I'm 40 and live alone. I never sleep well at night because of the heat in this low ncome apartment. However, my dreams are very positive. I want to be a TV alk show host.


My goal is to interview relebrities who have made an impact in my life. I want to do what I enjoy and I enjoy talking with high-energy, creative-minded people.

need enough money to get a place to live and get my power turned on.


The way I get paid I can never save enough to make a deposit, plus make monthly rent.

Given your concerns in life, I can't help but think a drink before bedtime would do you more good than hindrance. Independent living sounds like an excellent idea, especially because you'll be away from the abuse.

Take the \$500 I'm sending and get yourself into a safe haven. And remember what I said about a little nip before bedtime. It's just one of the things in life you're missing.
