





The Governor of Idaho telegraphed to the War Department, June 20, stating that only twenty regulars were available, and asking authority to organize and provision volunteers at the government expense. At least thirty settlers have been killed, and there is anxiety as to the fate of Captain Perry, who was at last accounts engaged in a close fight with a superior force of Indians. If all the disaffected Indians should unite with the Nez Perces, the army will have ample employment during the summer

A Victoria dispatch of June 20 says: News from the Rocky Mountain camp of the Canadian Pacific Railway states that the men in charge there have been murdered by the Blackfeet Indians. One man escaped, and brought the intelligence to Frazer River. There was a large amount of railway supplies

A dispatch received at Portland, Oregon on June 21, from Wallawala, says the Indians have killed every man of the Selmon River, but let the women and children live. A company of cavalry and Jim Lawler, an Indian, and forty of his men came to Lewiston, with all the em-ployees and all the whites of the Kamiah. The reservation at Lapwai is abandoned, and all have come to Lewiston.

The Indians have got the best of the

soldiers up to this time. They have killed about thirty, and driven them back from White Bird to Mt. Idaho. The killed and wounded up to June 21, were about fifty. Troops from Wallawals, can not get to Cames Prairie. It will take five hundred soldiers to whip Joseph's band. Winnemucca and his hand are encamped near Cow Creek. in Idaho, armed. They claim to be peaceable, but the Governor telegraphed to Silver City instructions for Winnemucca to return, he refused to do so, saying he would fight first.

A press dispatch from Boise City, June 22, says: This evening twenty-five armed volun-teers, under the command of Captain Orlando Robbins, an experienced Indian fighter, will start for Northern Idaho, where the settlements are threatened by the Indi ans, with fifty stacks of arms for the settlers. A few hundred stands of arms belonging to the territory are at the disposal of the Government, but so many exposed settlements are asking for arms and ammunition that the supply is likely to be exhausted. Volunteer companies are being ments. He is now totally blind. This

One of the most efficient methods employed in Siberia to blind political prisoners is to pass before the eyes of the captives a bright steel blade heated to red heat; but it seems likely that with the march of civilization the Russians jailers will adopt another method which will produce exactly the same result, that is, they will try blue glass.
