LEAP-YEAR.

The peculiarity of Leap-Kear is the peculiar lead th of the month of February, so the history of the origin of Leap-Kear is closely connected with a history of February, and this takes us back almost to the origin of the year itself.

As a year is the time of the earth's revolution round the sun, it should conrevolution round the sun, it should contain 365 days and a fraction of a day. The ancients, having great respect for the moon, wanted the year to be subdivided into parts corresponding with her revolution round the earth. The difficulty of thus adjusting the month's or moon's revolutions, so as to be together culty of thus adjusting the month's or moon's revolutions, so as to be together equal to the earth's revolutions round the sun, gave rise to February itself, and to many of the changes which the month has undergone, before standing at its present number of days. Rom-ulus' division of the year is the first Furoness one known and the one month

Its clumsiness may be imagined when we state that the alteration in the month was made every alternate year by the addition of a whole month, called an placed not at the end of February, but between the 24th and 25th days of February. This addition was found to be too great, as the year, instead of being days' short, was now one day too . This latter mistake was also ten days' short, was now one uay too long. This latter mistake was also rectified, and by a mode of correction even more clumsy, if that were pos-sible, than the one just referred to. After this, every error having been corrected, the year was of almost as correct a length as it is now, that is, as correct as the average, for it was of different lengths at different times, but always came round to the correct length every twenty-four years.
