Steam heat has been introduced into the World building; the building occupied by the Commercial Advertiser, into the Sunday Mercury building, on Park Row and next week it will be put in use by the Mail and Express. The Herald is also negotiating with the company, and no doubt the rest of the newspaper proprietors and managers will soon discover that they can confer a great boon on perspiring pressman by drawing out the fire from their boilers and using outside power. It is claimed that, on the ground of safety from fire or explo-sion, it will pay to use purchased steam heat even at a considerable advance, and, as most of the leading newspapers and, as most of the leading newspapers now own their own buildings, this is something of a consideration. Of the number which own their buildings are the Herald, the Tribunc, the Sun, the Times, and perhaps the World. But it is doubtful whether the latter owns any-thing, as it appears that Joe Pulitzer only came from the West to make an experimental essay as editor, while the Gould interest in the paper remains unchanged. The evening newspapers are mostly in hired quarters. The Commercial Advertiser, the Evening Post, and the Mail and Express are in this category. BUSINESS DONE ON TICK. The Oredit System—Its Evils and Its Benefits.

Credit, used in its mercantile sense, s not an invention of modern times. There are indications in the hierogly phic records of the ancient Egyptians that even they did business by credit. And the evidences of dealing by credit in the Bible and in the writings of classical Greece and Rome are numerous. During the middle ages it was the Jews, in their capacity as bankers, agents, middlemen and brokers, who did most of the business that was transacted on

trust.
But if the thing itself is not new, at least the immense extension of the credit system is. You may go where you will in these broad United States and you will find that the backbone of trade is credit. At first sight that may seem strange, but common experience teach es that the needs of commerce, in its higher as well as lower and lowest branches, are so complex and manifold that sales and purchases are effected so quickly as to render it absolutely impossible to trade without trusting and being trusted. A few exceptions there are, of course, to this rule, but they are are, of course, to this rule, but they are only exceptions; and it is true that this system is, paradoxical as it may sound, perfectly healthy and right, if the proper safeguards are applied. But there's the rub. The panic of 1873, in fact all our panics and financial collapses, were always due to the excessive use of the credit system.

They have only of late years assumed such an elevated and trusted position. 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
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
