



Sawnesz. Sawdust is too dry to be valuable in manure or composts. Burn the sawdust to convert it to ashes and use these, which contain all there is of value in the sawdust.

WOOD ASHES -- Prof. Roberts tells us that fifty bushels of wood ashes per acre increased the yield of grass more than any other manure, while ground bone improved the clover.

KNOTS ON PLUM TREES,-These are coursed by a fungus and should be cut away as soon as discovered. Cut off and burn badly-infected branches. Scatter a couple of quarts of salt on the ground under each tree.

POTATOES -- Potash, says a writer, is absolutely necessary to successful potato growing. The easiest and best mode of supplying it is in the form of wood ashes. It is furnished also in rollcoal ashes and well-rotted yard or stable manure.

COVERING STRAWBERRIES.-A New Fork farmer says that potato tops make the best mulch for strawberries. They are free from weed seeds, heavy enough not to be blown-off and will not pack and smother the plants as straw or hay will sometimes do. In spring they are so well rotted as not to need removal.

CUTTING POTATOES .- "W. S." asks if entting potatoes to one or two eyes in a hill would be too small to produce good results. The best crop of potatoes we ever saw was from potatoes cut to one eye and planted one piece in a hill. There is a great waste of seed potatoes every year in our country through igrance. New York Herald

Brrise Woot. - "E. B. M." says his sheep rub and bite their wool, and asks the cause and remedy. If they have not had plenty of clean straw to lie on their skin is probably dirty, which would cause them to itch. If they have not had plenty of water, salt and succulent food, it may be that mange is developing. Give them plenty of salt and mix a little sulphur in their feed twice a week. If they are afflicted with ticks use a solution of tobacco applied as a wash,-New York Herald.

WASH FOR FRUIT TREES. - A fruitrower gives the following remedy for the codling moth : One quart of lime, such as is used by the plasterers in "white-coating;" one peck of bleached wood ashes, two pecks of cow manure, one quart of soft soap and one large table-spoonful of Paris green. I wet the mixture thoroughly to make it like poste, beating thoroughly it becomes touch I added twelve quarts of water. or enough to give the trees a thorough coating. I find on the trees so washed that the old bark is dropping off and leaving the new bark perfectly smooth. On all the trees I have washed I see a perfect improvement.

CHURNING CREAM .- Neglect in thorughly agitating all the cream in the churn will sometimes make a great difference in the production of the butter. Prof. Arnold say he once visited a large dairy where the managers felt satisfied they were not obtaining the amount of butter they should do. They had six harrel churns, three on each side of the room. On examining these chotas he found that the boards were so parrow that they did not agitate the cream properly, some passing under and some over the floats without being scarcely moved at all. He had the floats taken out of three of them and deeper ones substituted, so that there was only a very short space between the edge of the floats and the sides of the churn, and so that very little cream could pass without coming in contact with the flosts. The trial was made, the result showing that the churns, when the floats ind been made desper, produced a much larger percentage of butter than those when the floats were narrower.

To TELL THE AGE OF CATTLE -The age of horned cattle may generally be known by rings on the horns till the tenth year; after that time they give no | the original archives in the Department indication of age further than that the animal has passed its tenth year. The first sting appears on the horns after the animal has passed two years old -- soon after, as a general rule, though some imes before that age. During the third year the ring gradually increases, and at three years of age it is completely formed. The second ring appears during the fourth year, and at the fifth year it is complete. After that period an additional ring is formed each year. This rule is sufficiently plain, and even a young farmer needs but little practice to enable him to read a con's age on her h rns. A cow with three rings is 6 years old; with four she is 7 years; old. No new rings are formed after the tenth sear; the deeper rings, however, and the worn appearance of the horas are pretty sure indications of old age.

STRANBERRY GRUBS. - A writer in the Print Recorder save: "I have used rock salt, both fresh and refuse, coarse and fine, before and after plowing, for strawberries in spring, and have also applied it in autumn, but with only partial success, although I apply twelve to fifteen bushels to the scre. Many grubs tail no and noit business but usually enough are left to carry out the contract to destroy one-balf to three-fourths of the first setting of strawberry plants and take a grab (or grub) mortgage on the next. It is well to apply salt freely, but something more is needed to protect strawiserry plants. 11 strawberry growers, would experiment carefully, and not jump at conclusions, some poison like

Domestia Recipes

CAULIFLOWER is delicious when, after boiling until it is tender, you turn off all the water, and add a little milk, butter, pepper and salt. It is nice, also, browned n butter after it is boiled.

