Contributions: When giving also means receiving

Charitable contributions are not only good for the soul, they are also good for the tax

According to the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants, charitable giving is a smart yearend tax move for individuals who itemize on their tax returns. Generally, if youmake a contribution to a charity by Dec. 31, 1995, you may deduct the amount on your 1995 tax return and thereby reduce your taxable income.

OUALIFIED ORGANIZA-

TIONS: To claim a deduction for a charitable contribution, you must contribute to a qualified organization. These include: churches, non-profit schools, hospitals and volunteer fire companies, veterans groups and medical research organizations, such as the American Heart Association and the American Cancer Society. Political contributions are nondeductible.

Generally, dues to a fraternal lodge, and contributions to lobbying groups (such as Clean Water Action and the Sierra Club) cannot be claimed as charitable deductions.

For a complete listing of charitable organizations, see Internal Revenue Service Publication 78, "Cumulative List of Organizations."

TYPES OF CONTRIBU-TIONS: You need not limit your charitable contributions to cash. The rules give you the option of making various types of contributions. These can include furniture, clothing, computer and other equipment, and even an old

When you donate property, the amount of the deduction is generally equal to the current fair-market value of the donated property at the date of the contribution, not its original cost, the CPAs say.

LIMITS ON CONTRIBU-TIONS: Generally, you can deduct cash contributions equal to 50% of your adjusted gross income (AGI).

Any excess can be carried forward for up to five years. Contributions of appreciated capital gain property, such as securities or works of art. are generally limited to 30%

RECORDKEEPING IS CRITICAL: For any contribution of \$250 or more, you must have a receipt, letter or other statement from the charitable organization listing the amount of the cash donation, or, for contributed property, a description - but not necessarily the value - of any property donated. In addition the receipt must state whether or not the charity provided any goods or services in exchange for the cash

Where a charitable organi-

•

zation provides goods or services in exchange for contributions over \$75, the organization must provide the do-

nor with a good-faith esti-

mate of the value of the goods

or services provided. For noncash contributions over \$500, you must complete Form 8283 and attach it to your return. If the noncash contribution exceeds \$5,000 (\$10,000 for gifts of closely held stock), you also may have to obtain and attach a written appraisal. A summary of the appraisal should be attached to the tax return

(Additional requirements apply to contributions of art, if you are claiming a deduction of \$20,000 or more). There is no appraisal requirement for publicly traded securities for which a market quota is readily available on an established securities

In a charitable lead trust, property is donated to a trust, creating an income interest in the property to the charitable organization for a certain number of years, or for the life of the individual(s). At the end of the term, the remaining trust assets pass back to the creator of the trust (you), or other designated noncharitable beneficiaries (vour heirs).

In a charitable remainder trust, property is transferred to a trust that provides for a specified distribution, at least annually, to one or more beneficiaries (you or your heirs). The distribution may be for life, or a term of years. At the end of the term, the remaining assets pass to a charity.



MUCH? When you allow your debt to climb too high, you run the risk of not being able to meet your monthly payments. Missed or late payments can seriously damage your credit rating - not to mention your state of mental well-being.

Most credit advisers say you should not spend more than 10 to 15% of your total monthly net income on comsumer debt - that includes payments on credit cards and on personal, student and car loans.

It does not include your mortgage payment. Generally, your mortgage payment should not exceed 28% of your monthly net income.

If you're near or above the 15% danger point, it's time to put some serious debtreduction strategies into play.

Progress Report On Central Elementary School Study

By Robert Drury Laker Schools' Superintendent

In last month's issue of The Laker Wave, I highlighted progress that was being made in the area of studying the costs of constructing a central elementary school to house all of our districts kindergarten through 5th graders. In this month's column I would like to report on what progress has been made since the last report.

Our board of education has received a cost estimate for construction of an elementary building to house approximately 600 students, and other associated costs.

I will highlight what those areas are, and the cost estimates from the architect hired to do this study:

K-5 Elementary school for 600 students with 70,259 sq. ft. @ \$78 per sq. ft.

Utilities including well, electric service, and sanitary lagoon .. Site work including paving, play areas, and landscaping

Renovations to high school kitchen in lieu of constructing an elementary school kitchen .100,000

Relocating bus garage to

Kindergarten thru 12th grade technology upgrades .. All associated fees ...

