, based on behavior, as well as base part of the grade on homework.

"Under outcome-based education, the only factor that should be weighed in on assessment," Stahl said.

"I'm not satisfied with our MEAP (Michigan Education Assessment Program) scores and if they're not up to snuff, does that mean you go about your business or change the way you do business?"

Under the new grading system, part of an education system called "mastery learning," students can receive an A, B, C, or N grade. The "N" grade means that the material studied has not been mastered, Stahl said.

Mastery learning is part of "outcome-based education," a change recently mandated by the state. The Michigan

Dept. of Education set guidelines stating that students acquire certain skills and knowledge before graduation and schools are to assess its students' progress

based on those guidelines. Assessment methods include not only tests, but also written essays in English classes, or art projects in art classes, Stahl said.

School officials were to hold a open meeting at 7 a.m. Monday (yesterday) to discuss outcome-based education, and another meeting for parents at 7 p.m.

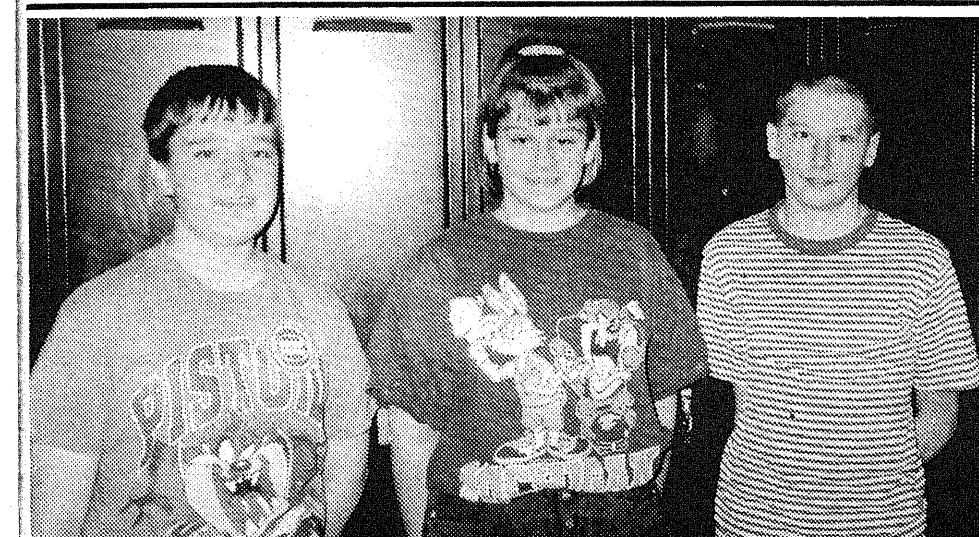

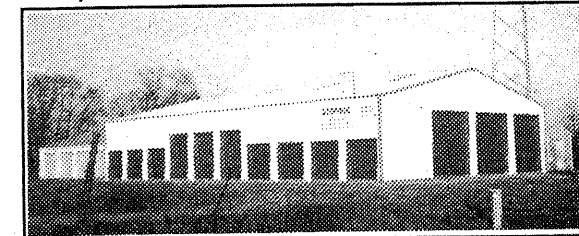
