In a letter from one of our oldest advertising customers we have the fol-lowing inquiry: "Why is it that the best English papers charge so much less for advertising than ours?

Admitting the premises on which this question is based to be correct—and it is undoubtedly the case that the average advertising rates of American papers are higher than those of English journals of corresponding character—the answer is not difficult to give. In the first place, the circulation of English journals is smaller in numbers than our own. Each copy, however, probably goes into the hands of more readers, so that the difference to the advertiser is partly made up in this way. But it is not alone in the publication of a larger edition that the expense of the American publisher is increased, but he pays far higher prices for every line of type set—probably more than double English wages for every kind of labor entering into the manufacture of the journal, and a consuderably higher price for the paper-on which it is printed. Then the competi-tion against which he contends compels him to reduce his subscription rates to a point at which the subscriber, as compared with the advertiser, pays a smaller proportion of the expense of making the paper here than there.—Country Gen-

It provides that no corporation transporting animals from one State to another shall confine the same in vehicles, railroad cars, boats or vessels of any description for a longer period than twenty-four consecutive ours, without unloading the same for rest, water and feeding, for a period of at least seven consecutive hours, unless prevented from so unloading by storm or other accidental causes; that animals led shall be properly fed and watered during the rest by the owner by person having the custody thereof, in or case of his default in so doing, then or the company officials, at the expense of the owner or custodian; said officials not being liable and the company having a lieu upon the animals for food, care and custody; that the penalty for failing to comply with the provisions of this law shall be a fine of not less than \$100 and not more than \$500, or by imprisonment for not more than one year, or both. But when animals shall be carried in vehicles where they have proper food, water, space and rest, the provisions in relation to unloading shall not apply.

A CENTENNIAL VETERAN.

Man Who Listened to a Speech from Washington, and Who Belonged to a Fire Company in 1799.

Michael Edwards, Sr., of Mounds ville, Pa., is now in his one hundred and ninth year. When at Moundsville, a few was something to look upon a man whose birth dated back to the 17th of August, 1767, and to hear him tell of seeing Gen. Washington in the streets of his native town ere yet the Father of his Country had reached the zenith of his great fame. Mr. Edwards thinks he remem bers when the news of the Declaration of Independence was brought to York, Pa., where he then lived. He remembers hearing Washington make a short speech in York, after the war, in which, among other things, he said that there was likely to be sometime in the future, a war, caused by office seekers, that would be worse than the Revolution. his first vote for Washington, for President, and voted for him both times, and him for John Adams. He left York in 1801 and went out to Washington, Pa, where he was married in 1805 to Miss Eleanor Cady, a lady nineteen years his junior. They lived together fifty three years, she dying in 1858. The family consisted of four boys, all still living, the oldest of whom is now in his seventieth year. Mr. Edwards lived at Washington until 1835, at which time he moved to Moundsville, where he has since resided. He worked at his trade (gunsmithing) until he was between eighty and ninety years of age. he was in his ninety-third year he walked from Wheeling to Moundsville in about two hours and a half, a feat that many young men could not rival. He has seldom been severely sick in his life, although he has never taken extra care of his health; chewed and smoked tobacco, and taken an occasional glass of liquor, although -not addicted to drink. His general habit has been to rise and retire at an early hour, and during the most of his hie has seldom slept after four in the morning. He comes of a long-lived ancestry, as do most persons who attain great age, his mother having npward of one hundred and lived to be

three years old. In the fall of 1870, in his one hundred and fourth year, Mr. Edwards revisited the scenes of his childhood in York, Pa., and while there received quite an ovation from its citizens. Among other tokens of respect, he was presented with a gold-headed cane by the members of the Laurel Company, of which company he was "the oldest surviving member. The company had him charged on their books with a fine of 11 pence "for nonattendance on the evening of 30th March, 1799," and while there the Secretary, as a good joke, tendered him a
