How a Negro Confederate Spy Was Ar rested After the War and Sold into Navery in Cuba. Washington Mass, | Gazette.]

In 1863 General Pemberton manded at this point. Colonel Heming-way owned a faithful slave Peyton by name, a noted negro fiddler, known for miles around, and highly respected by both black and white. When his young master, W. Lynn Hemingway, at present State Treasurer of Mississippi, joined the old "Carroll Rifles," he took Peyton along as a trusted servant. He went with him into Virginia and returned home in 1863. In February or March of that year a faithful spy was needed to visit the Federal gunboats then coming down the river on Fort Pemberton. Peyton at once undertook the mission, and representing himself as a fugitive slave to the commanders of the boats, was well received. Being bright far beyond ordinary, he managed to secrete their official papers, maps, etc., and escaped with these documents to Fort Pember-ton. After the fall of Vicksburg, in ton. After the fall of Vicksburg, in July following, Peyton went with his young master again to Virginia, where he remained until the surrender of Gen.


