NATIONAL TREE CULTURE.-A bit of gossip is going the rounds of the press telling how a certain good citizen recently cut down an immense oak tree on his premises, because its gigantic size and wonderful beauty drew so many vis-itors. The tree had passed its second century of life and deserved a better fate. Its fall brought forcibly to mind the saying of an ancient lover of the orest that the man who would wantonly kill a shade tree would slay one of his fellow creatures. It would be sad to believe this, however, for the waste of forest trees in our land has been indiscriminate and universal. So far has it gone that in some parts of New England and the Middle States large manufactories are kept in enforced idleness during part of the winter months by reason of drouth, and the character of the soil in other sections has undergene a change for the worse. It would not be a bad idea if the North should follow the example of the West in availing itself of the provision made by national legislation for the encouragement of tree planting. In Minnesota, since the act in-question was passed, fifteen million trees have-been planted in about seven thousand acres. In addition the number planted on private places, and not embraced in the Assessor's returns and on the railroad lines, will bring the total the State up to 20,000,000. This is just so much solid wealth added to the coffers of the State, and the trouble has

Kansas Crop Prospects.

The Kansas State Board of Agriculture has sent out its monthly report, giving the condition of crops, stock, etc., May 1, as compiled from reports made to it. The showing is very good, although the general averages seem to have been made without reference to the amount produced in the various counties, and thus an incorrect result may pos have been obtained. Compared with an ordinary or fair average crop, winter wheat and rye are placed at four per cent above, spring wheat one per cent. above, oats one per cent. below, and barley at an average. Clover is seventytimothy ninety-five per cent. Cattle and sheep were in nearly average condi rses, mules and working cattle rather poor; swine, sixty-six per cent. Apples are marked seventy; peaches sixty-three grapes seventy-eight.

Roman Kitchen Litensils. 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
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
