Laws of Newspapers.

1. Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary, are considered as wishing to continue the subscription.

2. If subscribers wish their papers discontinued, publishers may continue to send them until their arrears are paid.

3. If subscribers move to other places without informing the publisher, and the paper is sent to the former address, they are held responsible. Notice should always be given of the removal.

4. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their papers from the office, or leave to others to be sent, they are held responsible until they return and give notice to discontinue.

5. The courts have decided that refusing to take a paper from the office, or removing and leaving it uncollected, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.

6. Any person who removes a newspaper and makes use of it, whether he has ordered it or not, will be held as a subscriber.

7. If subscribers pay in advance, they are bound to give notice to the publisher at the end of their time, if they do not wish to continue taking it; otherwise the publisher is authorized to send it on, and the subscribers will be responsible until an express notice, with payment of all arrears, is sent to the publisher.
