Thumb village elections set

Familiar faces will be joined by newcomers in several local village elections next year, necessitating a Primary Election on Monday, Feb. 19 in those towns.

The General Election in all communities is Monday, March

In Sebewaing, Village President Dave Wineman will again be challenged by Don Martins in the February Primary. The two opposed each other in the 1994 election, following former President Lloyd Adam's retirement.

Four candidates are running for three open Council seats of two-year terms, including incumbents Don Beers, Fred Sharpsteen and newly-appointed J.D. McBrayer and newcomer Sam Folk.

Former Council member Roger Armbruster is the lone candidate for the open one-year term, after trustee Rod Tietz resigned recently.

Freshman Council member John Pitcher is not a candidate for the 1996 primary.

Unopposed are incumbents Maxine Kauffold for clerk and Sharron Edler for treasurer.

In Unionville, incumbent President Ted Balzer, Clerk/ Assessor Harvey Niedrich and Treasurer Robert Balzer are all seeking re-election, while trustee Lee Mascorro will try to retain his seat.

Newcomer Mike Matthews will also run for a trustee position. Chris Krouchkow (recently appointed) and Fred Gardner are not seeking re-election. A single trustee seat remains open for a write-in candidate or council appointment, and all are two-year terms.

In Owendale, all incumbents are seeking re-election. President Walter Howard, Clerk Randy Howard and Treasurer Lois Blondell, plus trustees Martin Blondell, Robert Ricker and Richard Glidden will appear on the ballot in March.

In Pigeon, President Dave Geiger, Clerk Janet Heckman, Treasurer Frances Armbruster and Assessor Clayton Esch are all seeking to return to their positions.

Incumbent trustee John Smith is vacating his seat on the council, and Dale Collison has filed to the spot. Trustees Michel Gehrs and Ken Licht are also seeking re-election. All positions carry two-year terms.

In Elkton, President James Jaworski will seek re-election. as will Clerk Janet Santos, Treasurer Max McKenzie and Assessor Phyllis Tamblyn. Jaworski took over the President's seat following the death of Barb Thompson earlier this year.

Trustee Jerry White, who was appointed to fill Jaworski's vacant council seat, is also seeking re-election, along with Ivan "Bud" Robertson.

Newcomer Fred Reynolds is also seeking to replace trustee Frank Kolar, who is not running again.

Improvements to Huron's E-911 system on the way

With more than \$1.2 million worth of equipment on order and a paging frequency recently approved by the Federal Communications Commission, Huron County police officers and emergency workers will be able to clearly hear emergency calls throughout the county.

The Huron County Board of Commissioners last week approved the purchase of new equipment as well as a bond issue to pay for it all.

The dispatch center, now housed by the Huron County Sheriff's Department, will be moved to the current commissioner's room in the County Building, according to Sheriff Michael Gage. The move will provide more space for dispatchers and their equipment. The purchases include:





Police said all drivers were wearing seat belts, while



Maybe there ARE term limits already

Mentioned in this space last week was the fact that U.S. Sen. Nancy Kassebaum will retire from her longtime Senate seat. Since that time, at least four other Washington lawmakers have announced their intentions to do the same thing... and perhaps that shows the effects of "natural term limits" after

While several states have imposed a maximum number of terms during which a lawmaker can serve, Sen. Kassebaum chose to leave on her own — even though she was just now achieving the seniority power which comes from government longevity.

She's now been joined by Congresswoman Patricia Schroeder, Senator Alan Simpson and several others — all choosing to step down now,

Perhaps it's a reflection of the pressures which can be too great to bear, or maybe these leaders have just had enough (or too much.) For the most part, they say they want some time to themselves and for their families.

Whatever their personal reasons, the goal of turning over governmental leadership positions IS being achieved. Remember, too, we lose the good and the bad lawmakers when everybody starts to leave. That's a truism with term limits, for better or

Speed certainly kills

Our Michigan Senate Transportation Committee voted last week to raise the state speed limit to 70 mph on most interstate expressways, even though Michigan State Police say at least 250 more traffic deaths will likely result annually.

We're headed for more trouble — and tragic misery — by raising those speed limits, even though lawmakers have a convenient answer.

They say "Michigan drivers are already driving 70 and 75 now, so we're just bringing up the speed limits to match what people are already doing."

My, oh my, what short memories they have. Setting freeway speed limits at 70 mph will mean motorists will now start driving 80 mph and faster — the fastest drivers ALWAYS exceed the limit.

At least we're better off than some states, which are setting NO maximum limits. Put your seatbelts on there, Germany's Autobahn is coming to



The last dentist I went to told me my other wisdom teeth are still there and are in

I always was able to take care of myself, but now I have to depend upon a lot of other people to take care of me. I used to help old men put on their coats, but now young men have to help me put on

I don't know how long this will go on, but my grandfather was 97 years old and one brother was 93, another one 90 and I still have one brother who's 91, a sister who's 93 and another one was 89. So if the Good Lord wants me around, I still have

Some people asked me what I used to eat on Thanks-

giving. Well, once I was in Florida and I went to a friend's home and they had pickled beef tongue for dinner.

Some people think that wouldn't make good eating. But I really liked it and I'll eat that anytime I can get it.

When I was still quite young, we went to my grandmother's for Thanksgiving. It was a cold day and we dressed up good and warm. Dad got the car started and backed out of the barn and the carn stopped. So he tried to start it and it just wouldn't

The battery was run down so he started to crank it, but it just wouldn't start so I told him maybe he was out of gas. We looked around and the

tank was dry, so he took a can and went to a neighbor's, but his dog wouldn't let him come close to the gas tank, so he sent me to another neigh-

The man drained a gallon out of his car. Well, we got our carstarted and got to town and Dad told them to put in five gallons and gave them one dollar and got change

We had a Model T Ford touring car and the side curtains didn't fit very well, so me and my mother held them shut 'til we got there. Our

hands were pretty cold. Grandma had a very good dinner and I still remember that good fried chicken and mashed potatoes and gravy and baked apple.

The Bible tells us that in all things be thankful. Well, we are living in a good country and although there is war and earthquakes and sickness all around us, we still have many things that lots of other people don't have.


this happen. I can see this new piano really showcasing the talents of our students. I also see it benefitting the community because it symbolizes a commitment made to the arts."
