Admitting that Thackeray bestowed more labor on " Esmond," and showed more artistic conscience in it than in any of his other books, we cannot allow that, admirable as it is as a piece of "restora-tion," it has the vitality of "Vanity Fair" and "The Newcomes." Millions of Pigeons.

The most celebrated pigeon roost probably in the country is in Scott county, Ind., where, it is said, acres of timber are covered nightly with wild pigeons. For the past seventy-five years this noted locality has been a roosting place for pigeons, and millions of these birds congregate there nightly during the seasons of their visits to that section of the country. They fly away of mornings to their feeding places in the woods and fields of Indiana and Kentucky, distant from the roost in many instances from 100 to 300 miles, returning again at night, arrivals often continuing up to midnight. The timber on thousands of acres covered by this roost is broken down badly. large limbs being snapped off like reeds by the accumulated weight of the birds upon them. Throughout the entire night there is heard the cracking and crushing of limbs, the hum and flurry and drumming of wings, the explos of firearms and the confusion and bedlamic thrashing sounds caused by people beating the birds from the trees with long poles. Thousands of pigeons are killed nightly, but all this alsughter seems to make no diminution in the vast flocks that congregate at this roost.

VALUE OF WORN GOLD COINS.

Letter of Information From the Coiner at

the New Orleans Mint. Inquiries are daily made at the mint as to the least current weight at which the Government will receive gold coins at their nominal value. Under the fourteenth section of the Coinage act of 1873 it is provided "that gold coins re-duced in weight by natural abrasion not more than one-half of 1 per centum be-low the standard weight, after a period of circulation of twenty years, and a proportionate rate for a less period, shall be received at their nominal value

The following statement exhibits the standard weight and least current weight of gold coins after a circulation of twenty years, and at which least current weight they are receivable in payment

The legal deviation from the standard weight of the gold dollar being onequarter of a grain, it will continue current until reduced in weight below 25 55 100 grains. All double eagles which have not been artificially reduced in weight will be found within the limit of natural abrasion allowed by law. The same rule will apply to eagles coined since 1845, half-eagles coined since 1855, and quarter-eagles coined

since 1860. The double eagle should continue current for fifty years from the date of coinage; the eagle for thirty-five years; the half eagle for twenty years; and the three-dollar piece and quarter cagle at least fifteen years. The deviation from annulard weight of one quarter of a grain allowed by law in the coinage of the gold dellar exceeds the legal limit of a grain.

The potter had a heap of the prepared clay near him, and a pot of water by his side. Taking a lump in his hand, he placed it on the top of the wheel, which revolves horizontally, and smoothed it into a low cone; like the upper end of a sugar-loaf; then, thrusting his thumb into the top of itahe opened a hole down through the center, and this he constantly widened by pressing the edges of the revolving cone bebecame thinner, he gave it whatever shape he pleased, with the utmost ease

and expedition. It is evident, from numerous expressions in the Bible, that the potter's ves-sel was the synonym of utter fragility; and to say, as David does, that Zion's King would dash his enemies in pieces like a potter's vessel was to threaten with ruinous and remediless destruc-

We who are accustomed to strong stoneware of considerable value, can scarcely appreciate some of these Biblical references, but for Palestine they are still as appropriate and forcible as ever. Arab iars are so thin and frail that they are literally dashed to shivers by the slightest stroke. Water jars are often broken by merely putting them down upon the floor; and the servant frequently returns from the fountain empty-handed, having had all his jars smashed to atoms by some irregular behavior of the donkey.—Harper's Maga-




