How to Cook an Old Herte Prof. W. Mattieu Williams gives us

Prof. W. Mattieu Williams gives us in Knowledge his practical experience with elderly poultry, as follows:

I may mention an experiment that I have made lately. I killed a superannuated heir—more than six years eld, but otherwise in very good condition. Cooked in the ordinary way she would have been uncatably tough. Instead of being thus cooked, she was egently skewed for about four hears. I cannot guarantee to the maintenance of the guarantee to the maintenance of the theoretical temperature, having a suspicion of some simmering. After this she was left in the water until it cooled, and on the following day. and on the following day was roasted in the usual manner, i. e., in a roasting oven. The result was excellent; as tender as a full grown chicken roasted in der as a full grown chicken roasted in the ordinary way, and of quite equal flavor, in spite of the very good broth obtained by the preliminary stewing. This surprised me. I anticipated the softening of the tendons and ligamenta, but supposed that the extraction of the juices would have spoiled the flavor. It must have diluted it, and that so much remained was probably due to the fact. remained was probably due to the fact that an old fowl is more fully flavored than a young chicken. When apples are plenty, they may be so cooked as to form an important article of diet, and that, too, without cloying the appetite.