Total Cost of Project \$7,190,200

that are in addition to the construction of a central elementary school building.

The first, relocating the bus garage, is an item the board of education will address before that ballot proposal is formally adopted. The thinking is that if all of the educational buildings in the district are located at one spot, it makes sense to also locate the bus garage there also.

The second item, renovating the high school kitchen, instead of building an elementary kitchen, is being studied as a cost saving measure. The renovation of the existing kitchen is many times less expensive than adding a new kitchen to the elementary

The third item, technology, is being studied as a necessary cost of updating educational opportunities for all students kinder- a reality.

You will notice that there are three items garten through 12th grade. This update would include elementary computer areas. wiring for communication between all buildings in the district, and wiring and installation of computer hardware and software between each classroom in the district.

In the next month our board of education will be studying the costs associated with a central elementary school, and what financing options are available for such a large project.

Any input that the administrative team or the board of education can receive from the citizens within our district is greatly appreci-

Remember, this is your school district. We are committed to providing the best education opportunities possible. It is up to the voters within our district as to whether an educational opportunity such as this is to be

- Is my child's behavior a problem? · What are my child's strengths and weaknesses?
- Does my child need additional help in certain academic areas?
- How can I help?

Joining your child's parent-teacher organization is another suggestion for parents. When parents make a commitment to be- This is a good way to meet the parents of coming involved in their child's education, your child's friends and to learn what is going they dramatically increase their child's op- on at the school as a whole. This gives parents an idea of what to expect for their child in the years to come.

> Encouraging children to become involved in after-school activities or athletics is important, too, because extracurricular activities provide an element of social interaction, which is a vital part of a child's development.

At home, parents can let their child know that they support the school and expect good study habits. Homework should be made a priority and a regular time set aside each day for this purpose. Even if no homework has been assigned, the study schedule should be maintained - by reading a book







Laker High School Guidance Counselor As the holidays are rapidly approaching, activities at Laker High School are in full swing. Currently, I have been able to finish my appointments with seniors regarding graduation requirements and their future plans as Laker graduates.

One of the items discussed in the appointment was the portfolio. All students are required by the State of Michigan to have a portfolio upon graduation. Here at Lakers, there are seven items which must be completed before a senior can graduate.

The first item is a career plan. As sophomores, students had the opportunity to take the PLAN test or to participate in Holland's Self-Directed Search. Either way a career exploration activity was placed in the portfo-

The final item in the portfolio will be a personal statement. As seniors our students will be asked to respond to questions in regard to life experience and future goals. This is usually done in December or January, and must be accomplished in the student's own handwriting.

When all of these components are in the portfolio, the portfolio is prepared to be turned over to the senior as the student graduates and receives a diploma. Many students keep records of academic achievement and any awards they have received in their portfolio as well.





Navy bean seed 'scarce;' act promptly

Navy Bean seed is "extremely scarce" for 1996, so producers' needs should be considered early!

That's the warning from the Michigan Bean Commission in its Nov. 23 MBC News-

Heavy blight was seen throughout the Michigan 1995 crop, so local clean stocks will be in limited supply, warned MBC executive secretary Dale Kuenzli, at St.

State Bean Day will be Tuesday, Feb. 27, in the New Horizon Center (formerly Kmart) on W. State Street, Saginaw, Kuenzli says.

The larger facility with free parking will accommodate visitors, exhibitors and food service in "a much more acceptable manner," he added.

The Bean Commission

will continue its marketing development of Michigan beans to Mexico when MBC, together with Michigan Bean Shippers Association, exhibits at the Mexican Festival de Alimentos Monday-Wednesday, Jan. 15-17.

Kuenzli pointed out that the latest trip to Mexico was followed immediately with sales of 225,000 cwt. of Black

The Commission is also servicing more than 1,000 new dieticians' requests for bean information, as discovered at the American Dietetic Association's 78th annual convention in Chicago.

Beans are in the vogue in dietary considerations in food planning for "a healthyeating world," Kuenzli says.

He stated that the bean industry has much to be thankful, listing a good harvest, good quality and an expanding demand.

Kuenzli concluded hehas additions to the MBC hope - greater usage of beans and higher prices. He committed MBC "to work on developing demand to improve the prices."
