THE COMET.

(Cincinnati Comment Jul 7.)

The startling information was communicated in the Cincinnati Observatory about half 10 o'clock last night, that the comet had

of exceedingly bright light, shooting out from the comet at the right, about twenty degrees from a vertical line and seventy degrees from a horizontal. It gradually appeared as a series of thin lines, and, until the lens separated, and the upper and lower degrees widened further apart. To the naked eye it appeared like an elongation of the comet's tail. Through the telescope, however, the nucleus was seen to be a single mass, the broken lines becoming rounder as the degrees were more widely separated. The nucleus appeared, and each body more distinct and self. About 11 o'clock the lower nucleus appeared a tail of its own, smaller than that of the upper nucleus, but filling up the space between the two.

Professor Stone's attention was drawn to the phenomenon as at first observed, and he mentioned its development with close observation. He pointed out that the distance between the nuclei at 1,300 miles, and noticed the upper was greater and brighter than the lower. Clouds intervened, and both were then shut from view.

At half-past 11 this morning Professor Stone observed the comet at the same place, and