HERE is a recipe for a good and simple pudding: One pint of flour, half a cup of sugar, three-quarters of a cup of sweet milk, one table spoonful of butter, two teaspoonfuls of baking-powder. Bake for twenty minutes; serve with good pudding sauce.

To PRESERVE citron, first peel it and ent in small pieces about an inch long; boil until tender in weak vinegar and water; drain this off, and make a sirup of white sugar, and drop the citron in; flavor with lemon; a few pieces of gingerroot add piquancy to the preserve. Can while hot, or put away in jars,

Tomato soup, if well seasoned, is relshed by almost everybody. To one quart of water add eight large tomatoes; cut them in small pieces, boil for twenty minutes; then put in half a teaspoonful of soda: let boil a few minutes more: then add a pint of sweet milk : season as you would ovsters; bread crumb sago, barley or rice may be added.

Sponge gingerbread, for whose exellence a truthful neighbor vouches, is made thus: Take one cup of sugar, one mp of sour milk one small terroconfu of soda, one cup of molasses, four eggs the whites and velks beaten separately: one cup of butter, one table spoonful of ginger, one cup of raisins, four cups of flour. In place of sour milk and soda you may use sweet milk and bakingpowder.

HOME-WADE crackers are more wholeme for children than cookies, and the novelty of having them made at homegoes a good way toward making them estable. Take three-quarters of a cup of butter or lard, one pint of sour milk three teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Stir all except the milk in with the flour, and when thorughly mixed put the milk in. Be careful not to knead them too much, as there is danger of their being tough; roll thin and bake in a quick

oven. A PAVORITE way to cook a whitefish is this: Choose one that weighs about seven or eight pounds, boil it until it is done, then take out all the bones . take a quart of sweet milk, two onions and a little summer savory; boil until the milk is thoroughly seasoned, then thicken with flour, using enough to make a dish a layer of fish and a layer of dressing. Cover the top with rolled eracker. as you do for scalloped oysters. Bake for three-quarters of an hour, or until the top is a golden brown. Serve with mashed potatoes, spiced currents and the vegetables of the season.

A recent re of it and accurate report by strawberry port on wolves, issued by the French authorities, estimates the number of these predaceons animals contained within the French frontiers to be 5,000, and that every year they inflict a damage of not less than 50,000,000 francs. These wolves are concentrated in a few districts -Lorraine Danphine and the Pyrenees During last winter German Lorraine had its wolves, and the authorities paid a handsome sum for ther heads. But 10% years ago, in France, wolves were the foreman to hunt through the God counted by the thousands, and even in galleys and kill the Rev. Postledrum, 1796 as many as 6,478 wolves were killed in the twelvemonth. One of the curious reasons why wolves have not been exterminated years ago in France was because the killing of them devolved on a privileged class designated as touvetiere. This office of wolf-hunter dated as far back as the time of Charlemagne, and in time the post of louvetiers was sold at a high price, so that during the reign of Charles VI it was forbidden that any one not a gentleman should kill a wolf. These wolf-slayers had certain privileges, and could quarter themselves on a village, exact food and lodgings from the people, and even insist on the peasants taking part in the battuwithout pay. In 1775 Louis XIV. had louvetiers, but abolished rewards for killing wolves. During the revolution wolf-killing as a privilege was abolished, and 300 france was paid for a she wolf with young, 200 francs for a male, and 100 francs for a cub. Napoleon, however, desirous of a return to the manners of the old regime, revived the louveterie. During the last empire wolfkilling become a fashionable sport, but it really did seem as if in certain portion France these animals were preserved by the gentlemen sportsmen, just as i India, it is stated, tigers are more or less cared for for the pleasure of killing them. To day the commission on wolves abolish the louveterie and establish once more rewards for wolf-killing, and under exceptional circumstances the Mayor of a village has the right to organize a battue and call on trackers.

SUBMARINE CABLES.

The first cost of submarine cables is heavy, and they last, on the average only ten or twelve years. If a cable breaks in deep water after it is ten years old, it cannot be lifted for repairs, as it is liable to break of its own weight. The action of the sea water gradually destroys the outer coating of iron wire, though the core of the cable may re main perfect. The companies are consequently compelled to put aside a large share of their earnings as a reserved fund for this decennial renewing of the cables.
