Few things impress the spectators with a stronger sense of the magician's skill—if not uncanny dealings with the powers of dagkness—than his catching between his teeth a marked bullet fired from a pistol by one of the company—than the market having ascertained by they themselves having ascertained by minute inspection that the weapon has no specialty about it, and that the powder and ball with which they load it are genuine. The performer stands with his hands behind his back; careful aim is taken at him, the trigger pulled; and without stirring, he allows the marksman to step up and remove the bullet—identified by a secret cut or mark—from his mouth, a feat well calculated to produce an astonishing effect and "bring down the house." 
