



Increase of Crime.

There is no denying the fact that erime is on the increase, and during the last few years has assumed alarming proportions, And this increase is most marked in the grower forms of vice. Reliable statistics ow that in England, out of every 10,000 deaths, seven are the result of violence: in Ireland and France the proportion is over eight to 10,000; while in the United States the ratio at present is twenty-one—a proportion sugre terrible than that of any civilized ry in the world, save Italy and Spain. In the state of New Jersey during the last two years the number of criminals increased 302 per cent. The last annual report of the prison association of New York state says:

the public mind; the corruption and delay which exists in the administration of justice; the failure to enforce existing laws, especially the excise laws, which are virtually a dead letter; the alarming increase in the use of strong drink (increasing at a ratio threefold greater than that of the population); the abuse of the pardoning power the ostracizing of discharged criminals; the unclean and vile press which is flooding the public with blood and thunder literature inflaming passion, corrupting the young, and bringing on a carnival of vice and crime in every conceivable form. Epidemics of crime are sure to follow vivid descriptions of pruent vice, brutal conflicts, and lawless violence and bloodshed. The grand jury of New York city, in the court of general sessions, has just made a noteworthy preentment. They specially emphasized the fact that the license laws in the county of New York are openly violated and offenders are rarely punished. They say "Just here the grand jury desires to emphasize the fact that nearly all the homicides considered by them during this season are committed in lrinking-saloons, and nearly all the crimes of violence orginated in such places, or were committed when the actors" were under the influence of strong drink. In asking for a more stringent enforcement of the excise laws, whose provisions are simple, reasonable, and humane, the grand jury is only aiming to dam up and control the principal sources of the crimes it is periodically called

## Hibernation of Reptiles

Charles C. Abbott, writing in Science asserts that the hibernation of reptiles varies much according to the severity of the winter. Many turtles take refuge in the deep holes of ponds, and Doctor Abbott asserts that, in the severest cold weather, he has caught the snapping turtle, the musk turtle and the box mud turtle in deep holes and about large springs that discharge their waters on level ground.

As fish have been found partly eaten when taken in nets in mid-winter. Doctor Abbott concludes that the snapper takes an occasional meal. At the same time, he does not deny that the species found active in winter hibernate under certain conditions, and that the other ecies of turtle hibernate.

Snakes which live in water do not sleep so deep a winter sleep as do the black enake and others which frequent the uplands.

The true water snake (Tropidenotus sipeden) may often be found in water a foot or two beneath the said of any not or two beneath the sand of any spring hole, and is not slow the swim of when thus disturbed. This species and the cemmon garter snake are the first to appear in the spring.
